- Causing one to have the idea or impression that someone or something is questionable, dishonest, or dangerous.
- Openly distrustful and unwilling to confide.
- Not as expected.
- Having the belief or impression that someone is involved in an illegal or dishonest activity.





# Synonyms of "Suspicious" as an adjective (33 Words)

<u>apprehensive</u>	Mentally upset over possible misfortune or danger etc. A kind and <b>apprehensive</b> friend.
<u>chary</u>	Cautiously or suspiciously reluctant to do something. <i>Chary</i> of the risks involved.
corrupt	Evil or morally depraved. The old <b>corrupt</b> order.
criminal	Guilty of crime or serious offense. He may never fulfil his potential and that would be a <b>criminal</b> waste.
<u>cynical</u>	Believing that people are motivated purely by self-interest; distrustful of human sincerity or integrity. <i>Her cynical attitude.</i>
dark	Used of color having a dark hue. So many <b>dark</b> deeds had been committed.
disbelieving	Denying or questioning the tenets of especially a religion. The <b>disbelieving</b> look in her eyes.



dishonest	Behaving or prone to behave in an untrustworthy, deceitful, or insincere way. <b>Dishonest</b> politicians.
disreputable	Lacking respectability in character or behavior or appearance. <i>He was heavy grubby and vaguely</i> <b>disreputable</b> .
<u>distrustful</u>	Feeling or showing distrust of someone or something. I have grown up to be <b>distrustful</b> of men.
doubtful	Feeling uncertain about something. It is <b>doubtful</b> whether these schemes have any lasting effect.
<u>dubious</u>	Not to be relied upon; suspect. <b>Dubious</b> about agreeing to go.
<u>fishy</u>	Of or relating to or resembling fish. There was something <b>fishy</b> about the accident.
funny	Beyond or deviating from the usual or expected. It s a <b>funny</b> old world.
<u>irregular</u>	(of a verb or other word) having inflections that do not conform to the usual rules. She led a somewhat <b>irregular</b> private life.
jaundiced	Showing or affected by prejudice or envy or distaste. Looked with a <b>jaundiced</b> eye on the growth of regimentation.
<u>leery</u>	Cautious or wary due to realistic suspicions. A city <b>leery</b> of gang violence.
mistrustful	Openly distrustful and unwilling to confide. <i>He wondered if he had been unduly <b>mistrustful</b> of her.</i>
<u>murky</u>	(of liquids) clouded as with sediment. A government minister with a <b>murky</b> past.
mysterious	(of a location) having an atmosphere of strangeness or secrecy. A <b>mysterious</b> benefactor provided the money.
<u>odd</u>	Beyond or deviating from the usual or expected. It is <b>odd</b> that his name is never mentioned.
<u>questionable</u>	Likely to be dishonourable or morally suspect. <i>His <b>questionable</b> financial deals.</i>
sceptical	Relating to the theory that certain knowledge is impossible. The public were deeply <b>sceptical</b> about some of the proposals.
<u>shady</u>	Quiet, dark, or concealed. <i>He was involved in his grandmother s <b>shady</b> deals.</i>



slippery	Causing or tending to cause things to slip or slide. How extraordinarily <b>slippery</b> a liar the camera is.
strange	Unusual or surprising; difficult to understand or explain. <i>Children have some <b>strange</b> ideas.</i>
<u>suspect</u>	Not as expected. <i>Her motives were suspect</i> .
under suspicion	Located below or beneath something else.
unsavoury	Morally offensive. An <b>unsavoury</b> reputation.
<u>unsure</u>	Lacking self-confidence. <b>Unsure</b> of himself and his future.
untrusting	Not tending to believe in other people's honesty or sincerity; suspicious. <i>Kate became wary furtive and <b>untrusting</b>.</i>
wary	Feeling or showing caution about possible dangers or problems. They were <b>wary</b> in their movements.





### **Usage Examples of "Suspicious" as an adjective**

- Police were called when staff became suspicious.
- *He was suspicious of her motives.*
- They are not treating the fire as suspicious.
- Suspicious behavior.

<u>cynical</u>	Believing the worst of human nature and motives; having a sneering disbelief in e.g. selflessness of others. A <b>cynical</b> manipulation of public opinion.
<u>disbelief</u>	Doubt about the truth of something. Laura shook her head in <b>disbelief</b> .
<u>distrust</u>	Regard as untrustworthy; regard with suspicion; have no faith or confidence in. <i>The public s <b>distrust</b> of politicians.</i>
<u>doubt</u>	Consider unlikely or have doubts about. I have no reason to <b>doubt</b> him.
doubtful	Unsettled in mind or opinion. <i>Of <b>doubtful</b> legality.</i>
dubiety	The state of being unsure of something. His enemies made much of the <b>dubiety</b> of his paternity.
<u>dubious</u>	Fraught with uncertainty or doubt. Extremely <b>dubious</b> assumptions.
incredulity	Doubt about the truth of something. <i>He stared down the street in <b>incredulity</b>.</i>
<u>incredulous</u>	Not disposed or willing to believe; unbelieving. An <b>incredulous</b> gasp.
<u>leery</u>	Cautious or wary due to realistic suspicions. A city <b>leery</b> of gang violence.
misgiving	Doubt about someone's honesty. I felt a sense of <b>misgiving</b> at the prospect of retirement.
mistrust	The trait of not trusting others. The public <b>mistrust</b> of government.
<u>pessimist</u>	A person who believes that this world is as bad as it could be or that evil will ultimately prevail over good. <i>He finds solace in the writings of</i> <b>pessimist</b> <i>philosophers.</i>
<u>qualm</u>	A momentary faint or sick feeling. Military regimes generally have no <b>qualm</b> s about controlling the press.
question	Pose a question. There s no <b>question</b> that the company s true financial situation is different.
<u>questionable</u>	Able to be refuted. A fire of <b>questionable</b> origin.
questioning	The raising of a doubt about or objection to something. <i>This situation should prompt</i> <b>questioning</b> .



sceptical	Marked by or given to doubt. The public were deeply <b>sceptical</b> about some of the proposals.
<u>shady</u>	Filled with shade. A <b>shady</b> deal.
skeptic	Someone who habitually doubts accepted beliefs.
<u>skeptical</u>	Marked by or given to doubt. A <b>skeptical</b> attitude.
skepticism	The disbelief in any claims of ultimate knowledge.
<u>suspect</u>	Believe or feel that (someone) is guilty of an illegal, dishonest, or unpleasant act, without certain proof. A <b>suspect</b> package was found on the platform.
suspiciously	With a cautious distrust or suspicion of someone or something. Women have been eyed <b>suspiciously</b> by the Party.
unbelief	A rejection of belief. The darkness of <b>unbelief</b> .
<u>uncertain</u>	Not able to be relied on; not known or definite. An <b>uncertain</b> recollection of events.
<u>uncertainty</u>	The state of being uncertain. The <b>uncertainty</b> of the outcome.
vaguely	In a way that is uncertain, indefinite or unclear; roughly. <i>He <b>vaguely</b> remembered talking to her once.</i>
