experience	Go through mental or physical states or experiences. <i>Experience vertigo.</i>
<u>extend</u>	Stretch out over a distance space time or scope run or extend between two points or beyond a certain point. <i>Extend a hand.</i>
get	Take vengeance on or get even. <i>I ll get the door.</i>
give strength to	Cause to happen or be responsible for.
go through	Go through in search of something search through someone s belongings in an unauthorized way.

perpetuate	Cause to continue or prevail. <i>The confusion was perpetuated through inadvertence.</i>
preserve	Keep in safety and protect from harm, decay, loss, or destruction. <i>Preserve the forest and the lakes.</i>
prolong	Lengthen or extend in duration or space. <i>An idea which prolonged the life of the engine by many years.</i>
prop up	Support by placing against something solid or rigid.
protract	Prolong. <i>He had certainly taken his time even protracting the process.</i>
ratify	Sign or give formal consent to (a treaty, contract, or agreement), making it officially valid. <i>Both countries were due to ratify the treaty by the end of the year.</i>
retain	Secure and keep for possible future use or application. <i>This garment retains its shape even after many washings.</i>
round the clock	Pronounce with rounded lips.
see someone through	Get to know or become aware of, usually accidentally.
shore up	Arrive on shore.

stand	Withstand the force of something. <i>My decision stands.</i>
<u>steady</u>	Make or become steady. <i>Steady yourself.</i>
<u>substantiate</u>	Represent in bodily form. <i>Our ideas must be substantiated into actions.</i>
succour	Give assistance or aid to. <i>Prisoners of war were liberated and succoured.</i>
suffer	Undergo or suffer. <i>He suffered a great deal since his arrest.</i>
support	Support with evidence or authority or make more certain or confirm. <i>The studies support our findings.</i>
<u>undergo</u>	Pass through. <i>The chemical undergoes a sudden change.</i>
<u>underpin</u>	Support (a building or other structure) from below by laying a solid foundation below ground level or by substituting stronger for weaker materials. <i>The theme of honour underpinning the two books.</i>
uphold	Keep or maintain in unaltered condition; cause to remain or last. <i>They uphold a tradition of not causing distress to living creatures.</i>
validate	Give evidence for. <i>He seems to need other women's attention to validate him as a man.</i>
vindicate	Clear (someone) of blame or suspicion. <i>Vindicate a claim.</i>
