- cuff** Handcuffs.

*He was the director of many big **hits**.*
- slap** A sound made or as if made by a slap.

- swing** A period of time spent swinging back and forth on a seat suspended by ropes or chains.

## Swipe as a Verb

### Definitions of "Swipe" as a verb

According to the [Oxford Dictionary of English](#), "swipe" as a verb can have the following definitions:

- *Move (one's finger) across a touchscreen in order to activate a function.*
- *Hit or try to hit with a swinging blow.*
- *Steal.*
- *Strike with a swiping motion.*
- *Make off with belongings of others.*
- *Pass (a swipe card) through an electronic device designed to read and process the information encoded on it.*



## Synonyms of "Swipe" as a verb (24 Words)

<b><u>abstract</u></b>	Give an abstract of. <i>Let s <b>abstract</b> away from this particular example.</i>
<b>appropriate</b>	Take (something) for one's own use, typically without the owner's permission. <i>The accused had <b>appropriated</b> the property.</i>
<b>cabbage</b>	Make off with belongings of others.
<b>cuff</b>	Secure with handcuffs. <i>The police hand<b>cuffed</b> the suspect at the scene of the crime.</i>
<b>filch</b>	Make off with belongings of others. <i>They <b>filched</b> milk off morning doorsteps.</i>
<b>help oneself to</b>	Improve; change for the better.
<b>hit</b>	Score a run or point by hitting a ball with a bat racket stick etc. <i>The area has been badly <b>hit</b> by pit closures.</i>

<b>hook</b>	Fasten with a hook. <i>I was <b>hooked</b> by John's radical zeal.</i>
<b>lash out</b>	Strike as if by whipping.
<b>lift</b>	Make audible. <i>The new law <b>lifted</b> many people from poverty.</i>
<b>nobble</b>	Seize or accost (someone). <i>He intended to <b>nobble</b> Rose's money.</i>
<b>pilfer</b>	Make off with belongings of others. <i>She produced the handful of coins she had managed to <b>pilfer</b>.</i>
<b>pinch</b>	Irritate as if by a nip pinch or tear. <i>Aunt Rose <b>pinched</b> her thin lips together.</i>
<b>purloin</b>	Steal (something). <i>He must have managed to <b>purloin</b> a copy of the key.</i>
<b>shoplift</b>	Steal in a store. <i>She was caught <b>shoplifting</b> a pair of shoes.</i>
<b>slap</b>	Hit against or into something with the sound of something being slapped. <i>My sister <b>slapped</b> my face.</i>
<b>snarf</b>	Eat or drink quickly or greedily. <i>They <b>snarfed</b> up frozen yogurt.</i>
<b>sneak</b>	Do or obtain (something) in a stealthy or furtive way. <i>He <b>sneaks</b> up on us slyly.</i>
<b>steal</b>	Move stealthily. <i>A delicious languor was <b>stealing</b> over her.</i>
<b>strike</b>	Undertake strike action against an employer. <i>He raised his hand as if to <b>strike</b> me.</i>
<b>swing</b>	Move or walk in a swinging or swaying manner. <i><b>Swing</b> a bat.</i>
<b>take</b>	Take as an undesirable consequence of some event or state of affairs. <i>He leaned forward to <b>take</b> her hand.</i>
<b>thieve</b>	Be a thief; steal something. <i>The students have been <b>thieving</b> my favourite art books.</i>





## Usage Examples of "Swipe" as a verb

- *Swipe to the left on the main navigation page and you'll see a user login menu.*
- *Simply swipe a finger across the phone's display screen to switch to another program.*
- *She swiped me right across the nose.*
- *Lola stood on the balcony, swiping at the moths.*
- *Someone swiped one of his sausages.*

<a href="#">bait</a>	Lure entice or entrap with bait. <i>Fishing with live <b>baits</b>.</i>
<b>bang</b>	Leap jerk bang. <i>A nasty <b>bang</b> on the head.</i>
<a href="#">bat</a>	A person batting especially in cricket a batsman. <i>Who s <b>batting</b>.</i>
<b>brad</b>	Fasten with brads.
<b>dab</b>	Apply (a substance) with light quick strokes. <i>She licked a <b>dab</b> of chocolate from her finger.</i>
<b>encouraged</b>	Inspired with confidence.
<a href="#">entice</a>	Provoke someone to do something through (often false or exaggerated) promises or persuasion. <i>The treat is offered to <b>entice</b> the dog to eat.</i>



<b>filch</b>	Pilfer or steal (something, especially an item of small value) in a casual way. <i>They <b>filched</b> milk off morning doorsteps.</i>
<b>finger</b>	Play a passage with a particular sequence of positions of the fingers. <i>I <b>fingered</b> my boss and found that he is not logged on in the afternoons.</i>
<b>fingernail</b>	The nail at the end of a finger.
<b>flail</b>	A device similar to a flail used as a weapon or for flogging. <i>Her arms were <b>flailing</b>.</i>
<b>gesticulate</b>	Use gestures, especially dramatic ones, instead of speaking or to emphasize one's words. <i>They were shouting and gesticulating frantically at drivers who did not slow down.</i>
<b>gesture</b>	Make a gesture. <i>A <b>gesture</b> of defiance.</i>
<b>hand</b>	Operated by or held in the hand. <i><b>Hand</b> in the main.</i>
<b>hook</b>	Attach or fasten with a hook or hooks. <i>His opponent <b>hooked</b> him badly.</i>
<b><u>inviting</u></b>	Offering the promise of an attractive or enjoyable experience. <i>The sea down there looks so <b>inviting</b>.</i>
<b>pilfer</b>	Steal (things of little value). <i>No system is proof against <b>pilfering</b> if people are determined enough.</i>
<b>purloin</b>	Make off with belongings of others. <i>He must have managed to <b>purloin</b> a copy of the key.</i>
<b>reel</b>	Music composed for dancing a reel. <i>The two <b>reeled</b> out of the bar arm in arm.</i>
<b>rob</b>	Deprive someone of (something needed or deserved). <i>She was <b>robbed</b> of her handbag.</i>
<b>shop</b>	Shop around not necessarily buying. <i>She <b>shopped</b> her husband to bosses for taking tools home.</i>
<b>sitting</b>	(of an animal or bird) not running or flying. <i>He read the mystery at one <b>sitting</b>.</i>
<b><u>slap</u></b>	Hit against or into something with the sound of something being slapped. <i>My sister <b>slapped</b> my face.</i>
<b><u>sneak</u></b>	Someone who prowls or sneaks about usually with unlawful intentions. <i>He <b>sneaks</b> up on us slyly.</i>

**steal**

An act of stealing something.  
*The chorus is a **steal** from The Smiths London.*

**strike**

A pitch that passes through the strike zone.  
*Small conifers will **strike** from cuttings.*

**talon**

An ogee moulding.  
*The mouse wouldn't have stood much chance against the peregrine's **talons**.*

**theft**

The action or crime of stealing.  
*The latest **theft** happened at a garage.*

**thrash**

A violent or noisy movement of beating or thrashing.  
*The system is **thrashing** again.*

**transgression**

The act of transgressing; the violation of a law or a duty or moral principle.  
*I'll be keeping an eye out for further **transgressions**.*
