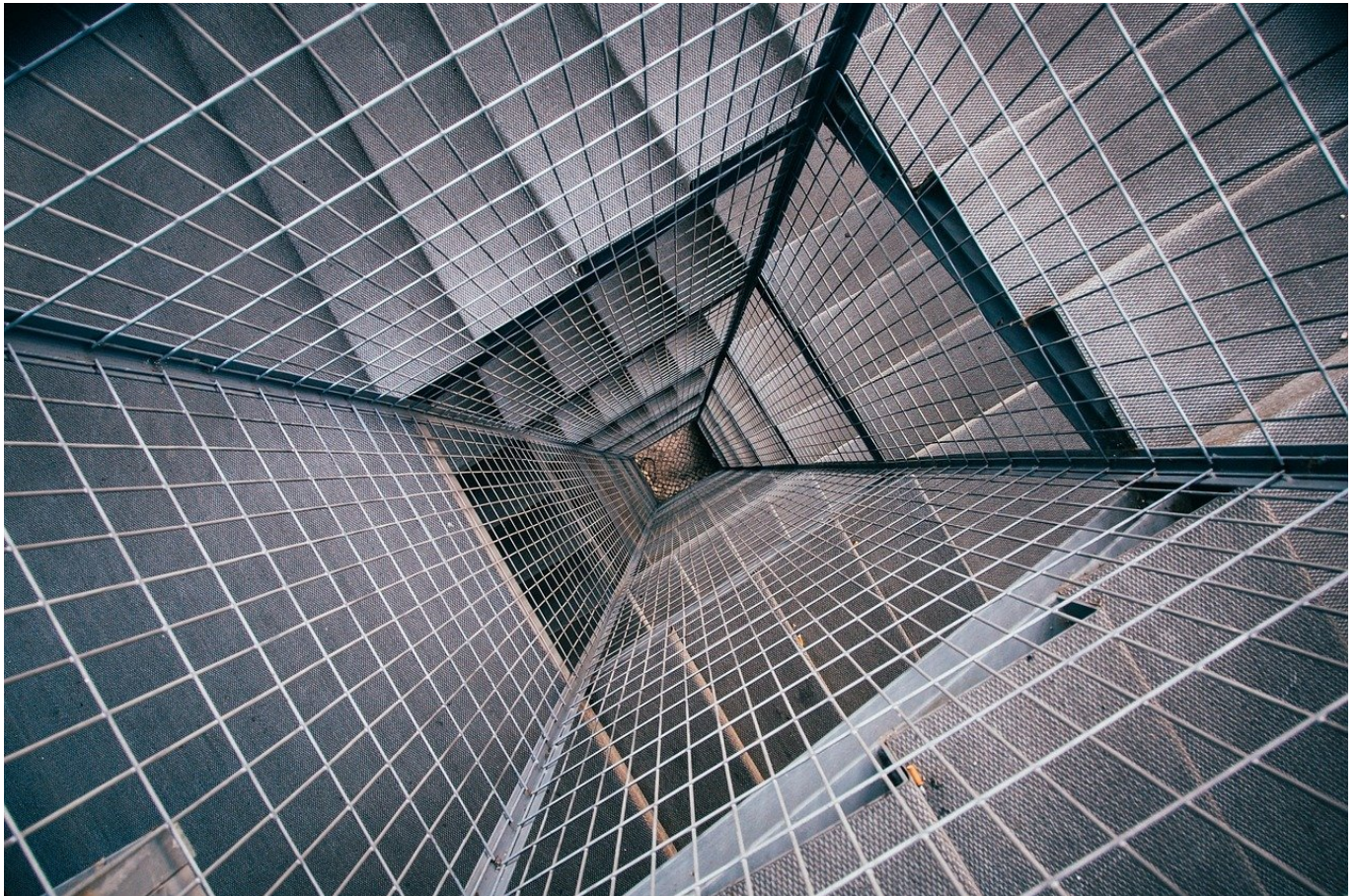
Symmetry as a Noun

- *(mathematics) an attribute of a shape or relation; exact reflection of form on opposite sides of a dividing line or plane.*
- *Correct or pleasing proportion of the parts of a thing.*
- *The property of being isotropic; having the same value when measured in different directions.*
- *The quality of being made up of exactly similar parts facing each other or around an*

axis.

correspondence	Communication by the exchange of letters. <i>His wife dealt with his private correspondence.</i>
equality	The quality of being the same in quantity or measure or value or status. <i>An organization aiming to promote racial equality.</i>
equilibrium	A state in which opposing forces or influences are balanced. <i>His intensity could unsettle his equilibrium.</i>
evenness	The quality of being balanced.
evenness of form	The visual appearance of something or someone.
harmoniousness	Compatibility in opinion and action.
harmony	An arrangement of the four Gospels, or of any parallel narratives, which presents a single continuous narrative text. <i>The piece owes its air of tranquillity largely to the harmony.</i>
isotropy	The property of being isotropic; having the same value when measured in different directions.
orderliness	A male hospital attendant who has general duties that do not involve the medical treatment of patients.
proportion	Balance among the parts of something. <i>The proportion of greenhouse gases in the atmosphere is rising.</i>
proportions	Balance among the parts of something. <i>A building of vast proportions.</i>
regularity	The quality of being characterized by a fixed principle or rate. <i>He was famous for the regularity of his habits.</i>
symmetricalness	An attribute of a shape or relation; exact reflection of form on opposite sides of a dividing line or plane.
uniformity	The quality of lacking diversity or variation (even to the point of boredom). <i>An attempt to impose administrative and cultural uniformity.</i>

apportionment	<p>The act of distributing by allotting or apportioning; distribution according to a plan. <i>The apportionment of seats in the House of Representatives is based on the relative population of each state.</i></p>
balance	<p>Bring into balance or equilibrium. <i>He accumulated a healthy balance with the savings bank.</i></p>
<u>brace</u>	<p>Support or hold steady and make steadfast with or as if with a brace. <i>A neck brace.</i></p>
<u>consistency</u>	<p>An attribute of a logical system that is so constituted that none of the propositions deducible from the axioms contradict one another. <i>The sauce has the consistency of creamed butter.</i></p>
<u>coordination</u>	<p>Being of coordinate importance, rank, or degree. <i>Changing from one foot position to another requires coordination and balance.</i></p>

<u>correspondence</u>	Letters, emails, etc. sent or received. <i>The organization engaged in detailed correspondence with local MPs.</i>
<u>counterbalance</u>	Oppose and mitigate the effects of by contrary actions. <i>His restoration to power was intended as a counterbalance to his rival's influence.</i>
counterweight	Constitute a counterweight or counterbalance to. <i>Conservatives saw the family as a counterweight to the power of the state.</i>
diatonic	Of a melody or harmony constructed from a diatonic scale.
<u>disinterest</u>	Lack of interest in something. <i>I do not claim any scholarly disinterest with this book.</i>
dispassionate	Not influenced by strong emotion, and so able to be rational and impartial. <i>She dealt with life's disasters in a calm dispassionate way.</i>
equilibrium	A state of physical balance. <i>The equilibrium level of income.</i>
equipoise	A counterbalance or balancing force. <i>As a piece of language it is as delicately equipoised as any.</i>
<u>equity</u>	The value of a mortgaged property after deduction of charges against it. <i>People who have built up a significant amount of equity in their homes.</i>
even	Make even or more even. <i>Any number doubled is even.</i>
fair	Without favoring one party in a fair evenhanded manner. <i>A fairer distribution of wealth.</i>
impartial	Showing lack of favoritism. <i>The minister cannot be impartial in the way that a judge would be.</i>
impartiality	Equal treatment of all rivals or disputants; fairness. <i>Entries had to be submitted under a pseudonym to ensure impartiality in the judging process.</i>
level	Become level or even. <i>Park the car on the level.</i>
neutrality	PH value of 7. <i>The clinical neutrality of the description.</i>
<u>objectivity</u>	Judgment based on observable phenomena and uninfluenced by emotions or personal prejudices. <i>The piece lacked any objectivity.</i>

<u>offset</u>	Create an offset in. <i>Several places where the ridge was offset at right angles to its length.</i>
proportion	Give pleasant proportions to. <i>The bleach can be diluted with water in the proportion one part bleach to ten parts water.</i>
rationalism	The practice of treating reason as the ultimate authority in religion. <i>Scientific rationalism.</i>
<u>remnant</u>	A surviving trace. <i>The bogs are an endangered remnant of a primeval landscape.</i>
<u>stability</u>	The quality of being enduring and free from change or variation. <i>There are fears for the political stability of the area.</i>
standard	Conforming to or constituting a standard of measurement or value or of the usual or regularized or accepted kind. <i>Standard procedure.</i>
steadiness	The quality of being sensible, reliable, and self-restrained. <i>We got a glimpse of the steadiness and maturity we need to steer through this crisis.</i>
tonal	Having tonality i.e. tones and chords organized in relation to one tone such as a keynote or tonic. <i>Chinese is a tonal language.</i>
unsettle	Cause to feel anxious or uneasy; disturb. <i>The crisis has unsettled financial markets.</i>
