<b>equality</b>	The quality of being the same in quantity or measure or value or status. <i>An organization aiming to promote racial <b>equality</b>.</i>
<b>equilibrium</b>	A state in which opposing forces or influences are balanced. <i>His intensity could unsettle his <b>equilibrium</b>.</i>
<b>evenness</b>	The quality of being balanced.
<b>evenness of form</b>	The visual appearance of something or someone.
<b>harmoniousness</b>	Compatibility in opinion and action.
<b>harmony</b>	An arrangement of the four Gospels, or of any parallel narratives, which presents a single continuous narrative text. <i>The piece owes its air of tranquillity largely to the <b>harmony</b>.</i>
<b>isotropy</b>	The property of being isotropic; having the same value when measured in different directions.
<b>orderliness</b>	A male hospital attendant who has general duties that do not involve the medical treatment of patients.
<b>proportion</b>	Balance among the parts of something. <i>The <b>proportion</b> of greenhouse gases in the atmosphere is rising.</i>
<b>proportions</b>	Balance among the parts of something. <i>A building of vast <b>proportions</b>.</i>
<b>regularity</b>	The quality of being characterized by a fixed principle or rate. <i>He was famous for the <b>regularity</b> of his habits.</i>
<b>symmetricalness</b>	An attribute of a shape or relation; exact reflection of form on opposite sides of a dividing line or plane.
<b>uniformity</b>	The quality of lacking diversity or variation (even to the point of boredom). <i>An attempt to impose administrative and cultural <b>uniformity</b>.</i>

<u><a href="#">brace</a></u>	Support or hold steady and make steadfast with or as if with a brace. <i>A neck <b>brace</b>.</i>
<u><a href="#">consistency</a></u>	An attribute of a logical system that is so constituted that none of the propositions deducible from the axioms contradict one another. <i>The sauce has the <b>consistency</b> of creamed butter.</i>

<b><u>counterbalance</u></b>	Oppose and mitigate the effects of by contrary actions. <i>His restoration to power was intended as a <b>counterbalance</b> to his rival's influence.</i>
<b>counterweight</b>	Constitute a counterweight or counterbalance to. <i>Conservatives saw the family as a <b>counterweight</b> to the power of the state.</i>
<b>diatonic</b>	Of a melody or harmony constructed from a diatonic scale.
<b><u>disinterest</u></b>	Lack of interest in something. <i>I do not claim any scholarly <b>disinterest</b> with this book.</i>
<b>dispassionate</b>	Not influenced by strong emotion, and so able to be rational and impartial. <i>She dealt with life's disasters in a calm <b>dispassionate</b> way.</i>
<b>equilibrium</b>	A state of physical balance. <i>The <b>equilibrium</b> level of income.</i>
<b>equipoise</b>	A counterbalance or balancing force. <i>As a piece of language it is as delicately <b>equipoised</b> as any.</i>
<b><u>equity</u></b>	The value of a mortgaged property after deduction of charges against it. <i>People who have built up a significant amount of <b>equity</b> in their homes.</i>
<b>even</b>	Make even or more even. <i>Any number doubled is <b>even</b>.</i>
<b>fair</b>	Without favoring one party in a fair evenhanded manner. <i>A <b>fairer</b> distribution of wealth.</i>
<b>impartial</b>	Showing lack of favoritism. <i>The minister cannot be <b>impartial</b> in the way that a judge would be.</i>
<b>impartiality</b>	Equal treatment of all rivals or disputants; fairness. <i>Entries had to be submitted under a pseudonym to ensure <b>impartiality</b> in the judging process.</i>
<b>level</b>	Become level or even. <i>Park the car on the <b>level</b>.</i>
<b>neutrality</b>	PH value of 7. <i>The clinical <b>neutrality</b> of the description.</i>
<b><u>objectivity</u></b>	Judgment based on observable phenomena and uninfluenced by emotions or personal prejudices. <i>The piece lacked any <b>objectivity</b>.</i>

<b><u>offset</u></b>	Create an offset in. <i>Several places where the ridge was <b>offset</b> at right angles to its length.</i>
<b>proportion</b>	Give pleasant proportions to. <i>The bleach can be diluted with water in the <b>proportion</b> one part bleach to ten parts water.</i>
<b>rationalism</b>	The practice of treating reason as the ultimate authority in religion. <i>Scientific <b>rationalism</b>.</i>
