- *(of a structure) designed in a sensitive or appropriate way.*
- *Feeling, showing, or expressing sympathy.*
- *Of or relating to the sympathetic nervous system.*
- *(of a person) attracting the liking of others.*
- *Showing approval of or favour towards an idea or action.*
- *Expressing or feeling or resulting from sympathy or compassion or friendly fellow feelings; disposed toward.*
- *Evoking empathic or sympathetic feelings.*
- *Showing or motivated by sympathy and understanding and generosity.*
- *Relating to or denoting the part of the autonomic nervous system consisting of nerves arising from ganglia near the middle part of the spinal cord, supplying the internal organs, blood vessels, and glands, and balancing the action of the parasympathetic*

nerves.

- Having similar disposition and tastes.
- (of characters in literature or drama) evoking empathic or sympathetic feelings.
- Relating to, producing, or denoting an effect which arises in response to a similar action elsewhere.
- Relating to vibrations that occur as a result of vibrations in a nearby body.

charitable	Relating to or characterized by charity. Was charitable in his opinions of others.
comforting	Affording comfort or solace. A comforting bowl of soup.
commiserative	Feeling or expressing sympathy. Made commiserative clicking sounds with his tongue.
companionable	(of a situation) relaxed and pleasant because shared with friends or friendly people. A companionable pet.
<u>congenial</u>	Capable of cross-fertilization or of being grafted. He went back to a climate more congenial to his cold stony soul.
consoling	Affording comfort or solace. His sister gave him a consoling pat on the back.
easy to get along with	Affording comfort.
encouraging	Giving someone support or confidence; supportive. The results are very encouraging .
encouraging of	Giving courage or confidence or hope.
favourable	(of winds or weather) tending to promote or facilitate. By sailing towards the land first you will find more favourable wind.
friendly	Inclined to help or support; not antagonistic or hostile. User friendly computers.
<u>genial</u>	Of or relating to the chin or median part of the lower jaw. Our genial host.
good-hearted	Showing or motivated by sympathy and understanding and generosity.
harmonic	Using or produced by the application of a harmonic. A basic four chord harmonic sequence.
in favour of	Directed or bound inward.
in sympathy with	Directed or bound inward.
<u>kindly</u>	Showing or motivated by sympathy and understanding and generosity. Kindly criticism.

large-hearted	Showing or motivated by sympathy and understanding and generosity.
likable	Evoking empathic or sympathetic feelings. <i>An attractive and likable young man.</i>
likeable	Easy to like; agreeable. <i>A very likeable young woman.</i>
on the side of	Located on a side.
openhearted	Freely communicative; candidly straightforward. <i>Openhearted</i> advice.
pitying	Feeling or showing sorrow for someone's misfortunes, often with an implication of disdain or mild contempt. <i>He gave her a pitying look.</i>
<u>pleasant</u>	Having pleasing manners or behavior. <i>Pleasant</i> sensations.
<u>pro</u>	Of a person or an event professional. <i>A pro golfer.</i>
supporting of	Furnishing support and encouragement.
supportive	Furnishing support or assistance. <i>A supportive family network.</i>
supportive of	Furnishing support or assistance.

altruism	The quality of unselfish concern for the welfare of others. <i>Reciprocal altruism.</i>
appealing	Able to attract interest or draw favorable attention. <i>Village life is somehow more appealing.</i>
benefaction	A contribution of money or assistance. <i>Take official receipt of such benefaction.</i>
benevolence	An act intending or showing kindness and good will.
benignity	The quality of being kind and gentle. <i>His air of benignity.</i>
brotherhood	A trade union. <i>A religious brotherhood.</i>
caring	A loving feeling. <i>The caring professions.</i>

compassion	The humane quality of understanding the suffering of others and wanting to do something about it. <i>The victims should be treated with compassion.</i>
compassionate	Feeling or showing sympathy and concern for others. <i>Heard the soft and compassionate voices of women.</i>
<u>congenial</u>	Suitable to your needs- T.L.Peacock. <i>Two congenial spirits united by mutual confidence and reciprocal virtues.</i>
<u>empathetic</u>	Showing an ability to understand and share the feelings of another. <i>She s compassionate and empathetic towards her daughter.</i>
empathy	Understanding and entering into another's feelings.
<u>forgiving</u>	Ready and willing to forgive. <i>Perry is surprisingly forgiving of his stepfather.</i>
<u>generosity</u>	Acting generously. <i>I was overwhelmed by the generosity of friends and neighbours.</i>
goodness	That which is pleasing or valuable or useful. <i>A belief in the basic goodness of mankind.</i>
goodwill	An intangible asset valued according to the advantage or reputation a business has acquired (over and above its tangible assets). <i>The scheme is dependent on goodwill between the two sides.</i>
hangdog	Frightened into submission or compliance. <i>The hangdog and shamefaced air of the retreating enemy.</i>
harmonious	Exhibiting equivalence or correspondence among constituents of an entity or between different entities. <i>Harmonious music.</i>
<u>kindly</u>	Pleasant and agreeable. <i>Kindly breeze.</i>
kindness	The quality of being warmhearted and considerate and humane and sympathetic. <i>He thanked them for their kindness and support.</i>
merciful	(of an event) coming as a mercy; bringing someone relief from something unpleasant. <i>Our merciful king.</i>
<u>mercy</u>	Compassion or forgiveness shown towards someone whom it is within one's power to punish or harm. <i>His death was in a way a mercy.</i>
<u>pathetic</u>	Arousing pity, especially through vulnerability or sadness. <i>His ball control was pathetic.</i>

- pathos** A quality that arouses emotions (especially pity or sorrow).
*The actor injects his customary humour and **pathos** into the role.*
- pity** Feel sorrow for the misfortunes of.
*What a **pity** we can't be friends.*
- regretful** Feeling or showing regret.
***Regretful** over mistakes she had made.*
- ruth** United States professional baseball player famous for hitting home runs (1895-1948).
- selflessness** The quality of unselfish concern for the welfare of others.
*A noble act of **selflessness**.*
- sentimentality** Exaggerated and self-indulgent tenderness, sadness, or nostalgia.
*There are passages which verge on **sentimentality**.*
- sympathy** An inclination to support or be loyal to or to agree with an opinion.
*The two of them were in close **sympathy**.*
