Align oneself with a group or a way of thinking.  
***Align** the sheets of paper on the table.*

<b>back</b>	Cause to travel backward. <i>Over 97 per cent <b>backed</b> the changes.</i>
<b>be compassionate towards</b>	Work in a specific place, with a specific subject, or in a specific function.
<b>be in favour of</b>	Be priced at.
<b>be in sympathy</b>	Spend or use time.
<b>be sorry for</b>	Happen, occur, take place.
<b>be sympathetic towards</b>	Represent, as of a character on stage.
<b>be well disposed to</b>	Form or compose.
<b>commend</b>	Present as suitable for approval or acceptance recommend. <i>He was <b>commended</b> by the judge for his courageous actions.</i>
<b>commiserate</b>	Express or feel sympathy or pity; sympathize. <i>She did not exult in her rival's fall but on the contrary <b>commiserated</b> her.</i>
<b>empathise</b>	Be understanding of.
<b>empathize</b>	Understand and share the feelings of another. <i>Counsellors need to be able to <b>empathize</b> with people.</i>
<b>encourage</b>	Spur on. <i>His financial success <b>encouraged</b> him to look for a wife.</i>
<b>favour</b>	Consider as the favorite. <i>Natural selection has <b>favoured</b> bats.</i>
<b>feel for</b>	Pass one's hands over the sexual organs of.
<b>feel sorry for</b>	Have a feeling or perception about oneself in reaction to someone's behavior or attitude.
<b>go along</b>	Be or continue to be in a certain condition.
<b>offer condolences to</b>	Propose a payment.
<b>pity</b>	Feel sorrow for the misfortunes of. <i>I could see from their faces that they pitied me.</i>
<b>show compassion for</b>	Be or become visible or noticeable.
<b>show concern</b>	Give evidence of, as of records.
<b>show interest</b>	Take (someone) to their seats, as in theaters or auditoriums.
<b>show sympathy for</b>	Provide evidence for.
<b>side with</b>	Take sides for or against siding against the current candidate.

<b>support</b>	Support materially or financially. <i>The evidence <b>supports</b> the defendant.</i>
<b>sympathise</b>	To feel or express sympathy or compassion.
<b>understand</b>	Be understanding of. <i>I don't <b>understand</b> the idea.</i>

<b>apprehend</b>	Anticipate with dread or anxiety. <i>He is a man that <b>apprehends</b> death no more dreadfully but as a drunken sleep.</i>
<b>assimilate</b>	Take in and understand fully (information or ideas). <i>Marie tried to <b>assimilate</b> the week's events.</i>
<b>aural</b>	Of or pertaining to hearing or the ear. <i>Information held in written <b>aural</b> or visual form.</i>
<b>cognizance</b>	Range of what one can know or understand. <i>The Renaissance <b>cognizance</b> of Greece was limited.</i>
<u><b>commiserate</b></u>	Express or feel sympathy or pity; sympathize. <i>She went over to <b>commiserate</b> with Rose on her unfortunate circumstances.</i>
<b>comprehend</b>	To become aware of through the senses. <i>A divine order <b>comprehending</b> all men.</i>
<u><b>comprehension</b></u>	Inclusion. <i>He was famous for his <b>comprehension</b> of American literature.</i>
<u><b>construe</b></u>	Make sense of; assign a meaning to. <i>His words could hardly be <b>construed</b> as an apology.</i>
<b>edify</b>	Instruct or improve (someone) morally or intellectually. <i>Rachel had edified their childhood with frequent readings from Belloc.</i>
<b>empathize</b>	Understand and share the feelings of another. <i>Counsellors need to be able to <b>empathize</b> with people.</i>

<b>enlighten</b>	Give (someone) greater knowledge and understanding about a subject or situation. <i>The sun <b>enlightened</b> some such clouds near him.</i>
<b>eureka</b>	A town in northwest California on an arm of the Pacific Ocean.
<b>experience</b>	Undergo or live through a difficult experience. <i>She spoke from <b>experience</b>.</i>
<b>grasp</b>	The act of grasping. <i>Edward <b>grasped</b> her by the wrist.</i>
<b>intuitively</b>	Without conscious reasoning; instinctively. <i>He knows <b>intuitively</b> how to calm me.</i>
<b>know</b>	The fact of being aware of information that is known to few people. <i>I <b>know</b> of one local who shot himself.</i>
<b>perceivable</b>	Capable of being perceived especially by sight or hearing. <i><b>Perceivable</b> through the mist.</i>
<b>perceive</b>	Become aware or conscious of (something); come to realize or understand. <i>If Guy does not <b>perceive</b> himself as disabled nobody else should.</i>
<b>perception</b>	The ability to see, hear, or become aware of something through the senses. <i>Hollywood's <b>perception</b> of the tastes of the American public.</i>
<b>perceptual</b>	Relating to the ability to interpret or become aware of something through the senses. <i>A patient with <b>perceptual</b> problems who cannot judge distances.</i>
<b>realize</b>	Convert into cash; of goods and property. <i>The stage designs have been beautifully <b>realized</b>.</i>
<b>recognizable</b>	Easily perceived; easy to become aware of. <i>This situation produces <b>recognizable</b> stress symptoms.</i>
<b>recognize</b>	Identify (someone or something) from having encountered them before; know again. <i>Julia hardly <b>recognized</b> Jill when they met.</i>
<b>savvy</b>	Know or understand. <i>Many of us pride ourselves on being <b>savvy</b> enough to spot a fake.</i>
<b>sensate</b>	Having physical sensation. <i>The <b>sensate</b> world.</i>
<b>sentience</b>	The faculty through which the external world is apprehended. <i>Gave <b>sentience</b> to slugs and newts.</i>

- translate** Restate (words) from one language into another language.  
*He **translates** for the U N.*
- translation** (mathematics) a transformation in which the origin of the coordinate system is moved to another position but the direction of each axis remains the same.  
*The **translation** of research findings into clinical practice.*
- understand** Be understanding of.  
*She did not **understand** her husband.*
- understandable** Able to be understood.  
*Though his accent was strange the words were perfectly **understandable**.*
