## Symphony as a Noun

### Definitions of "Symphony" as a noun

According to the [Oxford Dictionary of English](#), “symphony” as a noun can have the following definitions:

- *A large orchestra; can perform symphonies.*
- *An orchestral interlude in a large-scale vocal work.*
- *Something regarded as a composition of different elements.*
- *A long and complex sonata for symphony orchestra.*
- *An elaborate musical composition for full orchestra, typically in four movements, at least one of which is traditionally in sonata form.*



## Synonyms of "Symphony" as a noun (10 Words)

<b>arrangement</b>	The act of arranging and adapting a piece of music. <i>Mozart's symphonies in <b>arrangements</b> for cello and piano.</i>
<b>creation</b>	The action of investing someone with a title of nobility. <i>Edward's generosity extended beyond the <b>creation</b> of earls.</i>
<b>musical work</b>	A play or film whose action and dialogue is interspersed with singing and dancing.
<b>oeuvre</b>	A work of art, music, or literature. <i>He studied the entire Wagnerian <b>oeuvre</b>.</i>
<b>opus</b>	An artistic work, especially one on a large scale. <i>He was writing an <b>opus</b> on Mexico.</i>
<b>philharmonic</b>	A large orchestra; can perform symphonies.
<b>piece</b>	A portion of an object or of material, produced by cutting, tearing, or breaking the whole. <i>A <b>piece</b> of luggage.</i>

**symphony orchestra** A long and complex sonata for symphony orchestra.

**work** A place where work is done.  
A **work** of fiction.

**work of art** The occupation for which you are paid.

## Associations of "Symphony" (30 Words)

<b>alto</b>	A singer whose voice lies in the alto clef. <i><b>Alto</b> clarinet or recorder.</i>
<b>aria</b>	An elaborate song for solo voice.
<b>cantata</b>	A musical composition for voices and orchestra based on a religious text.
<u><b>choir</b></u>	Sing in a choir. <i>A church <b>choir</b>.</i>
<b>choral</b>	Engaged in or concerned with singing. <i>A <b>choral</b> scholar.</i>
<b>chorale</b>	A musical composition consisting of or resembling a harmonized version of a chorale.
<u><b>concert</b></u>	A musical performance given in public, typically by several performers or of several compositions. <i>They found direct evidence of <b>concert</b> of action.</i>
<b>concerto</b>	A musical composition for a solo instrument or instruments accompanied by an orchestra, especially one conceived on a relatively large scale.
<b>contralto</b>	A singer with a contralto voice. <i>She sang in a high <b>contralto</b>.</i>
<u><b>ensemble</b></u>	The coordination between performers executing an ensemble passage. <i>A Bulgarian folk <b>ensemble</b>.</i>
<b>hymn</b>	Praise by singing a hymn. <i>The joys of domesticity were being <b>hymned</b> in magazines.</i>
<b>jazz</b>	A style of theatrical dance performed to jazz or popular music. <i>Don t give me any of that <b>jazz</b>.</i>
<b>madrigal</b>	Sing madrigals. <i>The group was <b>madrigaling</b> beautifully.</i>
<b>music</b>	Music the sounds produced by singers or musical instruments or reproductions of such sounds. <i>He devoted his life to <b>music</b>.</i>
<b>musical</b>	Fond of or skilled in music. <i>A <b>musical</b> comedy.</i>
<b>oratorio</b>	A musical composition for voices and orchestra based on a religious text.
<b>orchestra</b>	The part of a theatre where the orchestra plays typically in front of the stage and on a lower level.

<b>orchestration</b>	The planning or coordination of the elements of a situation to produce a desired effect, especially surreptitiously. <i>Prokofiev's mastery of <b>orchestration</b>.</i>
<b>overture</b>	A tentative suggestion designed to elicit the reactions of others. <i>The <b>overture</b> to Mozart's Don Giovanni.</i>
<b>performance</b>	A display of exaggerated behaviour or a process involving a great deal of unnecessary time and effort; a fuss. <i>Unit trust <b>performance</b>.</i>
<b>philharmonic</b>	Devoted to or appreciative of music. <i>The most <b>philharmonic</b> ear is at times deeply affected by a simple air.</i>
<b>piano</b>	(used chiefly as a direction or description in music) soft; in a quiet, subdued tone. <i>The <b>piano</b> passages in the composition.</i>
<b>rehearsal</b>	(psychology) a form of practice; repetition of information (silently or aloud) in order to keep it in short-term memory. <i>He missed too many <b>rehearsals</b>.</i>
<b>rhapsody</b>	An epic poem adapted for recitation. <i>Rhapsodies of praise.</i>
<b>rondo</b>	A musical form that is often the last movement of a sonata.
<b><u>serenade</u></b>	Entertain someone with a serenade. <i>She was <b>serenaded</b> by her admirers.</i>
<b>singing</b>	The act of singing vocal music. <i>The cries of laughter from children are a pleasant counterpoint to the <b>singing</b> of blackbirds.</i>
<b>sonata</b>	A composition for an instrumental soloist often with a piano accompaniment typically in several movements with one or more in sonata form.
<b>song</b>	A musical composition suggestive of a song. <i>A pop <b>song</b>.</i>
<b>violin</b>	A stringed musical instrument of treble pitch played with a horsehair bow The classical European violin was developed in the 16th century It has four strings and a body of characteristic rounded shape narrowed at the middle and with two f shaped soundholes.
