## Synchronize as a Verb

### Definitions of "Synchronize" as a verb

According to the [Oxford Dictionary of English](#), “synchronize” as a verb can have the following definitions:

- *Make (motion picture sound) exactly simultaneous with the action.*
- *Adjust (a clock or watch) to show the same time as another.*
- *Coordinate; combine.*
- *Cause to occur or operate at the same time or rate.*
- *Occur at the same time or rate.*
- *Cause (a set of data or files) to remain identical in more than one location.*
- *Happen at the same time.*
- *Arrange or represent events so that they co-occur.*
- *Make synchronous and adjust in time or manner.*
- *Operate simultaneously.*
- *Cause to indicate the same time or rate.*
- *Agree with something else.*

<b>adjust</b>	Place in a line or arrange so as to be parallel or straight. <i>A single control <b>adjusts</b> the water flow.</i>
<b>balance</b>	Bring into balance or equilibrium. <i>The law requires the council to <b>balance</b> its books each year.</i>
<b>be concurrent</b>	To remain unmolested, undisturbed, or uninterrupted — used only in infinitive form.
<b>be simultaneous</b>	Form or compose.
<b><u>coexist</u></b>	Coexist peacefully as of nations. <i>The task of diplomacy was to help different states to <b>coexist</b>.</i>
<b><u>coincide</u></b>	Be present at the same place and at the same time. <i>Our views on this matter <b>coincided</b>.</i>
<b>coinciding</b>	Go with, fall together.
<b>contemporise</b>	Happen at the same time.

<b>contemporize</b>	To regard (a person or thing) as belonging to the same era or period as another. Also: to synchronize (a thing) with a particular action, event, etc. Frequently with with (formerly also † unto).
<b>control</b>	Exercise authoritative control or power over. <b>Control</b> your anger.
<b>happen at the same time</b>	Chance to be or do something, without intention or causation.
<b>happen simultaneously</b>	Chance to be or do something, without intention or causation.
<b>happen together</b>	Come into being; become reality.
<b>manage</b>	Be the manager of a sports team or a performer. We <b>manage</b> our cash extremely well.
<b><u>modulate</u></b>	Adjust the pitch, tone, or volume of. <b>Modulate</b> the melody.
<b>occur at the same time</b>	Come to pass.
<b>occur simultaneously</b>	Come to one's mind; suggest itself.
<b>occur together</b>	To be found to exist.
<b>set</b>	Put or set seeds seedlings or plants into the ground. <b>Set</b> this poem to music.
<b><u>sync</u></b>	Synchronize. The flash needs to be <b>synced</b> to your camera.
<b>synchronise</b>	Happen at the same time.
<b><u>synchronized</u></b>	Cause to indicate the same time or rate.
<b><u>tune</u></b>	Tell (something) to (someone). The suspension was <b>tuned</b> for a softer ride.

<b>concurrent</b>	Occurring or operating at the same time. <i>There are three <b>concurrent</b> art fairs around the city.</i>
<b>concurrently</b>	At the same time; simultaneously. <i><b>Concurrently</b> with the conference an exhibition of things associated with Rutherford was held.</i>
<b><u>contemporaneous</u></b>	Of the same period. <i>Pythagoras was <b>contemporaneous</b> with Buddha.</i>
<b><u>contemporary</u></b>	A person of nearly the same age as another. <i>This series of paintings is <b>contemporary</b> with other works in an early style.</i>
<b><u>cooperative</u></b>	Involving the joint activity of two or more. <i>We run the agency as a workers <b>cooperative</b>.</i>
<b><u>equalize</u></b>	Make uniform in application or effect. <i>Morgan <b>equalized</b> ten minutes into the second half.</i>
<b><u>equate</u></b>	(of one thing) be the same as or equivalent to (another). <i>You cannot <b>equate</b> success in financial matters with greed.</i>
<b><u>identical</u></b>	Being the exact same one; not any other. <i><b>Identical</b> twins are monovular.</i>
<b><u>latest</u></b>	The most recent news or fashion. <i>The very <b>latest</b> scientific discoveries.</i>
<b>liken</b>	Consider or describe as similar, equal, or analogous. <i>Racism is <b>likened</b> to a contagious disease.</i>
<b><u>modern</u></b>	Belonging to the modern era since the Middle Ages. <i><b>Modern</b> European history.</i>
<b>now</b>	Without delay or hesitation; with no time intervening. <i>What do you want <b>now</b>.</i>
<b>oscillate</b>	Move or swing from side to side regularly. <i>The grain pan near the front of the combine <b>oscillates</b> back and forth.</i>
<b>recent</b>	Approximately the last 10,000 years. <i>A <b>recent</b> edition of the newspaper.</i>
