Definitions of "Synchronize" as a verb

According to the [Oxford Dictionary of English](#), “synchronize” as a verb can have the following definitions:

- *Make (motion picture sound) exactly simultaneous with the action.*
- *Adjust (a clock or watch) to show the same time as another.*
- *Coordinate; combine.*
- *Cause to occur or operate at the same time or rate.*
- *Occur at the same time or rate.*
- *Cause (a set of data or files) to remain identical in more than one location.*
- *Happen at the same time.*
- *Arrange or represent events so that they co-occur.*
- *Make synchronous and adjust in time or manner.*
- *Operate simultaneously.*
- *Cause to indicate the same time or rate.*
- *Agree with something else.*



Synonyms of "Synchronize" as a verb (23 Words)

adjust	Place in a line or arrange so as to be parallel or straight. <i>A single control adjusts the water flow.</i>
balance	Bring into balance or equilibrium. <i>The law requires the council to balance its books each year.</i>
be concurrent	To remain unmolested, undisturbed, or uninterrupted — used only in infinitive form.
be simultaneous	Form or compose.
<u>coexist</u>	Coexist peacefully as of nations. <i>The task of diplomacy was to help different states to coexist.</i>
<u>coincide</u>	Be present at the same place and at the same time. <i>Our views on this matter coincided.</i>
coinciding	Go with, fall together.
contemporise	Happen at the same time.

contemporize	To regard (a person or thing) as belonging to the same era or period as another. Also: to synchronize (a thing) with a particular action, event, etc. Frequently with with (formerly also † unto).
control	Exercise authoritative control or power over. Control your anger.
happen at the same time	Chance to be or do something, without intention or causation.
happen simultaneously	Chance to be or do something, without intention or causation.
happen together	Come into being; become reality.
manage	Be the manager of a sports team or a performer. We manage our cash extremely well.
<u>modulate</u>	Adjust the pitch, tone, or volume of. Modulate the melody.
occur at the same time	Come to pass.
occur simultaneously	Come to one's mind; suggest itself.
occur together	To be found to exist.
set	Put or set seeds seedlings or plants into the ground. Set this poem to music.
<u>sync</u>	Synchronize. The flash needs to be synced to your camera.
synchronise	Happen at the same time.
<u>synchronized</u>	Cause to indicate the same time or rate.
<u>tune</u>	Tell (something) to (someone). The suspension was tuned for a softer ride.

<u>coincidence</u>	The temporal property of two things happening at the same time. <i>The interval determining the coincidence gate is adjustable.</i>
coincident	In agreement or harmony. <i>A series of coincident events.</i>
<u>coincidental</u>	Resulting from a coincidence; happening by chance. <i>It s convenient that his plan is coincidental with the group s closure.</i>

<u>contemporaneous</u>	Of the same period. <i>Pythagoras was contemporaneous with Buddha.</i>
<u>contemporary</u>	A person of nearly the same age as another. <i>This series of paintings is contemporary with other works in an early style.</i>
<u>cooperative</u>	Involving the joint activity of two or more. <i>We run the agency as a workers cooperative.</i>
<u>equalize</u>	Make uniform in application or effect. <i>Morgan equalized ten minutes into the second half.</i>
<u>equate</u>	(of one thing) be the same as or equivalent to (another). <i>You cannot equate success in financial matters with greed.</i>
<u>identical</u>	Being the exact same one; not any other. <i>Identical twins are monovular.</i>
<u>latest</u>	The most recent news or fashion. <i>The very latest scientific discoveries.</i>
liken	Consider or describe as similar, equal, or analogous. <i>Racism is likened to a contagious disease.</i>
<u>modern</u>	Belonging to the modern era since the Middle Ages. <i>Modern European history.</i>
now	Without delay or hesitation; with no time intervening. <i>What do you want now.</i>
oscillate	Move or swing from side to side regularly. <i>The grain pan near the front of the combine oscillates back and forth.</i>
