<b>community</b>	A group of people living together and practising common ownership. <i>The gay <b>community</b> in London.</i>
<b>company</b>	A social or business visitor. <i>The house was filled with <b>company</b> when I arrived.</i>
<b>concern</b>	A matter of interest or importance to someone. <i>A racially integrated business <b>concern</b>.</i>
<u><a href="#">consortium</a></u>	The right of association and companionship with one's husband or wife. <i>The amount awarded for loss of <b>consortium</b> must be included.</i>
<u><a href="#">coterie</a></u>	An exclusive circle of people with a common purpose. <i>A <b>coterie</b> of friends and advisers.</i>
<b>crime syndicate</b>	An evil act not necessarily punishable by law.
<b>enterprise</b>	Readiness to embark on bold new ventures. <i>A state owned <b>enterprise</b>.</i>
<b>family</b>	People descended from a common ancestor. <i>The cabbage <b>family</b>.</i>
<b>firm</b>	The members of a business organization that owns or operates one or more establishments.
<b>fraternity</b>	A group of people sharing a common profession or interests. <i>The ideals of liberty equality and <b>fraternity</b>.</i>
<u><a href="#">guild</a></u>	A group of species that have similar requirements and play a similar role within a community.
<b>industry</b>	The people or companies engaged in a particular kind of commercial enterprise. <i>The car <b>industry</b>.</i>

<b>institution</b>	A well-established and familiar person or custom. <i>City <b>institutions</b>.</i>
<b>league</b>	The contest for the championship of a league. <i>The two men were not in the same <b>league</b>.</i>
<b>lodge</b>	A small (rustic) house used as a temporary shelter. <i>A hunting <b>lodge</b>.</i>
<b>mob</b>	A disorderly crowd of people. <i>My <b>mob</b> travelled and traded with other people.</i>
<b>operation</b>	The performance of some composite cognitive activity an operation that affects mental contents. <i>They had to consolidate their <b>operations</b>.</i>
<b>order</b>	An institution founded by a monarch along the lines of a medieval crusading monastic order for the purpose of honouring meritorious conduct. <i>The company's products were in such demand that they got more <b>orders</b> than their call center could handle.</i>

<b>incorporation</b>	Consolidating two or more things; union in (or into) one body. <i>The City Council opposed all new <b>incorporations</b>.</i>
<b>integrate</b>	Become one become integrated. <i>The students at this school <b>integrate</b> immediately despite their different backgrounds.</i>
<b>integration</b>	The finding of an integral or integrals. <i><b>Integration</b> is the best hope for both black and white Americans.</i>
<b>mediate</b>	Connected indirectly through another person or thing involving an intermediate agency. <i>The disease spread by <b>mediate</b> as well as direct contact.</i>
<b>meld</b>	A thing formed by melding a combination. <i>A <b>meld</b> of many contributions.</i>
<b>merge</b>	Blend or cause to blend gradually into something else so as to become indistinguishable from it. <i>We <b>merged</b> our resources.</i>
<b>reunify</b>	Unify again, as of a country. <i>Will Korea <b>reunify</b>.</i>
<b>solidify</b>	Make solid or more solid cause to solidify. <i>Social and political pressures helped to <b>solidify</b> national identities.</i>
<b>synthesis</b>	The tendency in a language to use inflected forms rather than word order to express grammatical structure. <i>The ideology represented a <b>synthesis</b> of certain ideas.</i>
