### Definitions of "Synergy" as a noun

According to the [Oxford Dictionary of English](#), “synergy” as a noun can have the following definitions:

- *The interaction or cooperation of two or more organizations, substances, or other agents to produce a combined effect greater than the sum of their separate effects.*
- *The working together of two things (muscles or drugs for example) to produce an effect greater than the sum of their individual effects.*

### accord

A written agreement between two states or sovereigns.  
*A peace **accord**.*

### **association**

The process or state of becoming a subordinate member of an organization.  
*Many close **associations** with England.*

### **collaboration**

Something produced in collaboration with someone.  
*He faces charges of **collaboration**.*

### compromise

An agreement or settlement of a dispute that is reached by each side making concessions.  
*The secret of a happy marriage is **compromise**.*

### concord

A treaty.  
*A **concord** was to be drawn up.*

### **concurrence**

The temporal property of two things happening at the same time.  
*Delays can be avoided by arriving at political **concurrence** at the start.*

<b>coopetition</b>	Collaboration between business competitors, in the hope of mutually beneficial results.
<b><u>coordination</u></b>	The skillful and effective interaction of movements. <i>Changing from one foot position to another requires <b>coordination</b> and balance.</i>
<b>give and take</b>	The elasticity of something that can be stretched and returns to its original length.
<b>joint action</b>	The point of connection between two bones or elements of a skeleton (especially if it allows motion).
<b><u>liaison</u></b>	Introduction of a consonant between a word that ends in a vowel and another that begins with a vowel, as in English law and order. <i>He s our <b>liaison</b> with a number of interested parties.</i>
<b>partnership</b>	The number of runs added by a pair of batsmen before one of them is dismissed or the innings ends. <i>She will be eligible for a <b>partnership</b> after a few years.</i>
<b>synergism</b>	The working together of two things (muscles or drugs for example) to produce an effect greater than the sum of their individual effects.
<b>teamwork</b>	The combined action of a group, especially when effective and efficient. <i>It will take money good planning and above all <b>teamwork</b>.</i>
<b>understanding</b>	An informal or unspoken agreement or arrangement. <i>He wrote with <b>understanding</b> and affection of the people of Dent.</i>
<b><u>unity</u></b>	Each of the three dramatic principles requiring limitation of the supposed time of a drama to that occupied in acting it or to a single day unity of time use of one scene throughout unity of place and concentration on the development of a single plot unity of action. <i>He took measures to insure the territorial <b>unity</b> of Croatia.</i>
<b>working together</b>	A mine or quarry that is being or has been worked.

<b>activation</b>	The action or process of making something active or operative. <i>The constant <b>activation</b> of the vibrating alert is running the batteries down.</i>
<b>alive</b>	Continuing in existence or use. <i>The tradition was still <b>alive</b>.</i>
<b>biomass</b>	Organic matter used as a fuel, especially in a power station for the generation of electricity.
<b>calorimeter</b>	A measuring instrument that determines quantities of heat.
<b><u>clout</u></b>	A long distance shot that hits a clout. <i>I gave him a <b>clout</b> on his nose.</i>
<b>coltish</b>	Energetic but awkward in one's movements or behaviour. <i>Their impossibly <b>coltish</b> legs.</i>

<b>digestive</b>	A food, drink, or medicine that aids or promotes the digestion of food. <i><b>Digestive</b> disorders.</i>

<b>effect</b>	An impression (especially one that is artificial or contrived). <i><b>Effect</b> a change.</i>
<b>electrolysis</b>	Chemical decomposition produced by passing an electric current through a liquid or solution containing ions.
<b>frolicsome</b>	Given to merry frolicking. <i><b>Frolicsome</b> students celebrated their graduation with parties and practical jokes.</i>
<b>influence</b>	Have and exert influence or effect. <i>He was a bad <b>influence</b> on the children.</i>
<b>invigorate</b>	Make lively. <i>The cold water <b>invigorated</b> him.</i>
<b>irrepressible</b>	Not able to be controlled or restrained. <i>An <b>irrepressible</b> rogue.</i>
<b>isotherm</b>	A line on a map connecting points having the same temperature at a given time or on average over a given period.
<b>isothermal</b>	Of a process or change taking place at constant temperature. <i>The cells remained approximately <b>isothermal</b> during freezing.</i>
<b>leverage</b>	Provide with leverage. <i><b>Leverage</b> the money that is already available.</i>
<b>magnetism</b>	The branch of science that studies magnetism. <i>His personal <b>magnetism</b> attracted men to the brotherhood.</i>
<b>mettle</b>	The courage to carry on. <i>The team showed their true <b>mettle</b> in the second half.</i>
<b>powerhouse</b>	An electrical generating station. <i>She appears to be an intellectual <b>powerhouse</b>.</i>
<b>spent</b>	Drained of energy or effectiveness; extremely tired; completely exhausted. <i>A <b>spent</b> matchstick.</i>
<b>stamina</b>	The ability to sustain prolonged physical or mental effort. <i>Their secret is <b>stamina</b> rather than speed.</i>
<b>substation</b>	A small post office, for example one situated within a larger shop.
<b>vehemence</b>	The property of being wild or turbulent. <i>The <b>vehemence</b> of his denial.</i>
<b>vehement</b>	Characterized by great force or energy. <i><b>Vehement</b> criticism.</i>
<b>vigor</b>	Forceful exertion.
<b>vim</b>	Energy; enthusiasm. <i>In his youth he was full of <b>vim</b> and vigour.</i>

virility

The masculine property of being capable of copulation and procreation.  
*Great importance is placed on a man s **virility**.*

vitality

The state of being strong and active; energy.  
*The **vitality** of a seed.*
