<b>accordingly</b>	In a way that is appropriate to the particular circumstances. <i>Continued to have severe headaches and <b>accordingly</b> returned to the doctor.</i>
<b>after</b>	At a later or future time afterwards. <i>He was sorry in <b>after</b> years.</i>
<b>badly</b>	With great intensity bad is a nonstandard variant for badly. <i>The buildings were <b>badly</b> shaken.</i>
<b>certify</b>	Declare legally insane. <i>The Law Society will <b>certify</b> that the sum charged is fair and reasonable.</i>
<a href="#"><u>consequently</u></a>	As a consequence. <i>He had good reason to be grateful for the opportunities which they had made available to him and which <b>consequently</b> led to the good position he now held.</i>
<b>enable</b>	Make (a device or system) operational; activate. <i>Each of them has wheels to <b>enable</b> easy transportation.</i>
<b>enabling</b>	Providing legal power or sanction. <i>An <b>enabling</b> resolution.</i>
<a href="#"><u>ensuing</u></a>	Occurring afterwards or as a result. <i><b>Ensuing</b> events confirmed the prediction.</i>
<b>facilitate</b>	Make (an action or process) easy or easier. <i>You could <b>facilitate</b> the process by sharing your knowledge.</i>
<b>farther</b>	To or at a greater extent or degree or a more advanced stage further is used more often than farther in this abstract sense. <i><b>Farther</b> down the corridor.</i>
<a href="#"><u>hence</u></a>	From that fact or reason or as a result used to introduce a logical conclusion hence adv from this place. <i><b>Hence</b> be gone.</i>

<b><u>henceforth</u></b>	From this or that time on. <i><b>Henceforth</b> she will be known as Mrs Smith.</i>
<b>hereby</b>	(formal) by means of this. <i>All such warranties are <b>hereby</b> excluded.</i>
<b>hitherto</b>	Until now or until the point in time under discussion. <i><b>Hitherto</b> part of French West Africa Benin achieved independence in 1960.</i>
<b>later</b>	At some eventual time in the future. <i>He s going to the store but he ll be back here <b>later</b>.</i>
<b>pluperfect</b>	The pluperfect tense. <i>He spoke with <b>pluperfect</b> precision.</i>
<b>really</b>	Used as intensifiers real is sometimes used informally for really rattling is informal. <i>I <b>really</b> want to go.</i>
<b><u>shortly</u></b>	In a short time; soon. <i>The new database will <b>shortly</b> be available for consultation.</i>
<b><u>so</u></b>	Used to introduce a logical conclusion from that fact or reason or as a result. <i>Help without which he would not have done <b>so</b> well.</i>
<b>sometime</b>	Former. <i>You must come and have supper <b>sometime</b>.</i>
<b>subsequence</b>	The state of following something, especially as a result or effect. <i>An affair which appeared in due <b>subsequence</b> in the newspapers.</i>
<b>subsequently</b>	Happening at a time subsequent to a reference time. <i>The officer decided to stop and <b>subsequently</b> made an arrest.</i>
<b><u>terribly</u></b>	In a terrible manner. <i>She sings <b>terribly</b>.</i>
<b><u>then</u></b>	At that time. <i>Well that s okay <b>then</b>.</i>
<b><u>there</u></b>	To or toward that place; away from the speaker. <i>You can take it from <b>there</b>.</i>
<b>thereby</b>	By that means; as a result of that. <i>Students perform in hospitals <b>thereby</b> gaining a deeper awareness of the therapeutic power of music.</i>
<b>thereof</b>	From that circumstance or source. <i>The member state or a part <b>thereof</b>.</i>

From that fact or reason or as a result used to introduce a logical conclusion thus adv in the way indicated thusly is a nonstandard variant.

**truly**

To the fullest degree; genuinely or properly.  
*Why cannot all masters be served **truly**.*

**very**

Used as intensifiers; `real' is sometimes used informally for `really';  
`rattling' is informal.  
*The **very** best quality.*
