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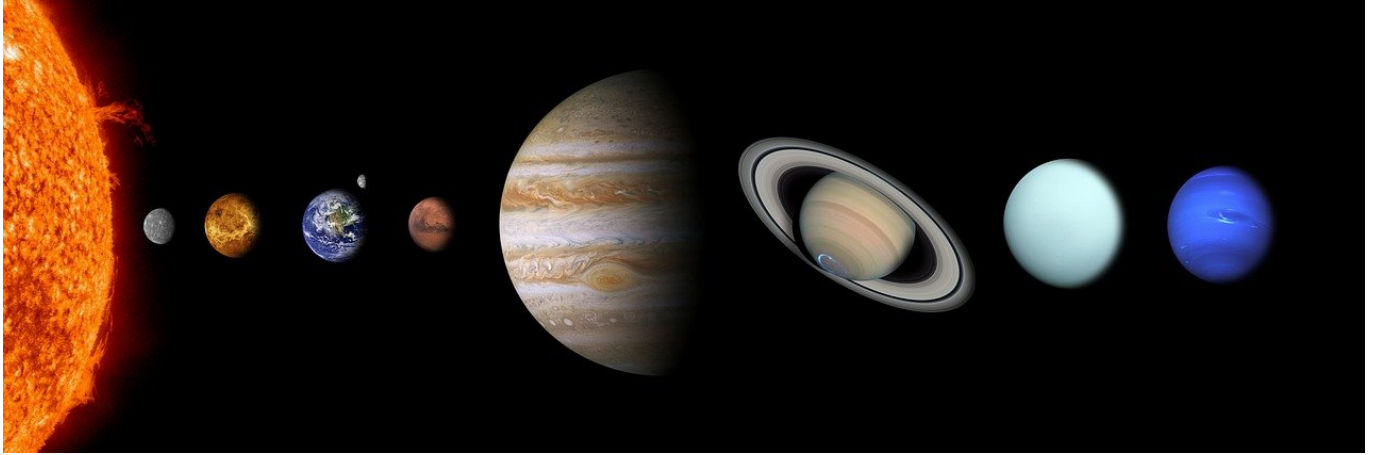

## **Systemic as an Adjective**

### **Definitions of "Systemic" as an adjective**

According to the [Oxford Dictionary of English](#), “systemic” as an adjective can have the following definitions:

- *Denoting the part of the circulatory system concerned with the transport of oxygen to and carbon dioxide from the body in general, especially as distinct from the pulmonary part concerned with the transport of oxygen from and carbon dioxide to the lungs.*
- *Relating to a system, especially as opposed to a particular part.*
- *(of an insecticide, fungicide, or similar substance) entering the plant via the roots or shoots and passing through the tissues.*
- *Affecting an entire system.*

- constitutional** Constitutional in the structure of something especially your physical makeup.

- constructional** Relating to the creation or arrangement of something abstract.

<b><u>aegis</u></b>	The protection, backing, or support of a particular person or organization. <i>The negotiations were conducted under the <b>aegis</b> of the UN.</i>
<b>affect</b>	Touch the feelings of; move emotionally. <i>The medicine <b>affects</b> my heart rate.</i>
<b>consequence</b>	A result or effect, typically one that is unwelcome or unpleasant. <i>Abrupt withdrawal of drug treatment can have serious <b>consequences</b>.</i>
<b><u>decisive</u></b>	Unmistakable. <i>Cast the <b>decisive</b> vote.</i>
<b><u>dramatic</u></b>	Sensational in appearance or thrilling in effect. <i>The <b>dramatic</b> arts.</i>
<b>effect</b>	A physical phenomenon, typically named after its discoverer. <i>The <b>effects</b> of sleep loss.</i>



<b>heavily</b>	Slowly as if burdened by much weight. <i>It is a burden that weighs <b>heavily</b> on his shoulders.</i>
<b>holistic</b>	Characterized by the belief that the parts of something are intimately interconnected and explicable only by reference to the whole.
<b>impinge</b>	Impinge or infringe upon. <i>This <b>impinges</b> on my rights as an individual.</i>
<b>implication</b>	A logical relation between propositions p and q of the form 'if p then q'; if p is true then q cannot be false. <i>His resignation had political <b>implications</b>.</i>
<b>impression</b>	An impressionistic portrayal of a person. <i>Police issued an artist's <b>impression</b> of the attacker.</i>
<b>incommensurate</b>	Not corresponding in size or degree or extent. <i>Man's influence on the earth's surface seems <b>incommensurate</b> with his scale.</i>
<b>influence</b>	Have and exert influence or effect. <i>The institute has considerable <b>influence</b> with teachers.</i>
<b>influential</b>	An influential person. <i>An <b>influential</b> newspaper.</i>
<b>integrated</b>	(of an institution, body, etc.) desegregated, especially racially. <i>Society as an <b>integrated</b> whole.</i>
<b>leverage</b>	Supplement with leverage. <i>The right wing had lost much of its political <b>leverage</b> in the Assembly.</i>
<b>methodical</b>	Done according to a systematic or established procedure. <i>A <b>methodical</b> scholar.</i>
<b>militate</b>	Have force or influence; bring about an effect or change. <i>These fundamental differences will <b>militate</b> against the two communities coming together.</i>
<b>moderating</b>	Lessening in intensity or strength.
<b>musicology</b>	The scholarly and scientific study of music.
<b>orderly</b>	Charged with the conveyance or execution of orders. <i>An <b>orderly</b> arrangement of objects.</i>
<b>organized</b>	Able to plan one's activities efficiently. <i>His life was almost too <b>organized</b>.</i>
<b>perilously</b>	In a way that is full of danger or risk. <i>Houses perched <b>perilously</b> on craggy outposts.</i>
<b>planned</b>	Planned in advance. <i>The <b>planned</b> outlays for new equipment.</i>

- repercussion** The recoil of something after impact.  
*His declaration had unforeseen **repercussions**.*
- result** Have as a result or residue.

- synergy** The interaction or cooperation of two or more organizations,
