Definitions of "Tab" as a noun

- *A small flap or strip of material attached to or projecting from something, used to hold, fasten, or manipulate it, or for identification and information.*
- *Sensationalist journalism.*
- *A dose of medicine in the form of a small pellet.*
- *The bill in a restaurant.*
- *A second or further document or page that can be opened on a spreadsheet or web browser.*
- *A cigarette.*
- *A short strip of material attached to or projecting from something in order to facilitate opening or identifying or handling it.*
- *A marking on the collar distinguishing an officer of high rank or (formerly) a staff officer.*
- *A tally of items ordered in a bar or restaurant.*
- *A strip or ring of metal attached to the top of a canned drink and pulled to open the*

can.

- A part of a control surface, typically hinged, that modifies the action or response of the surface.
- The key on a typewriter or a word processor that causes a tabulation.
- A restaurant bill.

account	A short account of the news. <i>He gave an inaccurate account of the plot to kill the president.</i>
bill	A poster or handbill. <i>He paid his bill and left.</i>
cancer stick	Any malignant growth or tumor caused by abnormal and uncontrolled cell division; it may spread to other parts of the body through the lymphatic system or the blood stream.
<u>charge</u>	The price charged for some article or service. <i>The newspaper published charges that Jones was guilty of drunken driving.</i>

check	A move by which a piece or pawn directly attacks the opponent's king and by which the king may be checkmated. <i>A campaign calling for regular checks on gas appliances.</i>
chit	A dismissive term for a girl who is immature or who lacks respect. <i>She was incensed that this chit of a girl should dare to make a fool of her in front of the class.</i>
cig	A cigarette.
ciggy	A cigarette.
coffin nail	Box in which a corpse is buried or cremated.
flap	The motion made by flapping up and down. <i>He wrote on the flap of the envelope.</i>
invoice	A list of goods sent or services provided, with a statement of the sum due for these; a bill.
label	A string of characters used to refer to a particular instruction in a program. <i>The artists and repertoire department of a recording label is responsible for finding new talent.</i>
lappet	Medium sized hairy moths larvae are lappet caterpillars.
list of charges	A database containing an ordered array of items (names or topics).
loop	An intrauterine device in the shape of a loop. <i>He's no longer in the loop.</i>
lozenge	A small medicinal tablet originally in the shape of a lozenge taken for sore throats and dissolved in the mouth. <i>Throat lozenges.</i>
note of charges	High status importance owing to marked superiority.
pill	An oral contraceptive in pill form. <i>Is she on the pill.</i>
reckoning	A person's opinion or judgement. <i>The sixth or by another reckoning eleventh Earl of Mar.</i>
smoke	Tobacco leaves that have been made into a cylinder. <i>His dreams all turned to smoke.</i>
statement	An official account of facts, views, or plans, especially one for release to the media. <i>This is correct as a statement of fact.</i>
tab key	Sensationalist journalism.
tablet	A dose of medicine in the form of a small pellet. <i>Ecstasy tablets.</i>

tabloid	A newspaper having pages half the size of those of the average broadsheet, typically popular in style and dominated by sensational stories. <i>The tabloid press.</i>
tag	A label associated with something for the purpose of identification. <i>He took off his identity tag and inserted it into a machine.</i>
tally	An account kept by means of a tally. <i>Their first tally came in the 3rd inning.</i>
tube	The inner tube of a bicycle tyre. <i>A plastic tube is connected to the tap and the beer is ready to be pulled.</i>
yellow journalism	Yellow color or pigment; the chromatic color resembling the hue of sunflowers or ripe lemons.

- *The collar has a tab with a button hole.*

- *The filing cards were organized by cards having indexed tabs.*
- *Files with a red tab will be stored separately.*
- *The waiter brought three drinks and a new tab.*
- *Bobby had told the barman to put everything on the tab.*
- *Pull the tab to open the can.*

bookmark A record of the address of a website, file, or other data made to enable quick access in future.

catalog Make a catalogue compile a catalogue.
*He is **cataloguing** his photographic negatives.*

catalogue	Enter an item in a catalogue. <i>The report catalogues dangerous work practices in the company.</i>
checklist	A list of items required, things to be done, or points to be considered, used as a reminder.
discography	All of a performer's or composer's recordings considered as a body of work. <i>Jazz fans direct their intellectual energy to discography.</i>
guiding	Showing the way by conducting or leading; imposing direction on. <i>A guiding principle.</i>
headline	Provide a newspaper page or a story with a headline. <i>Nirvana headlined the 1992 Reading Festival.</i>
index	Adjust through indexation. <i>The hundred shares index closed down 9 3.</i>
indicant	A thing which indicates something. <i>Symptoms are the prime indicants of disease.</i>
indication	A symptom that suggests certain medical treatment is necessary. <i>The visit was an indication of the improvement in relations between the countries.</i>
inventory	Making an itemized list of merchandise or supplies on hand. <i>They stopped selling in exact sizes in order to reduce inventory.</i>
item	Also Philip Guedalla used when listing or enumerating items. <i>An item of clothing.</i>
key	Provide with a key. <i>There were two keys to the cupboard.</i>
label	Attach a tag or label to. <i>She labelled the parcels neatly writing the addresses in capital letters.</i>
lean	Cause to lean or incline. <i>He leaned his rifle against the wall.</i>
list	Include or enter in a list. <i>I have listed four reasons below.</i>
listing	An entry on an official register of securities accepted for trading and quotation on a stock exchange.
mark	Insert punctuation marks into. <i>The owner s mark was on all the sheep.</i>
necrology	A notice of someone's death; usually includes a short biography.
newsprint	Cheap, low-quality absorbent printing paper made from coarse wood pulp and used chiefly for newspapers.

note	A written sign representing the pitch and duration of a musical note. <i>He noted down her address on a piece of paper.</i>
page	Contact as with a pager or by calling somebody's name over a P A system. <i>A text file reader enables you to page through the author's text file using indexes.</i>
payroll	The total amount of wages paid by a company. <i>There are just three employees on the payroll.</i>
<u>register</u>	Put one's name in a register as a guest in a hotel. <i>The electroscope was too insensitive to register the tiny changes.</i>
<u>roster</u>	Place on or assign according to a duty roster. <i>A cluster of outstanding players on the club's roster.</i>
tabloid	Newspaper with half-size pages. <i>The tabloid press.</i>
<u>tag</u>	Attach a tag or label to. <i>He took off his identity tag and inserted it into a machine.</i>
<u>ticket</u>	Provide with a ticket for passage or admission. <i>Passengers can now get electronically ticketed.</i>
tilt	A combat between two mounted knights tilting against each other with blunted lances. <i>Tilting the camera causes convergence of upright lines.</i>
