Synonyms of "Tacit" as an adjective (4 Words)

implicit Implied though not directly expressed; inherent in the nature of something.

Implicit trust.

implied Suggested but not directly expressed; implicit.

She was aware of his **implied** criticism.

Having a frequency below or above the range of human audibility.

The witness remained silent.

understood
The understood provisos of a custody agreement.

Usage Examples of "Tacit" as an adjective

- A tacit agreement.
- Your silence may be taken to mean tacit agreement.



Associations of "Tacit" (30 Words)

Ready to accept something without protest, or to do what someone

acquiescent else wants.

His **acquiescent** mood.

calmly In a sedate manner.

People living in the area reacted **calmly** to the incident.

An absence of strong winds or rain.

<u>calmness</u> This relative *calmness* ended at around 7 a m when the wind picked

up speed.

Agreement on a secret plot.

connivance This infringement of the law had taken place with the **connivance**

of officials.

Marked by calm self-control (especially in trying circumstances);

coolheaded unemotional.

Stayed **coolheaded** in the crisis.

defiance Intentionally contemptuous behavior or attitude.

The demonstration was held in **defiance** of official warnings.

dumb Make dumb or unheard silence.

She stood **dumb** while he poured out a stream of abuse.

hush Become quiet or quieter.

Management took steps to **hush** up the dangers.

Always to be found in; essentially connected with.

There was **implicit** criticism in his voice.

inarticulate Unable to express one's ideas or feelings clearly or easily.

Fay gave a faint **inarticulate** cry.

inaudible Impossible to hear; imperceptible by the ear.

An **inaudible** conversation.

incommunicado Without the means or right to communicate.

They were separated and detained **incommunicado**.

Muffle the sound of a musical instrument especially by the use of a

mute mute.

Harry sat **mute** his cheeks burning resentfully.

Silent or very quiet.

noiseless

The cycle is a **noiseless** form of transport.

quiescent Not active or activated.

A **quiescent** tumor.



With little or no activity or no agitation quiet is a nonstandard

variant for quietly. quiet

Ill have a **quiet** word with him.

The trait of being uncommunicative; not volunteering anything more

reticence than necessary.

The traditional emotional **reticence** of the British.

Cool and formal in manner. reticent

She was extremely **reticent** about her personal affairs.

Characterized by a lack of openness (especially about one's actions secretiveness

or purposes.

The absence of mental stress or anxiety. serenity

An oasis of **serenity** amidst the bustling city.

(of a person) not prone to speak much; taciturn. silent

A **silent** dog whistle.

Unable to speak, especially as the temporary result of shock or

strong emotion. **speechless**

Speechless with shock.

Calmness without winds. stillness

Absolute **stillness** greeted our gaze.

An untroubled state; free from disturbances. **tranguility**

tranquilize Make calm or still.

uncharacteristically In uncharacteristic manner.

He hesitated uncharacteristically.

Unwilling to talk or impart information.

uncommunicative He had always been quiet and **uncommunicative** having few

friends.

Not conspicuous or attracting attention. unobtrusive

The service was **unobtrusive** and efficient.

Very difficult to pronounce correctly. unutterable

I felt an **unutterable** fool.

(of a play, book, or other work) without words or speech. wordless

A largely **wordless** engaging performance.
