Tacit as an Adjective

Definitions of "Tacit" as an adjective

According to the [Oxford Dictionary of English](#), “tacit” as an adjective can have the following definitions:

- *Understood or implied without being stated.*
- *Implied by or inferred from actions or statements.*

Synonyms of "Tacit" as an adjective (4 Words)

implicit	Implied though not directly expressed; inherent in the nature of something. <i>Implicit</i> trust.
implied	Suggested but not directly expressed; implicit. <i>She was aware of his implied criticism.</i>
silent	Having a frequency below or above the range of human audibility. <i>The witness remained silent.</i>
understood	Implied by or inferred from actions or statements. <i>The understood provisos of a custody agreement.</i>

Usage Examples of "Tacit" as an adjective

- *A tacit agreement.*
- *Your silence may be taken to mean tacit agreement.*

Associations of "Tacit" (30 Words)

acquiescent	Ready to accept something without protest, or to do what someone else wants. <i>His acquiescent mood.</i>
calmly	In a sedate manner. <i>People living in the area reacted calmly to the incident.</i>
<u>calmness</u>	An absence of strong winds or rain. <i>This relative calmness ended at around 7 a m when the wind picked up speed.</i>
connivance	Agreement on a secret plot. <i>This infringement of the law had taken place with the connivance of officials.</i>
coolheaded	Marked by calm self-control (especially in trying circumstances); unemotional. <i>Stayed coolheaded in the crisis.</i>
<u>defiance</u>	Intentionally contemptuous behavior or attitude. <i>The demonstration was held in defiance of official warnings.</i>
dumb	Make dumb or unheard silence. <i>She stood dumb while he poured out a stream of abuse.</i>
<u>hush</u>	Become quiet or quieter. <i>Management took steps to hush up the dangers.</i>
<u>implicit</u>	Always to be found in; essentially connected with. <i>There was implicit criticism in his voice.</i>
inarticulate	Unable to express one's ideas or feelings clearly or easily. <i>Fay gave a faint inarticulate cry.</i>
inaudible	Impossible to hear; imperceptible by the ear. <i>An inaudible conversation.</i>
incommunicado	Without the means or right to communicate. <i>They were separated and detained incommunicado.</i>
mute	Muffle the sound of a musical instrument especially by the use of a mute. <i>Harry sat mute his cheeks burning resentfully.</i>
noiseless	Silent or very quiet. <i>The cycle is a noiseless form of transport.</i>
quiescent	Not active or activated. <i>A quiescent tumor.</i>

quiet	With little or no activity or no agitation quiet is a nonstandard variant for quietly. <i>I ll have a quiet word with him.</i>
reticence	The trait of being uncommunicative; not volunteering anything more than necessary. <i>The traditional emotional reticence of the British.</i>
<u>reticent</u>	Cool and formal in manner. <i>She was extremely reticent about her personal affairs.</i>
secretiveness	Characterized by a lack of openness (especially about one's actions or purposes).
<u>serenity</u>	The absence of mental stress or anxiety. <i>An oasis of serenity amidst the bustling city.</i>
<u>silent</u>	(of a person) not prone to speak much; taciturn. <i>A silent dog whistle.</i>
<u>speechless</u>	Unable to speak, especially as the temporary result of shock or strong emotion. <i>Speechless with shock.</i>
<u>stillness</u>	Calmness without winds. <i>Absolute stillness greeted our gaze.</i>
<u>tranquility</u>	An untroubled state; free from disturbances.
tranquilize	Make calm or still.
uncharacteristically	In uncharacteristic manner. <i>He hesitated uncharacteristically.</i>
uncommunicative	Unwilling to talk or impart information. <i>He had always been quiet and uncommunicative having few friends.</i>
<u>unobtrusive</u>	Not conspicuous or attracting attention. <i>The service was unobtrusive and efficient.</i>
unutterable	Very difficult to pronounce correctly. <i>I felt an unutterable fool.</i>
wordless	(of a play, book, or other work) without words or speech. <i>A largely wordless engaging performance.</i>
