## Tacit as an Adjective

### Definitions of "Tacit" as an adjective

According to the [Oxford Dictionary of English](#), “tacit” as an adjective can have the following definitions:

- *Understood or implied without being stated.*
- *Implied by or inferred from actions or statements.*

### Synonyms of "Tacit" as an adjective (4 Words)

<a href="#">implicit</a>	Implied though not directly expressed; inherent in the nature of something. <b><i>Implicit</i></b> trust.
<b>implied</b>	Suggested but not directly expressed; implicit. <i>She was aware of his <b>implied</b> criticism.</i>
<a href="#">silent</a>	Having a frequency below or above the range of human audibility. <i>The witness remained <b>silent</b>.</i>
<a href="#">understood</a>	Implied by or inferred from actions or statements. <i>The <b>understood</b> provisos of a custody agreement.</i>

### Usage Examples of "Tacit" as an adjective

- *A tacit agreement.*
- *Your silence may be taken to mean tacit agreement.*

## Associations of "Tacit" (30 Words)

<b>acquiescent</b>	Ready to accept something without protest, or to do what someone else wants. <i>His <b>acquiescent</b> mood.</i>
<b>calmly</b>	In a sedate manner. <i>People living in the area reacted <b>calmly</b> to the incident.</i>
<u><b>calmness</b></u>	An absence of strong winds or rain. <i>This relative <b>calmness</b> ended at around 7 a m when the wind picked up speed.</i>
<b>connivance</b>	Agreement on a secret plot. <i>This infringement of the law had taken place with the <b>connivance</b> of officials.</i>
<b>coolheaded</b>	Marked by calm self-control (especially in trying circumstances); unemotional. <i>Stayed <b>coolheaded</b> in the crisis.</i>
<u><b>defiance</b></u>	Intentionally contemptuous behavior or attitude. <i>The demonstration was held in <b>defiance</b> of official warnings.</i>
<b>dumb</b>	Make dumb or unheard silence. <i>She stood <b>dumb</b> while he poured out a stream of abuse.</i>
<u><b>hush</b></u>	Become quiet or quieter. <i>Management took steps to <b>hush</b> up the dangers.</i>
<u><b>implicit</b></u>	Always to be found in; essentially connected with. <i>There was <b>implicit</b> criticism in his voice.</i>
<b>inarticulate</b>	Unable to express one's ideas or feelings clearly or easily. <i>Fay gave a faint <b>inarticulate</b> cry.</i>
<b>inaudible</b>	Impossible to hear; imperceptible by the ear. <i>An <b>inaudible</b> conversation.</i>
<b>incommunicado</b>	Without the means or right to communicate. <i>They were separated and detained <b>incommunicado</b>.</i>
<b>mute</b>	Muffle the sound of a musical instrument especially by the use of a mute. <i>Harry sat <b>mute</b> his cheeks burning resentfully.</i>
<b>noiseless</b>	Silent or very quiet. <i>The cycle is a <b>noiseless</b> form of transport.</i>
<b>quiescent</b>	Not active or activated. <i>A <b>quiescent</b> tumor.</i>

<b>quiet</b>	With little or no activity or no agitation quiet is a nonstandard variant for quietly. <i>I ll have a <b>quiet</b> word with him.</i>
<b>reticence</b>	The trait of being uncommunicative; not volunteering anything more than necessary. <i>The traditional emotional <b>reticence</b> of the British.</i>
<u><b>reticent</b></u>	Cool and formal in manner. <i>She was extremely <b>reticent</b> about her personal affairs.</i>
<b>secretiveness</b>	Characterized by a lack of openness (especially about one's actions or purposes).
<u><b>serenity</b></u>	The absence of mental stress or anxiety. <i>An oasis of <b>serenity</b> amidst the bustling city.</i>
<u><b>silent</b></u>	(of a person) not prone to speak much; taciturn. <i>A <b>silent</b> dog whistle.</i>
<u><b>speechless</b></u>	Unable to speak, especially as the temporary result of shock or strong emotion. <i><b>Speechless</b> with shock.</i>
<u><b>stillness</b></u>	Calmness without winds. <i>Absolute <b>stillness</b> greeted our gaze.</i>
<u><b>tranquility</b></u>	An untroubled state; free from disturbances.
<b>tranquilize</b>	Make calm or still.
<b>uncharacteristically</b>	In uncharacteristic manner. <i>He hesitated <b>uncharacteristically</b>.</i>
<b>uncommunicative</b>	Unwilling to talk or impart information. <i>He had always been quiet and <b>uncommunicative</b> having few friends.</i>
<u><b>unobtrusive</b></u>	Not conspicuous or attracting attention. <i>The service was <b>unobtrusive</b> and efficient.</i>
<b>unutterable</b>	Very difficult to pronounce correctly. <i>I felt an <b>unutterable</b> fool.</i>
<b>wordless</b>	(of a play, book, or other work) without words or speech. <i>A largely <b>wordless</b> engaging performance.</i>
