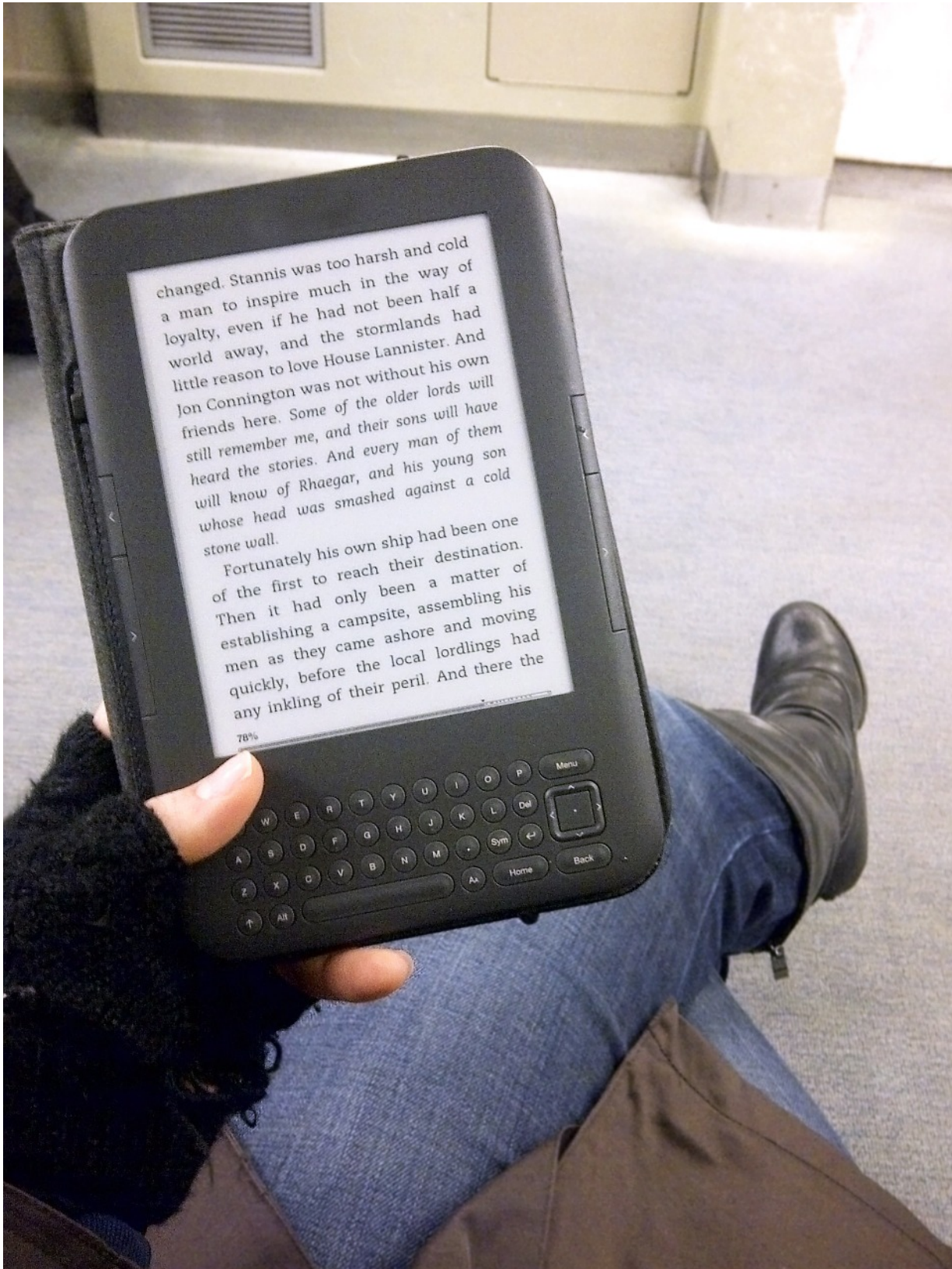

## Tactile as an Adjective

### Definitions of "Tactile" as an adjective

According to the [Oxford Dictionary of English](#), “tactile” as an adjective can have the following definitions:

- *(of a person) given to touching other people, especially as an unselfconscious expression of sympathy or affection.*
- *Designed to be perceived by touch.*
- *Of or relating to or proceeding from the sense of touch.*
- *Of or connected with the sense of touch.*
- *Perceptible by touch or apparently so; tangible.*
- *Producing a sensation of touch.*



## Synonyms of "Tactile" as an adjective (11 Words)

<b>concrete</b>	Existing in a material or physical form; not abstract. <i><b>Concrete</b> objects such as trees.</i>
<b>corporeal</b>	Having material or physical form or substance - Benjamin Jowett. <i><b>Corporeal</b> suffering.</i>
<b>haptic</b>	Relating to the sense of touch, in particular relating to the perception and manipulation of objects using the senses of touch and proprioception. <i><b>Haptic</b> feedback devices create the illusion of substance and force within the virtual world.</i>
<b>material</b>	Having material or physical form or substance Benjamin Jowett. <i>Political conflict lacks mathematical or <b>material</b> certitude.</i>
<b>palpable</b>	Capable of being perceived; especially capable of being handled or touched or felt. <i>The air was warm and close <b>palpable</b> as cotton.</i>
<b>physical</b>	Impelled by physical force especially against resistance. <i>A reflex response to <b>physical</b> stimuli.</i>
<b>real</b>	Coinciding with reality. <i>This isn't my <b>real</b> reason for coming.</i>
<b>solid</b>	Of good quality and condition solidly built. <i>A <b>solid</b> block of wood.</i>
<b>substantial</b>	Important in material or social terms; wealthy. <i>Won by a <b>substantial</b> margin.</i>
<b>tactual</b>	Producing a sensation of touch. <i>The <b>tactual</b> luxury of stroking silky human hair.</i>
<b>touchable</b>	Perceptible by the senses especially the sense of touch.



## Usage Examples of "Tactile" as an adjective

- *Tactile qualities.*
- *She had a distinct, almost tactile memory of the girl fleeing.*
- *Tactile exhibitions help blind people enjoy the magic of sculpture.*
- *A tactile reflex.*
- *Vocal and visual signals become less important as tactile signals intensify.*
- *He took her in his arms—he's a very tactile person.*

<b><u>input</u></b>	Enter (data or a program) into a computer. <i>Test results can be <b>inputted</b> by the technician in the laboratory.</i>
<b>intro</b>	An introduction.
<b>lingua</b>	A mobile mass of muscular tissue covered with mucous membrane and located in the oral cavity.
<b>literate</b>	A literate person. <i>Their parents were uneducated and barely <b>literate</b>.</i>
<b>multilingual</b>	In or using several languages. <i>A <b>multilingual</b> dictionary.</i>
<b><u>narrate</u></b>	Narrate or give a detailed account of. <i>The story is <b>narrated</b> by the heroine.</i>
<b><u>oral</u></b>	Of or relating to or affecting or for use in the mouth. <i>The <b>oral</b> cavity.</i>
<b>oratory</b>	A small chapel, especially for private worship. <i>He loved the sound of his own <b>oratory</b>.</i>
<b>pharynx</b>	The part of the alimentary canal immediately behind the mouth in invertebrates.
<b>poliomyelitis</b>	An acute viral disease marked by inflammation of nerve cells of the brain stem and spinal cord.
<b>read</b>	Discover information by reading it in a written or printed source. <i>The article was a very good <b>read</b>.</i>
<b>recitative</b>	A vocal passage of narrative text that a singer delivers with natural rhythms of speech. <i>Singing in <b>recitative</b>.</i>
<b><u>sensation</u></b>	The capacity to have physical sensations. <i>She had the eerie <b>sensation</b> that she was being watched.</i>
<b>sense</b>	Perceive by a sense or senses. <i>She had the <b>sense</b> of being a political outsider.</i>
<b>sinus</b>	An abnormal passage leading from a suppurating cavity to the body surface. <i><b>Sinus</b> tachycardia.</i>
<b><u>spoken</u></b>	Uttered through the medium of speech or characterized by speech; sometimes used in combination. <i>Sharp <b>spoken</b>.</i>
<b>stimulation</b>	Encouragement of something to make it develop or become more active. <i>Ovarian <b>stimulation</b> for in vitro fertilization.</i>
<b><u>throat</u></b>	A thing compared to a throat especially a narrow passage entrance or exit. <i>A gold pendant gleamed at her <b>throat</b>.</i>

- toothache** Pain in a tooth or teeth.  
*I ve got **toothache**.*
- touch** An act of touching someone or something.  
*I didn t play her records or **touch** any of her stuff.*
- unwritten** Based on custom rather than documentation- J.L.T.C.Spence.  
*An **unwritten** law.*
- verbal** A verbal statement containing a damaging admission alleged to have been made to the police and offered as evidence by the prosecution.  
***Verbal** imagery.*
- verbally** Using spoken rather than written communication; orally.  
*She claimed to have been **verbally** abused.*
- vocal** Music intended to be performed by one or more singers, usually with instrumental accompaniment.  
*A playground **vocal** with the shouts and laughter of children.*
