Associations of "Take apart" (30 Words)

acquisition	An asset or object bought or obtained, typically by a library or museum. <i>The acquisition of wealth.</i>
available	(of a person) not otherwise occupied; free to do something. <i>He was not available for comment.</i>
bring	Go or come after and bring or take back. <i>I ll give you an aspirin to bring down your temperature.</i>
broach	Open and start using the contents of (a bottle or other container). <i>He watched a pot boy broach a new cask.</i>
buccaneer	Live like a buccaneer. <i>The company might be a target for an individual buccaneer seeking power and prestige.</i>
by	So as to pass a given point. <i>A car flashed by on the other side of the road.</i>
clutch	A clutch bag. <i>She made a clutch at his body.</i>
confiscate	Take temporary possession of as a security, by legal authority. <i>The police confiscated the stolen artwork.</i>
deprivation	Act of depriving someone of food or money or rights. <i>Sleep deprivation.</i>
deprive	Prevent (a person or place) from having or using something. <i>The Archbishop deprived a considerable number of puritan clergymen.</i>
detached	Separate or disconnected. <i>She may be detached or even unfeeling but at least she s not hypocritically effusive.</i>
dispossess	(in sport) deprive (a player) of the ball. <i>They were dispossessed of lands and properties during the Reformation.</i>

fetch	The action of fetching. <i>That brute Cullam fetched him a wallop.</i>
forfeiture	A penalty for a fault or mistake that involves losing or giving up something. <i>Magistrates ordered the forfeiture of his computer.</i>
grab	Take or grasp suddenly. <i>I ll grab another drink while there s still time.</i>
hold	Have room for hold without crowding. <i>Hold these truths to be self evident.</i>
impoverish	Make (a person or area) poor. <i>The soil was impoverished by annual burning.</i>
inaccessible	Unable to be used. <i>High culture is largely inaccessible to the masses.</i>
individually	Apart from others. <i>Partnerships and individually owned firms.</i>
loot	Steal (goods) in a war, riot, etc. <i>Ten thousand quid is a lot of loot.</i>
private	Concerning things deeply private and personal. <i>The former President is now a private citizen.</i>
ransack	Search (a place or receptacle) thoroughly, especially in such a way as to cause harm. <i>Man has ransacked the planet for fuel.</i>
secluded	(of a place) not seen or visited by many people; sheltered and private. <i>A secluded romantic spot.</i>
seize	Seize and take control without authority and possibly with force take as one s right or possession. <i>The rebels threaten to seize civilian hostages.</i>
separately	Apart from others. <i>They arrived together but left separately.</i>
singly	One by one; one at a time. <i>He talked to the players singly and in groups.</i>
solitary	A recluse or hermit. <i>A solitary retreat.</i>
unavailable	Not able to be used or obtained; not at someone's disposal. <i>The men were unavailable for work.</i>
