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## Associations of "Take in" (30 Words)

<b>accept</b>	Make use of or accept for some purpose. <i>What if Elizabeth <b>accepted</b> Darcy the first time.</i>
<b>acquire</b>	Come into the possession of something concrete or abstract. <i>I <b>acquired</b> a strong aversion to television.</i>
<b>achievement</b>	An ability that has been acquired by training. <i>The <b>achievement</b> of self control.</i>
<b>acquisition</b>	An ability that has been acquired by training. <i>The <b>acquisition</b> of management skills.</i>
<a href="#"><u>admission</u></a>	The fee charged for admission. <i>The evening before her <b>admission</b> to hospital.</i>
<b>bring</b>	Go or come after and bring or take back. <i><b>Bring</b> comments.</i>
<b>broach</b>	Open and start using the contents of (a bottle or other container). <i>He watched a pot boy <b>broach</b> a new cask.</i>
<a href="#"><u>deprivation</u></a>	The lack or denial of something considered to be a necessity. <i>Low wages mean that 3 75 million people suffer serious <b>deprivation</b>.</i>
<a href="#"><u>deprive</u></a>	Take away possessions from someone. <i>The city was <b>deprived</b> of its water supplies.</i>
<b>dispossess</b>	Deprive of the possession of real estate. <i>They were <b>dispossessed</b> of lands and properties during the Reformation.</i>
<b>embrace</b>	The act of clasping another person in the arms (as in greeting or affection).
<b>fetch</b>	The action of fetching. <i>The devil will <b>fetch</b> you.</i>
<b>get</b>	Take vengeance on or get even. <i>We ll <b>get</b> them.</i>
<a href="#"><u>grab</u></a>	Take hold of so as to seize or restrain or stop the motion of. <i>I ll <b>grab</b> another drink while there s still time.</i>

<b>have</b>	Have put someone at a disadvantage in an argument. <i>I don't <b>have</b> any money left.</i>
<b>hold</b>	To close within bounds limit or hold back from movement. <i>The prisoner is on <b>hold</b>.</i>
<b>invulnerable</b>	Immune to attack; impregnable. <i>No state in the region is now <b>invulnerable</b> to attack by another.</i>
<b>loot</b>	Steal (something) from someone. <i>The gang escaped with their <b>loot</b>.</i>
<b>own</b>	Have ownership or possession of. <i>He was reluctant to <b>own</b> that he was indebted.</i>
<b>picking</b>	The act of picking crops or fruit or hops etc. <i>He sent the first <b>picking</b> of berries to the market.</i>
<b>possession</b>	The act of having and controlling property. <i>Fear took <b>possession</b> of my soul.</i>
<b>preferment</b>	The act of preferring. <i>After ordination <b>preferment</b> was fast.</i>
<b>procure</b>	Arrange for sexual partners for others. <i>Food <b>procured</b> for the rebels.</i>
<b>put</b>	Put into a certain place or abstract location. <i>He was <b>put</b> in charge of civil defence.</i>
<b>receptiveness</b>	Willingness or readiness to receive (especially impressions or ideas). <i>This <b>receptiveness</b> is the key feature in oestral behavior enabling natural mating to occur.</i>
<b>resignedly</b>	In a hopeless resigned manner. <i>(of a place of detention) having provisions against the escape of inmates.</i>
<b>secure</b>	<i>A more competitive economy will lead to an increase in <b>secure</b> employment.</i>
<b>unavailable</b>	Not available or accessible or at hand. <i>Fresh milk was <b>unavailable</b> during the emergency.</i>
<b>uninjured</b>	Not injured physically or mentally. <i>They escaped <b>uninjured</b> when their homes were hit.</i>
