acquire	Come into the possession of something concrete or abstract. I <b>acquire</b> d a strong aversion to television.
acquirement	An ability that has been acquired by training. The <b>acquirement</b> of self control.
acquisition	An ability that has been acquired by training. The <b>acquisition</b> of management skills.
admission	The fee charged for admission. The evening before her <b>admission</b> to hospital.
bring	Go or come after and bring or take back. <b>Bring</b> comments.
broach	Open and start using the contents of (a bottle or other container. <i>He watched a pot boy</i> <b>broach</b> <i>a new cask.</i>
<u>deprivation</u>	The lack or denial of something considered to be a necessity. Low wages mean that 3 75 million people suffer serious <b>deprivation</b> .
<u>deprive</u>	Take away possessions from someone. The city was <b>deprive</b> d of its water supplies.
dispossess	Deprive of the possession of real estate. They were <b>dispossess</b> ed of lands and properties during the Reformation.
embracement	The act of clasping another person in the arms (as in greeting or affection
fetch	The action of fetching. The devil will <b>fetch</b> you.
get	Take vengeance on or get even. We ll <b>get</b> them.
<u>grab</u>	Take hold of so as to seize or restrain or stop the motion of. I ll <b>grab</b> another drink while there s still time.



have	Have put someone at a disadvantage in an argument. I don t <b>have</b> any money left.
hold	To close within bounds limit or hold back from movement. <i>The prisoner is on <b>hold</b></i> .
invulnerable	Immune to attack; impregnable. No state in the region is now <b>invulnerable</b> to attack by another.
<u>loot</u>	Steal (something) from someone. The gang escaped with their <b>loot</b> .
<u>own</u>	Have ownership or possession of. He was reluctant to <b>own</b> that he was indebted.
picking	The act of picking crops or fruit or hops etc. <i>He sent the first <b>picking</b> of berries to the market.</i>
possession	The act of having and controlling property. Fear took <b>possession</b> of my soul.
preferment	The act of preferring. <i>After ordination</i> <b>preferment</b> was fast.
procure	Arrange for sexual partners for others. Food <b>procure</b> d for the rebels.
put	Put into a certain place or abstract location. <i>He was <b>put</b> in charge of civil defence.</i>
receptiveness	Willingness or readiness to receive (especially impressions or ideas. <i>This</i> <b>receptiveness</b> <i>is the key feature in oestral behavior enabling natural mating to occur.</i>
resignedly	In a hopeless resigned manner.
<u>secure</u>	(of a place of detention) having provisions against the escape of inmates. A more competitive economy will lead to an increase in <b>secure</b> employment.
unavailable	Not available or accessible or at hand. Fresh milk was <b>unavailable</b> during the emergency.
uninjured	Not injured physically or mentally. They escaped <b>uninjured</b> when their homes were hit.
