accept	Make use of or accept for some purpose. <i>What if Elizabeth accepted Darcy the first time.</i>
acquire	Come into the possession of something concrete or abstract. <i>I acquired a strong aversion to television.</i>
achievement	An ability that has been acquired by training. <i>The achievement of self control.</i>
acquisition	An ability that has been acquired by training. <i>The acquisition of management skills.</i>
<u>admission</u>	The fee charged for admission. <i>The evening before her admission to hospital.</i>
bring	Go or come after and bring or take back. <i>Bring comments.</i>
broach	Open and start using the contents of (a bottle or other container). <i>He watched a pot boy broach a new cask.</i>
<u>deprivation</u>	The lack or denial of something considered to be a necessity. <i>Low wages mean that 3 75 million people suffer serious deprivation.</i>
<u>deprive</u>	Take away possessions from someone. <i>The city was deprived of its water supplies.</i>
dispossess	Deprive of the possession of real estate. <i>They were dispossessed of lands and properties during the Reformation.</i>
embracement	The act of clasping another person in the arms (as in greeting or affection).
fetch	The action of fetching. <i>The devil will fetch you.</i>
get	Take vengeance on or get even. <i>We ll get them.</i>
<u>grab</u>	Take hold of so as to seize or restrain or stop the motion of. <i>I ll grab another drink while there s still time.</i>

have	Have put someone at a disadvantage in an argument. <i>I don't have any money left.</i>
hold	To close within bounds limit or hold back from movement. <i>The prisoner is on hold.</i>
invulnerable	Immune to attack; impregnable. <i>No state in the region is now invulnerable to attack by another.</i>
loot	Steal (something) from someone. <i>The gang escaped with their loot.</i>
own	Have ownership or possession of. <i>He was reluctant to own that he was indebted.</i>
picking	The act of picking crops or fruit or hops etc. <i>He sent the first picking of berries to the market.</i>
possession	The act of having and controlling property. <i>Fear took possession of my soul.</i>
preferment	The act of preferring. <i>After ordination preferment was fast.</i>
procure	Arrange for sexual partners for others. <i>Food procured for the rebels.</i>
put	Put into a certain place or abstract location. <i>He was put in charge of civil defence.</i>
receptiveness	Willingness or readiness to receive (especially impressions or ideas). <i>This receptiveness is the key feature in oestral behavior enabling natural mating to occur.</i>
resignedly	In a hopeless resigned manner. <i>(of a place of detention) having provisions against the escape of inmates.</i>
secure	<i>A more competitive economy will lead to an increase in secure employment.</i>
unavailable	Not available or accessible or at hand. <i>Fresh milk was unavailable during the emergency.</i>
uninjured	Not injured physically or mentally. <i>They escaped uninjured when their homes were hit.</i>
