The action of acquiring something. *The acquirement of self control.* acquirement

The act of contracting or assuming or acquiring possession of something. acquisition

The company intends to grow within itself rather than by **acquisition**.

A decorative pin worn by women. broach

He watched a pot boy **broach** a new cask.

Live like a buccaneer.

Take temporary possession of as a security, by legal authority. confiscate

The government **confiscate**d his property early in the war.

The city was **deprive**d of its water supplies.

Deprive (someone) of land, property, or other possessions. dispossess

They were **dispossess**ed of lands and properties during the Reformation.

The action of fetching. fetch

He ran to **fetch** help.

The action of forfeiting something. forfeit

Those unable to meet their taxes were liable to **forfeit** their estates.

A penalty for a fault or mistake that involves losing or giving up something. forfeiture

Magistrates ordered the **forfeiture** of his computer.

Attract the attention of; make an impression on. grab

The brakes **grab**bed very badly.



have Have or possess either in a concrete or an abstract sense.

**Have** a lover.

hold Have or hold in one s hands or grip.

I **hold** with those who say life is sacred.

impound Place or shut up in a pound.

The customs agents **impound**ed the illegal shipment.

**impoverish** Take away.

The soil was **impoverish**ed by annual burning.

loot Informal terms for money.

Ten thousand quid is a lot of **loot**.

Have something as one s own possess.

I used to design all my own clothes.

The act of picking crops or fruit or hops etc.

**picking**He sent the first **picking** of berries to the market.

Rob a (place) using violence, especially in wartime.

Artworks **pillage**d from churches and museums.

Plunder a town after capture.

**plunder** The contents of the abandoned houses were **plunder**ed by members of the

new regime.

Get by special effort.

**procure**He **procure**d his wife to sign the mandate for the joint account.

ransack Steal goods; take as spoils.

Burglars **ransack**ed her home.

secure (of a place of detention) having provisions against the escape of inmates.

A **secure** hold on her wrist.

Seize and take control without authority and possibly with force take as one

**seize** s right or possession.

Fear **seize**d the prisoners.

**Supplant** Take the place or move into the position of.

The computer has **supplant**ed the slide rule.

Take (a position of power or importance) illegally or by force.

The Hanoverian dynasty had **usurp**ed the Stuarts.
