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Associations of "Take over" (30 Words)

acquisition	An asset or object bought or obtained, typically by a library or museum. <i>The acquisition of wealth.</i>
belongings	Something owned; any tangible or intangible possession that is owned by someone. <i>She didn't have much baggage with her as most of her belongings had been sent ahead by sea.</i>
bring	Bring into a different state. <i>Can I bring my cousin to the dinner.</i>
broach	(of a fish or sea mammal) rise through the water and break the surface. <i>He broached the subject he had been avoiding all evening.</i>
buccaneer	Live like a buccaneer. <i>The company might be a target for an individual buccaneer seeking power and prestige.</i>
confiscate	Take temporary possession of as a security, by legal authority. <i>The government confiscated his property early in the war.</i>
deprivation	The lack or denial of something considered to be a necessity. <i>Deprivation of civil rights.</i>
deprive	Prevent (a person or place) from having or using something. <i>The city was deprived of its water supplies.</i>
dispossess	Deprive (someone) of land, property, or other possessions. <i>They were dispossessed of lands and properties during the Reformation.</i>
extra	Excessive or extravagant. <i>Found some extra change lying on the dresser.</i>
fetch	The action of fetching. <i>He ran to fetch help.</i>

forfeiture	A penalty for a fault or mistake that involves losing or giving up something. <i>Magistrates ordered the forfeiture of his computer.</i>
grab	The act of catching an object with the hands. <i>This story will grab you.</i>
impoverish	Take away. <i>The wars had impoverished him.</i>
loot	Take illegally; of intellectual property. <i>During the earthquake people looted the stores that were deserted by their owners.</i>
outdo	Be or do something to a greater degree. <i>She outdoes all other athletes.</i>
overreach	An injury to a forefoot of a horse resulting from its having overreached. <i>Never lean sideways from a ladder or overreach.</i>
overstep	Be superior or better than some standard. <i>He has overstepped the bounds of acceptable discipline.</i>
pillage	Rob a (place) using violence, especially in wartime. <i>Artworks pillaged from churches and museums.</i>
plethora	An excess of a bodily fluid, particularly blood. <i>A plethora of committees and subcommittees.</i>
ransack	Steal goods; take as spoils. <i>Burglars ransacked her home.</i>
redundance	The attribute of being superfluous and unneeded.
seize	Seize and take control without authority and possibly with force take as one's right or possession. <i>Fear seized the prisoners.</i>
superabundance	A quantity that is more than what is appropriate.
tiredness	Temporary loss of strength and energy resulting from hard physical or mental work. <i>Depression and tiredness caused by overwork.</i>
transcend	Be superior or better than some standard. <i>He doubts that he will ever transcend Shakespeare.</i>
transgress	Spread over land, especially along a subsiding shoreline. <i>Each continent has been transgressed by continental seas.</i>
trespass	Enter someone's land or property without permission. <i>The worst trespass against the goddess Venus is to see her naked and asleep.</i>
