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## Associations of "Take over" (30 Words)

<b>acquisition</b>	An asset or object bought or obtained, typically by a library or museum. <i>The <b>acquisition</b> of wealth.</i>
<b>belongings</b>	Something owned; any tangible or intangible possession that is owned by someone. <i>She didn't have much baggage with her as most of her <b>belongings</b> had been sent ahead by sea.</i>
<b>bring</b>	Bring into a different state. <i>Can I <b>bring</b> my cousin to the dinner.</i>
<b>broach</b>	(of a fish or sea mammal) rise through the water and break the surface. <i>He <b>broached</b> the subject he had been avoiding all evening.</i>
<b>buccaneer</b>	Live like a buccaneer. <i>The company might be a target for an individual <b>buccaneer</b> seeking power and prestige.</i>
<b>confiscate</b>	Take temporary possession of as a security, by legal authority. <i>The government <b>confiscated</b> his property early in the war.</i>
<b>deprivation</b>	The lack or denial of something considered to be a necessity. <i><b>Deprivation</b> of civil rights.</i>
<b>deprive</b>	Prevent (a person or place) from having or using something. <i>The city was <b>deprived</b> of its water supplies.</i>
<b>dispossess</b>	Deprive (someone) of land, property, or other possessions. <i>They were <b>dispossessed</b> of lands and properties during the Reformation.</i>
<b>extra</b>	Excessive or extravagant. <i>Found some <b>extra</b> change lying on the dresser.</i>
<b>fetch</b>	The action of fetching. <i>He ran to <b>fetch</b> help.</i>

<b>forfeiture</b>	A penalty for a fault or mistake that involves losing or giving up something. <i>Magistrates ordered the <b>forfeiture</b> of his computer.</i>
<b>grab</b>	The act of catching an object with the hands. <i>This story will <b>grab</b> you.</i>
<b>impoverish</b>	Take away. <i>The wars had <b>impoverished</b> him.</i>
<b>loot</b>	Take illegally; of intellectual property. <i>During the earthquake people <b>looted</b> the stores that were deserted by their owners.</i>
<b>outdo</b>	Be or do something to a greater degree. <i>She <b>outdoes</b> all other athletes.</i>
<b>overreach</b>	An injury to a forefoot of a horse resulting from its having overreached. <i>Never lean sideways from a ladder or <b>overreach</b>.</i>
<b>overstep</b>	Be superior or better than some standard. <i>He has <b>overstepped</b> the bounds of acceptable discipline.</i>
<b>pillage</b>	Rob a (place) using violence, especially in wartime. <i>Artworks <b>pillaged</b> from churches and museums.</i>
<b>plethora</b>	An excess of a bodily fluid, particularly blood. <i>A <b>plethora</b> of committees and subcommittees.</i>
<b>ransack</b>	Steal goods; take as spoils. <i>Burglars <b>ransacked</b> her home.</i>
<b>redundance</b>	The attribute of being superfluous and unneeded.
<b>seize</b>	Seize and take control without authority and possibly with force take as one's right or possession. <i>Fear <b>seized</b> the prisoners.</i>
<b>superabundance</b>	A quantity that is more than what is appropriate.
<b>tiredness</b>	Temporary loss of strength and energy resulting from hard physical or mental work. <i>Depression and <b>tiredness</b> caused by overwork.</i>
<b>transcend</b>	Be superior or better than some standard. <i>He doubts that he will ever <b>transcend</b> Shakespeare.</i>
<b>transgress</b>	Spread over land, especially along a subsiding shoreline. <i>Each continent has been <b>transgressed</b> by continental seas.</i>
<b>trespass</b>	Enter someone's land or property without permission. <i>The worst <b>trespass</b> against the goddess Venus is to see her naked and asleep.</i>
