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## Associations of "Take responsibility" (30 Words)

<b>acquisition</b>	The buying or obtaining of assets or objects. <i>The company intends to grow within itself rather than by <b>acquisition</b>.</i>
<b>admissible</b>	Deserving to be admitted. <i><b>Admissible</b> evidence.</i>
<b>belongings</b>	Something owned; any tangible or intangible possession that is owned by someone. <i>She didn't have much baggage with her as most of her <b>belongings</b> had been sent ahead by sea.</i>
<b>bring</b>	Go or come after and bring or take back. <i><b>Bring</b> charges.</i>
<b>broach</b>	Bring up a topic for discussion. <i>Boxed wines will remain in good condition for up to four months once <b>broached</b>.</i>
<b>buccaneer</b>	Live like a buccaneer. <i>The company might be a target for an individual <b>buccaneer</b> seeking power and prestige.</i>
<b>clutch</b>	A clutch bag. <i>She <b>clutched</b> my arm when she got scared.</i>
<b>confiscate</b>	Surrendered as a penalty. <i>The government <b>confiscated</b> his property early in the war.</i>
<b>deprivation</b>	A state of extreme poverty. <i>Losing him is no great <b>deprivation</b>.</i>
<b>deprive</b>	Prevent (a person or place) from having or using something. <i>The city was <b>deprived</b> of its water supplies.</i>
<b>dispossess</b>	Deprive of the possession of real estate. <i>A champion of the poor and the <b>dispossessed</b>.</i>
<b>fetch</b>	The action of fetching. <i>Kind offers <b>fetched</b> tears from me.</i>

<b>forfeit</b>	The action of forfeiting something. <i>The loser must pay a <b>forfeit</b>.</i>
<b>forfeiture</b>	The act of losing or surrendering something as a penalty for a mistake or fault or failure to perform etc. <i>Magistrates ordered the <b>forfeiture</b> of his computer.</i>
<b>grab</b>	Get hold of or seize quickly and easily. <i>The brakes <b>grabbed</b> very badly.</i>
<b>hold</b>	A stronghold. <i>The auditorium can t <b>hold</b> more than 500 people.</i>
<b>impossible</b>	Used of persons or their behavior. <i>She was in an <b>impossible</b> situation.</i>
<b>impound</b>	Take temporary possession of as a security, by legal authority. <i>Almost forgotten were the poor unfortunates <b>impounded</b> in the prison.</i>
<b>impoverish</b>	Make (a person or area) poor. <i>The soil was <b>impoverished</b> by annual burning.</i>
<b>loot</b>	Goods or money obtained illegally. <i>A gang <b>looted</b> Rs 1 5 lakh from a passenger.</i>
<b>pillage</b>	Steal (something) using violence, especially in wartime. <i>Artworks <b>pillaged</b> from churches and museums.</i>
<b>plunder</b>	Plunder a town after capture. <i>The contents of the abandoned houses were <b>plundered</b> by members of the new regime.</i>
<b>possess</b>	Have ownership or possession of. <i>He just wanted her to <b>possess</b> her.</i>
<b>ransack</b>	Go through (a place) stealing things and causing damage. <i>Burglars <b>ransacked</b> her home.</i>
<b>rob</b>	Overcharge (someone) for something. <i>He tried with three others to <b>rob</b> a bank.</i>
<b>seize</b>	Seize and take control without authority and possibly with force take as one s right or possession. <i>Fear <b>seized</b> the prisoners.</i>
<b>sequesterate</b>	Take legal possession of (assets) until a debt has been paid or other claims have been met. <i>In November 1956 the property was <b>sequestered</b> by the authorities.</i>
<b>unavailable</b>	Not able to be used or obtained; not at someone's disposal. <i>Material which is <b>unavailable</b> to the researcher.</i>
