acquisition	Something acquired. <i>The child s acquisition of language.</i>
bring	Go or come after and bring or take back. <i>This brings me to the main point.</i>
broach	A decorative pin worn by women. <i>He broached the subject he had been avoiding all evening.</i> Live like a buccaneer.
<u>buccaneer</u>	<i>The company might be a target for an individual buccaneer seeking power and prestige.</i>
<u>cascade</u>	Rush down in big quantities like a cascade. <i>A cascade of pink bougainvillea.</i>
clutch	The pedal operating the clutch in a vehicle. <i>He stood clutching a microphone.</i>
<u>confiscate</u>	Appropriate (something, especially land) to the public treasury as a penalty. <i>The government confiscated his property early in the war.</i>
<u>deprivation</u>	The lack or denial of something considered to be a necessity. <i>Losing him is no great deprivation.</i>
<u>deprive</u>	Take away possessions from someone. <i>The Archbishop deprived a considerable number of puritan clergymen.</i>
dispossess	(in sport) deprive (a player) of the ball. <i>A champion of the poor and the dispossessed.</i>
drop	The act of dropping something. <i>He studied the shapes of low viscosity drops.</i>
fetch	The action of fetching. <i>That air of his always fetches women.</i>
<u>forfeit</u>	The action of forfeiting something. <i>She didn t mind forfeiting an hour in bed to muck out the horses.</i>

forfeiture	A penalty for a fault or mistake that involves losing or giving up something. <i>Magistrates ordered the forfeiture of his computer.</i>
grab	A mechanical device for clutching, lifting, and moving things, especially materials in bulk. <i>How does that grab you.</i>
hold	Hold the attention of. <i>She holds her head high.</i>
impound	Take temporary possession of as a security, by legal authority. <i>It will impound a reservoir 130 miles long.</i>
impoverish	Make (a person or area) poor. <i>The wars had impoverished him.</i>
loot	Informal terms for money. <i>Ten thousand quid is a lot of loot.</i>
own	Have ownership or possession of. <i>He owns three houses in Florida.</i>
picking	The act of picking crops or fruit or hops etc. <i>He sent the first picking of berries to the market.</i>
plunder	Plunder a town after capture. <i>This writer plundered from famous authors.</i>
procure	Obtain (something), especially with care or effort. <i>He haunted railway stations to procure young girls for immoral purposes.</i>
ransack	Search thoroughly. <i>Burglars ransacked her home.</i>
rob	Rip off; ask an unreasonable price. <i>He tried with three others to rob a bank.</i>
seize	Seize and take control without authority and possibly with force take as one's right or possession. <i>The FBI seized the drugs.</i>
unavailable	(of a person) not free to do something; otherwise occupied. <i>Material which is unavailable to the researcher.</i>
waterfall	Relating to or denoting a method of project management that is characterized by sequential stages and a fixed plan of work. <i>Each phase of a waterfall project must be complete prior to moving to the next phase.</i>
