<b>ascend</b>	Become king or queen. <i>She <b>ascended</b> to the throne after the King's death.</i>
<b>ascending</b>	Moving or going or growing upward. <i>Blood pressure in the <b>ascending</b> aorta.</i>
<b>ascent</b>	The act of changing location in an upward direction. <i>The first balloon <b>ascent</b> was in 1783.</i>
<b>boost</b>	Give a boost to be beneficial to. <i>Andy <b>boosted</b> him up high enough to reach the keys.</i>
<b><u>climb</u></b>	An ascent especially of a mountain or hill by climbing. <i>How old will these graduates be before they begin a long <b>climb</b> out of debt.</i>
<b><u>climbing</u></b>	The sport or activity of climbing mountains or cliffs. <i><b>Climbing</b> equipment.</i>
<b><u>elevate</u></b>	Give a promotion to or assign to a higher position. <i>He has <b>elevated</b> bad taste into an art form.</i>
<b>elevator</b>	A muscle whose contraction raises a part of the body. <i>In the <b>elevator</b> she pressed the button for the lobby.</i>
<b>escalator</b>	A clause in a contract that provides for an increase or a decrease in wages or prices or benefits etc. depending on certain conditions (as a change in the cost of living index).
<b><u>hoist</u></b>	Lifting device for raising heavy or cumbersome objects. <i><b>Hoist</b> the bicycle onto the roof of the car.</i>
<b>ladder</b>	With reference to tights or stockings develop or cause to develop a ladder. <i>He climbed the career <b>ladder</b>.</i>
<b>lift</b>	An act of lifting. <i>The best way to <b>lift</b> nations out of poverty is through trade.</i>
<b><u>precipitate</u></b>	A substance precipitated from a solution. <i>The crisis <b>precipitated</b> by Russia's revolution.</i>

<b>promote</b>	Of an additive act as a promoter of a catalyst. <i>I got <b>promoted</b> after many years of hard work.</i>
<b>raise</b>	Multiply a number by itself a specified number of times 8 is 2 raised to the power 3. <i>In late April Henry decided to <b>raise</b> the siege.</i>
<b>rise</b>	Rise in rank or status. <i>They asked for a 10 <b>rise</b> in rates.</i>
<b>risen</b>	Above the horizon. <i>The <b>risen</b> sun.</i>
<b>rising</b>	(of a bird) depicted with the wings open but not fully displayed, as if preparing for flight. <i>The <b>rising</b> fives on the verge of school.</i>
<b>rob</b>	Take something away by force or without the consent of the owner. <i>He tried with three others to <b>rob</b> a bank.</i>
<b>scale</b>	Remove the scales from. <i><b>Scale</b> the gold.</i>
<b>soar</b>	Fly or rise high in the air. <i>The cost of living continued to <b>soar</b>.</i>
<b>soaring</b>	(of a bird) maintaining height in the air without flapping its wings. <i>You may spy bighorn sheep and <b>soaring</b> eagles.</i>
<b>stairs</b>	A flight of stairs or a flight of steps.
<b>stepladder</b>	A folding portable ladder hinged at the top.
<b>underpin</b>	Support with evidence or authority or make more certain or confirm. <i>The theme of honour <b>underpinning</b> the two books.</i>
<b>uphill</b>	Sloping upward. <i>Follow the track <b>uphill</b>.</i>
<b>upstairs</b>	On or to an upper floor of a building. <i>I tiptoed <b>upstairs</b>.</i>
<b>upward</b>	Towards a higher place, point, or level. <i>The cards were face <b>upward</b>.</i>
<b>vertically</b>	At right angles to a horizontal plane; aligned in such a way that the top is directly above the bottom. <i><b>Vertically</b> integrated companies.</i>
<b>zoom</b>	Cause a lens or camera to zoom in or out. <i>The camera <b>zoomed</b> in for a close up of his face.</i>
