| ascending | Moving or going or growing upward. <i>Blood pressure in the ascending aorta.</i> |
| ascent | The act of changing location in an upward direction. <i>The first balloon ascent was in 1783.</i> |
| boost | Give a boost to be beneficial to. <i>Andy boosted him up high enough to reach the keys.</i> |
| <u>climb</u> | An ascent especially of a mountain or hill by climbing. <i>How old will these graduates be before they begin a long climb out of debt.</i> |
| <u>climbing</u> | The sport or activity of climbing mountains or cliffs. <i>Climbing equipment.</i> |
| <u>elevate</u> | Give a promotion to or assign to a higher position. <i>He has elevated bad taste into an art form.</i> |
| elevator | A muscle whose contraction raises a part of the body. <i>In the elevator she pressed the button for the lobby.</i> |
| escalator | A clause in a contract that provides for an increase or a decrease in wages or prices or benefits etc. depending on certain conditions (as a change in the cost of living index). |
| <u>hoist</u> | Lifting device for raising heavy or cumbersome objects. <i>Hoist the bicycle onto the roof of the car.</i> |
| ladder | With reference to tights or stockings develop or cause to develop a ladder. <i>He climbed the career ladder.</i> |
| lift | An act of lifting. <i>The best way to lift nations out of poverty is through trade.</i> |
| <u>precipitate</u> | A substance precipitated from a solution. <i>The crisis precipitated by Russia's revolution.</i> |

| promote | Of an additive act as a promoter of a catalyst. <i>I got promoted after many years of hard work.</i> |
| raise | Multiply a number by itself a specified number of times 8 is 2 raised to the power 3. <i>In late April Henry decided to raise the siege.</i> |
| rise | Rise in rank or status. <i>They asked for a 10 rise in rates.</i> |
| risen | Above the horizon. <i>The risen sun.</i> |
| rising | (of a bird) depicted with the wings open but not fully displayed, as if preparing for flight. <i>The rising fives on the verge of school.</i> |
| rob | Take something away by force or without the consent of the owner. <i>He tried with three others to rob a bank.</i> |
| scale | Remove the scales from. <i>Scale the gold.</i> |
| soar | Fly or rise high in the air. <i>The cost of living continued to soar.</i> |
| soaring | (of a bird) maintaining height in the air without flapping its wings. <i>You may spy bighorn sheep and soaring eagles.</i> |
| stairs | A flight of stairs or a flight of steps. |
| stepladder | A folding portable ladder hinged at the top. |
| underpin | Support with evidence or authority or make more certain or confirm. <i>The theme of honour underpinning the two books.</i> |
| uphill | Sloping upward. <i>Follow the track uphill.</i> |
| upstairs | On or to an upper floor of a building. <i>I tiptoed upstairs.</i> |
| upward | Towards a higher place, point, or level. <i>The cards were face upward.</i> |
| vertically | At right angles to a horizontal plane; aligned in such a way that the top is directly above the bottom. <i>Vertically integrated companies.</i> |
| zoom | Cause a lens or camera to zoom in or out. <i>The camera zoomed in for a close up of his face.</i> |
