Associations of "Taken for granted" (30 Words)

accede	Assume an office or position. <i>I found myself with little choice but to accede.</i>
accept	Make use of or accept for some purpose. <i>What if Elizabeth accepted Darcy the first time.</i>
acknowledge	Accept (someone) to be what is claimed or accept his power and authority. <i>It is important to acknowledge the work of others in one s own writing.</i>
acquisition	The buying or obtaining of assets or objects. <i>Western culture places a high value on material acquisition.</i>
admissible	Acceptable or valid, especially as evidence in a court of law. <i>The tape recording was admissible as evidence.</i>
admit	Declare to be true or admit the existence or reality or truth of. <i>After searching for an hour she finally had to admit defeat.</i>
admittedly	As acknowledged. <i>Admittedly the salary was not wonderful.</i>
agree	Be in accord be in agreement. <i>Everybody agrees that jobs will go.</i>
allow	Allow the other baseball team to score. <i>Lincoln allowed that he himself could never support the man.</i>
broach	Pierce (a cask) to draw out liquid. <i>He broached the subject he had been avoiding all evening.</i>
buccaneer	Live like a buccaneer. <i>The company might be a target for an individual buccaneer seeking power and prestige.</i>
concede	Be willing to concede. <i>All right then she conceded.</i>
concession	A reduction in the price of something for a certain category of person. <i>He got the beer concession at the ball park.</i>

confess	Of a priest listen to the confession of. <i>St Ambrose would weep bitter tears when confessing a sinner.</i>
confiscate	Surrendered as a penalty. <i>The guards confiscated his camera.</i>
deprive	Depose (someone, especially a member of the clergy) from office. <i>The city was deprived of its water supplies.</i>
dispossess	Deprive (someone) of land, property, or other possessions. <i>He dispossessed Hendrie and set off on a solo run.</i>
fetch	The action of fetching. <i>The dog fetched the hat.</i>
forfeit	The action of forfeiting something. <i>She didn't mind forfeiting an hour in bed to muck out the horses.</i>
forfeiture	Something that is lost or surrendered as a penalty. <i>Magistrates ordered the forfeiture of his computer.</i>
get	Take vengeance on or get even. <i>Get an idea.</i>
have	Have put someone at a disadvantage in an argument. <i>How much time have I got for the presentation.</i>
loot	Take illegally; of intellectual property. <i>Tonnes of food aid awaiting distribution had been looted.</i>
realization	A particular series which might be generated by a specified random process. <i>He did not live to see the realization of his dream.</i>
receive	Receive as a retribution or punishment. <i>The impression she received was one of unhurried leisure.</i>
receptiveness	Willingness or readiness to receive (especially impressions or ideas). <i>He was testing the government's receptiveness to reform.</i>
resignedly	In a hopeless resigned manner.
submission	The action of accepting or yielding to a superior force or to the will or authority of another person. <i>The judge halted the trial at the end of the prosecution's submissions.</i>
yield	Produce or generate (a result, gain, or financial return). <i>The Western powers now yielded when they should have resisted.</i>
