## Synonyms of "Taken" as an adjective (1 Word)

**interpreted** Understood in a certain way; made sense of.  
*An open door **interpreted** as an invitation.*

- acquirement** Something acquired, typically a skill.  
*The **acquirement** of self control.*
- acquisition** An ability that has been acquired by training.  
*The child s **acquisition** of language.*
- bring** Go or come after and bring or take back.  
*She **brings** a special atmosphere to our meetings.*
- broach** A decorative pin worn by women.  
*The salmon **broach** then fall to slap the water.*
- buccaneer** Live like a buccaneer.  
*The marauding **buccaneers** who used to terrorize the Mediterranean coasts.*

<b><u>confiscate</u></b>	Take temporary possession of as a security, by legal authority. <i>The police <b>confiscated</b> the stolen artwork.</i>
<b><u>deprivation</u></b>	Act of depriving someone of food or money or rights. <i>Losing him is no great <b>deprivation</b>.</i>
<b><u>deprive</u></b>	Depose (someone, especially a member of the clergy) from office. <i>The city was <b>deprived</b> of its water supplies.</i>
<b>dispossess</b>	Deprive of the possession of real estate. <i>A champion of the poor and the <b>dispossessed</b>.</i>
<b>fetch</b>	The action of fetching. <i>The devil will <b>fetch</b> you.</i>
<b><u>forfeit</u></b>	The action of forfeiting something. <i>His possessions were declared <b>forfeit</b>.</i>
<b>forfeiture</b>	Something that is lost or surrendered as a penalty. <i>Magistrates ordered the <b>forfeiture</b> of his computer.</i>
<b><u>grab</u></b>	Capture the attention or imagination of. <i>She <b>grabbed</b> him by the shirt collar.</i>
<b>have</b>	Have or possess either in a concrete or an abstract sense. <i>Do you <b>have</b> a client named Peters.</i>
<b>hold</b>	Hold the attention of. <i>They <b>hold</b> that all literature is empty of meaning.</i>
<b>impound</b>	Seize and take legal custody of (something, especially a vehicle, goods, or documents) because of an infringement of a law. <i>The customs agents <b>impounded</b> the illegal shipment.</i>
<b>impoverish</b>	Make (a person or area) poor. <i>The wars had <b>impoverished</b> him.</i>
<b><u>loot</u></b>	Steal (goods) in a war, riot, etc. <i>Police confronted the protestors who were <b>looting</b> shops.</i>
<b><u>own</u></b>	Have something as one's own possess. <i>The style had its <b>own</b> charm.</i>
<b>picking</b>	The act of picking crops or fruit or hops etc. <i>He sent the first <b>picking</b> of berries to the market.</i>
<b>pillage</b>	Rob a (place) using violence, especially in wartime. <i>The abbey was plundered and <b>pillaged</b>.</i>
<b><u>plunder</u></b>	Plunder a town after capture. <i>The contents of the abandoned houses were <b>plundered</b> by members of the new regime.</i>

<b>procure</b>	Obtain (someone) as a prostitute for another person. <i>Food <b>procured</b> for the rebels.</i>
<b>ransack</b>	Go through (a place) stealing things and causing damage. <i>Burglars <b>ransacked</b> her home.</i>
<b>secure</b>	Financially safe. <i>Everyone needs to have a home and to feel <b>secure</b> and wanted.</i>
<b>seize</b>	Seize and take control without authority and possibly with force take as one's right or possession. <i>The invaders <b>seized</b> the land and property of the inhabitants.</i>
<b>supplant</b>	Supersede and replace. <i>The computer has <b>supplanted</b> the slide rule.</i>
<b>usurp</b>	Take the place of. <i>The Hanoverian dynasty had <b>usurped</b> the Stuarts.</i>
