- pickings** The act of someone who picks up or takes something.  
*The **pickings** were easy.*
- proceeds** Money obtained from an event or activity.  
***Proceeds** from the event will go to aid the work of the charity.*
- receipts** The act of receiving.
- returns** A reciprocal group action.  
*His gross income was enough that he had to file a tax return.*
- spoils** The act of stripping and taking by force.
- winnings** Something won (especially money).

Lovable especially in a childlike or naive way.  
*I have four **adorable** Siamese cats.*

**[agreeable](#)**

Conforming to your own liking or feelings or nature- Disraeli.  
*A cheerful and **agreeable** companion.*

<b>appealing</b>	Showing or expressing a desire for help or sympathy. <i>An <b>appealing</b> sense of humor.</i>
<b>attractive</b>	Having qualities or features which arouse interest. <i>An <b>attractive</b> village.</i>
<b>cute</b>	Clever or cunning, especially in a self-seeking or superficial way. <i>A child with intolerably <b>cute</b> mannerisms.</i>
<u><b>delightful</b></u>	Causing delight; charming. <i>The comedy was <b>delightful</b>.</i>
<u><b>endearing</b></u>	Inspiring affection. <i>An <b>endearing</b> little grin.</i>
<b>fetching</b>	Very attractive; capturing interest. <i>A <b>fetching</b> new hairstyle.</i>
<b>good-looking</b>	Pleasing in appearance especially by reason of conformity to ideals of form and proportion- Thackeray.
<b>likeable</b>	Easy to like; agreeable. <i>A very <b>likeable</b> young woman.</i>
<b>lovable</b>	Inspiring or deserving love or affection. <i>He has a <b>lovable</b> sweet personality.</i>
<b>lovely</b>	Lovable especially in a childlike or naive way. <i>How <b>lovely</b> to see you.</i>
<u><b>pleasant</b></u>	(of persons) having pleasing manners or behavior. <i>A very <b>pleasant</b> evening.</i>
<b>pleasing</b>	Satisfying or appealing. <i>A <b>pleasing</b> piece of news.</i>
<b>prepossessing</b>	Attractive or appealing in appearance. <i>He was not a <b>prepossessing</b> sight.</i>
<u><b>sweet</b></u>	Having a sweet nature befitting an angel or cherub. <i>The <b>sweet</b> notes of the flute.</i>
<b>winning</b>	Having won. <i>A <b>winning</b> smile.</i>



## Usage Examples of "Taking" as an adjective

- *Something inexpressibly taking in his manner.*
- *He was not a very taking person, she felt.*





## Associations of "Taking" (30 Words)

<b>accomplishment</b>	An activity that a person can do well. <i>The reduction of inflation was a remarkable <b>accomplishment</b>.</i>
<b>achieve</b>	To gain with effort. <i>People striving to <b>achieve</b>.</i>
<b>achievement</b>	The process or fact of achieving something. <i>The <b>achievement</b> of professional recognition.</i>
<b>acquire</b>	Come to have or undergo a change of (physical features and attributes). <i>You must <b>acquire</b> the rudiments of Greek.</i>

<b>attain</b>	To gain with effort. <i>Clarify your objectives and ways of <b>attaining</b> them.</i>
<b>attractive</b>	Pleasing or appealing to the senses. <i>The job is <b>attractive</b> because of the pay.</i>
<b>buy</b>	Be worth or be capable of buying. <i>I can t <b>buy</b> this story.</i>
<b>enchancing</b>	Delightfully charming or attractive. <i><b>Enchancing</b> views.</i>
<b>enthralling</b>	Capturing interest as if by a spell. <i>An <b>enthralling</b> book.</i>
<b>enticing</b>	Highly attractive and able to arouse hope or desire. <i>Difficult to say no to an <b>enticing</b> advertisement.</i>
<b>entrancing</b>	Capturing interest as if by a spell. <i>I find you <b>entrancing</b>.</i>
<b>fetching</b>	Attractive. <i>A <b>fetching</b> little garment of pink satin.</i>
<b>flourishing</b>	Very lively and profitable. <i><b>Flourishing</b> businesses.</i>
<b>industrialist</b>	A person involved in the ownership and management of industry. <i>The exploitation of child labour by nineteenth century <b>industrialists</b>.</i>
<b>intriguing</b>	Capable of arousing interest or curiosity. <i>Our team came up with some most <b>intriguing</b> finds.</i>
<b>inventory</b>	Make a complete list of. <i>In our warehouse you ll find a large <b>inventory</b> of new and used bicycles.</i>
<b>object</b>	Express or raise an objection or protest or criticism or express dissent. <i>Bryant <b>objects</b> this very circumstance to the authenticity of the Iliad.</i>
<b>objective</b>	The objective case. <i>Examine with high power <b>objective</b>.</i>
<b>possession</b>	The state of having, owning, or controlling something. <i>The landlord wishes to gain <b>possession</b> of the accommodation.</i>
<b>profitable</b>	Beneficial; useful. <i>He d had a <b>profitable</b> day.</i>
<b>purchase</b>	Obtain by purchase acquire by means of a financial transaction. <i>The victory was <b>purchased</b> by the death of Rhiwallon.</i>
<b>successful</b>	Accomplishing a desired aim or result. <i>A <b>successful</b> actor.</i>
