<b><u>aptitude</u></b>	Suitability or fitness. <i>Children with an <b>aptitude</b> for painting and drawing.</i>
<b><u>bent</u></b>	A special way of doing something. <i>She had no natural <b>bent</b> for literature.</i>

<b>facility</b>	A place, amenity, or piece of equipment provided for a particular purpose. <i>A cell phone with internet <b>facility</b>.</i>
<b>faculty</b>	A licence or authorization from a Church authority. <i>The vicar introduced certain ornaments without the necessary <b>faculty</b> to do so.</i>
<b>flair</b>	Distinctive and stylish elegance. <i>She dressed with <b>flair</b>.</i>
<b>gift</b>	A natural ability or talent. <i>He has a <b>gift</b> for comedy.</i>
<b>knack</b>	A tendency to do something. <i>He had a special <b>knack</b> for getting into trouble.</i>
<b>natural endowment</b>	A first roll of 7 or 11 that immediately wins the stake.
<b>power</b>	Denoting a sports player team or style of play that makes use of power rather than finesse. <i>Generating <b>power</b> from waste.</i>
<b>technique</b>	A way of carrying out a particular task, especially the execution or performance of an artistic work or a scientific procedure. <i>An established athlete with a very good <b>technique</b>.</i>
<b>touch</b>	An act of touching someone or something. <i>His clearance went directly into <b>touch</b>.</i>

<b>aptness</b>	The quality of being appropriate or suitable. <i>The phrase had considerable <b>aptness</b>.</i>
<b>artistry</b>	A superior skill that you can learn by study and practice and observation. <i>The <b>artistry</b> of the pianist.</i>
<b>brawn</b>	Meat from a pig's or calf's head that is cooked and pressed in a pot with jelly. <i>Commando work required as much brain as <b>brawn</b>.</i>
<b>canny</b>	Showing self-interest and shrewdness in dealing with others. <i><b>Canny</b> investors will switch banks if they think they are getting a raw deal.</i>
<b>capability</b>	A facility on a computer for performing a specified task. <i>A graphics <b>capability</b>.</i>
<b>competence</b>	The legal authority of a court or other body to deal with a particular matter. <i>Courses to improve the <b>competence</b> of staff.</i>
<b>craft</b>	An aircraft or spaceship. <i>A <b>craft</b> fair.</i>
<b>deftness</b>	Skillful performance or ability without difficulty.
<b>deserving</b>	Worthy of being treated in a particular way, typically of being given assistance. <i>A <b>deserving</b> cause.</i>
<b>dexterity</b>	Adroitness in using the hands. <i>His record testifies to a certain <b>dexterity</b> in politics.</i>
<b>dextrous</b>	Skillful in physical movements; especially of the hands.
<b>faculty</b>	A licence or authorization from a Church authority. <i>There were then no tenured women on the <b>faculty</b>.</i>
<b>finesse</b>	Great subtlety and tact in handling or manipulating people or difficult situations. <i>Despite the administration's attempts to <b>finesse</b> its mishaps the public remained wary.</i>
<b>flair</b>	A natural talent. <i>She dressed with <b>flair</b>.</i>
<b>gifted</b>	Endowed with talent or talents. <i>A <b>gifted</b> amateur musician.</i>
<b>gumption</b>	Shrewd or spirited initiative and resourcefulness. <i>The president would hire almost any young man who had the <b>gumption</b> to ask for a job.</i>
<b>ingenuity</b>	The property of being ingenious. <i>The <b>ingenuity</b> of Haydn's scoring.</i>

<b>knack</b>	A tendency to do something. <i>He had a special <b>knack</b> for getting into trouble.</i>
<b>marvel</b>	Be filled with wonder or astonishment. <i>The <b>marvels</b> of technology.</i>
<b>originality</b>	The ability to think independently and creatively. <i>She s a writer of great <b>originality</b>.</i>
<b>potentiality</b>	The possibility of something happening or of someone doing something in the future. <i>The technology is still relatively not well known in spite of its great <b>potentiality</b>.</i>
<b>skill</b>	Train (a worker) to do a particular task. <i>Training firms are already seeing a boost from companies looking to <b>skill</b> employees in cloud technologies.</i>
<b>sleight</b>	The use of dexterity or cunning, especially so as to deceive. <i>Except by <b>sleight</b> of logic the two positions cannot be harmonized.</i>
<b>suitability</b>	The quality of being right or appropriate for a particular person, purpose, or situation. <i>The <b>suitability</b> of residential accommodation varied widely.</i>
<b>tact</b>	Skill and sensitivity in dealing with others or with difficult issues. <i>The inspector broke the news to me with <b>tact</b> and consideration.</i>
<b>talented</b>	Having a natural aptitude or skill for something. <i>A <b>talented</b> young musician.</i>
<b>technique</b>	A way of carrying out a particular task, especially the execution or performance of an artistic work or a scientific procedure. <i>He has excellent <b>technique</b>.</i>
<b>workmanship</b>	The degree of skill with which a product is made or a job done. <i>Cracks on the motorway were caused by poor <b>workmanship</b>.</i>
