- accomplished** Highly skilled.  
*A very elegant and **accomplished** person.*
- adept** Having or showing knowledge and skill and aptitude.  
*She is **adept** at cutting through red tape.*
- adroit** Quick or skillful or adept in action or thought.  
*An **adroit** technician.*
- apt** Mentally quick and resourceful-Bram Stoker.  
*He is **apt** to be swayed by irrational considerations.*
- artistic** Having or revealing natural creative skill.  
*A denial of **artistic** freedom.*
- brilliant** Having strong or striking color.  
*The **brilliant** court life at Versailles.*

<b>capable</b>	(usually followed by `of') having capacity or ability. <i>I m quite <b>capable</b> of taking care of myself.</i>
<b>competent</b>	Acceptable and satisfactory, though not outstanding. <i>Make sure the firm is <b>competent</b> to carry out the work.</i>
<b>consummate</b>	Without qualification; used informally as (often pejorative) intensifiers. <i>A <b>consummate</b> artist.</i>
<b>deft</b>	Skillful in physical movements; especially of the hands. <i><b>Deft</b> fingers massaged her face.</i>
<b>dexterous</b>	Showing or having skill, especially with the hands. <i><b>Dexterous</b> of hand and inventive of mind.</i>
<b>expert</b>	Having or showing knowledge and skill and aptitude. <i>He had received <b>expert</b> academic advice.</i>
<b>first-rate</b>	Of the highest quality.
<b>gifted</b>	Having exceptional talent or natural ability. <i>A <b>gifted</b> amateur musician.</i>
<b>master</b>	Main; principal. <i>A <b>master</b> switch.</i>
<b>masterly</b>	Showing great skill; very accomplished. <i>A <b>masterly</b> performance of the sonata.</i>
<b>polished</b>	To trim and smooth. <i>Freshly <b>polished</b> silver.</i>
<b>proficient</b>	Having or showing knowledge and skill and aptitude. <i>She felt reasonably <b>proficient</b> in Italian.</i>
<b>skilful</b>	Having or showing knowledge and skill and aptitude. <i>A <b>skilful</b> midfielder.</i>
<b>skilled</b>	Based on or proceeding from the ability to do something well. <i>A <b>skilled</b> surgeon has many years of training and experience.</i>

- ability** Possession of the means or skill to do something.  
*A man of exceptional **ability**.*
- adroit** Clever or skilful.  
*An exceptionally **adroit** pianist.*
- adroitness** Skillful performance or ability without difficulty.  
*He lacks political **adroitness**.*
- ambidextrous** Able to use the right and left hands equally well.  
*Few of us are naturally **ambidextrous**.*
- aptitude** A natural tendency.  
*The **aptitude** of this society to assimilate new elements.*

<b>canny</b>	Showing self-interest and shrewdness in dealing with others. <i><b>Canny</b> investors will switch banks if they think they are getting a raw deal.</i>
<b>clever</b>	Healthy or well. <i>She was an extremely <b>clever</b> and studious young woman.</i>
<b>comediienne</b>	A female comedian.
<b>comer</b>	Someone with a promising future. <i>Feeding every <b>comer</b> is still a sacred duty.</i>
<b>competence</b>	An income large enough to live on, typically an unearned one. <i>The court's <b>competence</b> has been accepted to cover these matters.</i>
<b>craft</b>	An aircraft or spaceship. <i>He represented the <b>craft</b> of brewers.</i>
<b>deftness</b>	Skillful performance or ability without difficulty.
<b>dexterity</b>	Skill in performing tasks, especially with the hands. <i>Her <b>dexterity</b> with chopsticks.</i>
<b>dextrous</b>	Skillful in physical movements; especially of the hands.
<b>exceptionally</b>	To a greater degree than normal; unusually. <i>The court allows half an hour in most cases one hour <b>exceptionally</b> for a very important case.</i>
<b>finesse</b>	Impressive delicacy and skill. <i>Orchestral playing of great <b>finesse</b>.</i>
<b>flair</b>	Distinctive and stylish elegance. <i>None of us had much artistic <b>flair</b>.</i>
<b>gifted</b>	Endowed with talent or talents. <i>A <b>gifted</b> writer.</i>
<b>incredibly</b>	Not easy to believe. <i><b>Incredibly</b> he was still alive.</i>
<b>knack</b>	A special way of doing something. <i>He had a <b>knack</b> for communicating.</i>
<b>skill</b>	An ability that has been acquired by training. <i>The <b>skill</b> of a well trained boxer.</i>
<b>skillful</b>	Done with delicacy and skill. <i>A lesser known but no less <b>skillful</b> composer.</i>
<b>sleight</b>	Adroitness in using the hands. <i>Except by <b>sleight</b> of logic the two positions cannot be harmonized.</i>
<b>sportsman</b>	A person who behaves sportingly.
<b>tact</b>	Skill and sensitivity in dealing with others or with difficult issues. <i>The inspector broke the news to me with <b>tact</b> and consideration.</i>

<b>talent</b>	Natural abilities or qualities. <i>He possesses more <b>talent</b> than any other player.</i>
<b>thespian</b>	An actor or actress. <i>An ageing <b>thespian</b>.</i>
<b>uncommonly</b>	Exceptionally. <i>He is an <b>uncommonly</b> good talker.</i>
<b>versatility</b>	Having a wide variety of skills. <i>A writer of remarkable <b>versatility</b>.</i>
<b>workmanship</b>	The degree of skill with which a product is made or a job done. <i>Cracks on the motorway were caused by poor <b>workmanship</b>.</i>
