able	Having considerable skill proficiency or intelligence. <i>Able to learn.</i>
accomplished	Highly skilled. <i>A very elegant and accomplished person.</i>
adept	Having or showing knowledge and skill and aptitude. <i>She is adept at cutting through red tape.</i>
adroit	Quick or skillful or adept in action or thought. <i>An adroit technician.</i>
apt	Mentally quick and resourceful-Bram Stoker. <i>He is apt to be swayed by irrational considerations.</i>
artistic	Having or revealing natural creative skill. <i>A denial of artistic freedom.</i>
brilliant	Having strong or striking color. <i>The brilliant court life at Versailles.</i>

capable	(usually followed by `of') having capacity or ability. <i>I m quite capable of taking care of myself.</i>
competent	Acceptable and satisfactory, though not outstanding. <i>Make sure the firm is competent to carry out the work.</i>
consummate	Without qualification; used informally as (often pejorative) intensifiers. <i>A consummate artist.</i>
deft	Skillful in physical movements; especially of the hands. <i>Deft fingers massaged her face.</i>
dexterous	Showing or having skill, especially with the hands. <i>Dexterous of hand and inventive of mind.</i>
expert	Having or showing knowledge and skill and aptitude. <i>He had received expert academic advice.</i>
first-rate	Of the highest quality.
gifted	Having exceptional talent or natural ability. <i>A gifted amateur musician.</i>
master	Main; principal. <i>A master switch.</i>
masterly	Showing great skill; very accomplished. <i>A masterly performance of the sonata.</i>
polished	To trim and smooth. <i>Freshly polished silver.</i>
proficient	Having or showing knowledge and skill and aptitude. <i>She felt reasonably proficient in Italian.</i>
skilful	Having or showing knowledge and skill and aptitude. <i>A skilful midfielder.</i>
skilled	Based on or proceeding from the ability to do something well. <i>A skilled surgeon has many years of training and experience.</i>

Associations of "Talented" (30 Words)

ability	Possession of the means or skill to do something. <i>A man of exceptional ability.</i>
adroit	Clever or skilful. <i>An exceptionally adroit pianist.</i>
adroitness	Skillful performance or ability without difficulty. <i>He lacks political adroitness.</i>
ambidextrous	Able to use the right and left hands equally well. <i>Few of us are naturally ambidextrous.</i>
<u>aptitude</u>	A natural tendency. <i>The aptitude of this society to assimilate new elements.</i>

canny	Showing self-interest and shrewdness in dealing with others. <i>Canny investors will switch banks if they think they are getting a raw deal.</i>
clever	Healthy or well. <i>She was an extremely clever and studious young woman.</i>
comediienne	A female comedian.
comer	Someone with a promising future. <i>Feeding every comer is still a sacred duty.</i>
competence	An income large enough to live on, typically an unearned one. <i>The court s competence has been accepted to cover these matters.</i>
craft	An aircraft or spaceship. <i>He represented the craft of brewers.</i>
deftness	Skillful performance or ability without difficulty.
dexterity	Skill in performing tasks, especially with the hands. <i>Her dexterity with chopsticks.</i>
dextrous	Skillful in physical movements; especially of the hands.
exceptionally	To a greater degree than normal; unusually. <i>The court allows half an hour in most cases one hour exceptionally for a very important case.</i>
finesse	Impressive delicacy and skill. <i>Orchestral playing of great finesse.</i>
flair	Distinctive and stylish elegance. <i>None of us had much artistic flair.</i>
gifted	Endowed with talent or talents. <i>A gifted writer.</i>
incredibly	Not easy to believe. <i>Incredibly he was still alive.</i>
knack	A special way of doing something. <i>He had a knack for communicating.</i>
skill	An ability that has been acquired by training. <i>The skill of a well trained boxer.</i>
skillful	Done with delicacy and skill. <i>A lesser known but no less skillful composer.</i>
sleight	Adroitness in using the hands. <i>Except by sleight of logic the two positions cannot be harmonized.</i>
sportsman	A person who behaves sportingly.
tact	Skill and sensitivity in dealing with others or with difficult issues. <i>The inspector broke the news to me with tact and consideration.</i>

<u>talent</u>	Natural abilities or qualities. <i>He possesses more talent than any other player.</i>
thespian	An actor or actress. <i>An ageing thespian.</i>
uncommonly	Exceptionally. <i>He is an uncommonly good talker.</i>
versatility	Having a wide variety of skills. <i>A writer of remarkable versatility.</i>
workmanship	The degree of skill with which a product is made or a job done. <i>Cracks on the motorway were caused by poor workmanship.</i>
