gross	A gross profit or income. <i>Fifty five gross of tins of processed milk.</i>
itemization	The act of making a list of items.
listing	A list or catalogue.
match	The score needed to win a match. <i>A boxing match.</i>
mate	South American tea like drink made from leaves of a South American holly called mate. <i>A sock without its mate.</i>
numeration	The act of counting; reciting numbers in ascending order.
problem	A proposition in which something has to be constructed. <i>The problem of ageism in Hollywood.</i>

reckoning	Contention for a place in a team or among the winners of a contest. <i>By ancient reckoning bacteria are plants.</i>
record	A piece or collection of music reproduced on a record or on another medium. <i>At 9 0 they have the best record in their league.</i>
<u>register</u>	A cashbox with an adding machine to register transactions used in shops to add up the bill. <i>It was reproduced in full colour but unfortunately out of register.</i>

result	Something that results. <i>The tower collapsed as a result of safety violations.</i>
roll	A roller for flattening something especially one used to shape metal in a rolling mill. <i>Soup with a roll.</i>
run	A race run on foot. <i>She broke the record for the half mile run.</i>
running total	The state of being in operation.
score	A rating or grade, such as a mark achieved in a test. <i>He tried to blame the victim but his success on that score was doubtful.</i>
<u>sum</u>	An arithmetical problem, especially at an elementary level. <i>The sum of his own knowledge.</i>
sum total	A set containing all and only the members of two or more given sets.
<u>summation</u>	The process whereby multiple stimuli can produce a response (in a muscle or nerve or other part) that one stimulus alone does not produce. <i>These will need summation in a single document.</i>
<u>total</u>	The whole amount. <i>In total 200 people were interviewed.</i>

dovetail	Join together by means of a dovetail. <i>Plan to enable parents to dovetail their career and family commitments.</i>
enumerate	Specify individually. <i>6 079 residents were enumerated in 241 establishments.</i>

<u>equate</u>	(of one thing) be the same as or equivalent to (another). <i>Customers equate their name with quality.</i>
fit	Make fit. <i>Many physicists tried to fit together the various pieces of the puzzle.</i>
gibe	Be compatible, similar or consistent; coincide in their characteristics. <i>Some cynics in the media might gibe.</i>
harmonize	Sing or play in harmony. <i>The colors don't harmonize.</i>
hit	Hit the intended target or goal. <i>We hit Detroit by noon.</i>
