Definitions of "Tangent" as a noun

- *Ratio of the opposite to the adjacent side of a right-angled triangle.*
- *The trigonometric function that is equal to the ratio of the sides (other than the hypotenuse) opposite and adjacent to an angle in a right-angled triangle.*
- *A straight line or plane that touches a curve or curved surface at a point but does not intersect it at that point.*
- *A completely different line of thought or action.*
- *A straight line or plane that touches a curve or curved surface at a point, but if extended does not cross it at that point.*

| angle | Angle iron or a similar constructional material made of another metal. <i>He angled his way into the room.</i> |
| arc | Form an arch or curve. <i>Her back arches.</i> |
| bend | A kind of knot used to join two ropes together or to tie a rope to another object e.g a carrick bend. <i>Bend your knees.</i> |
| bent | Sharply curved or having an angle. <i>He had a bent for it.</i> |
| circle | Form a circle around. <i>The abbey was circled by a huge wall.</i> |
| circular | Having a circular shape. <i>I received a circular from a building society.</i> |
| concave | Curving inward. <i>Concave lenses.</i> |
| convex | (of a polygon) not having any interior angles greater than 180°. <i>A convex lens.</i> |
| curve | Form an arch or curve. <i>The parapet wall sweeps down in a bold curve.</i> |
| cycloid | Resembling a circle. A closed plane curve resulting from the intersection of a circular cone and a plane cutting completely through it. |
| ellipse | <i>The sums of the distances from the foci to any point on an ellipse is constant.</i> |
| elliptical | Characterized by extreme economy of expression or omission of superfluous elements- H.O.Taylor. <i>She had completely misunderstood his elliptical declaration.</i> |
| epicycloid | A line generated by a point on a circle rolling around another circle. |
| fold | Confine in a fold like sheep. <i>The deckchair folds flat.</i> |
| geometry | A particular system of geometry. <i>The geometry of spiders webs.</i> |
| hyperbola | The pair of hyperbolas formed by the intersection of a plane with two equal cones on opposite sides of the same vertex. |

| hyperbolic | Of or relating to a hyperbola. <i>A hyperbolic style.</i> |
| mathematics | The abstract science of number quantity and space either as abstract concepts pure mathematics or as applied to other disciplines such as physics and engineering applied mathematics. <i>James immerses himself in the mathematics of baseball.</i> |
| oval | An oval sports field or racing track. <i>Cut out two small ovals from the felt.</i> |
| parabola | A plane curve formed by the intersection of a right circular cone and a plane parallel to an element of the curve. |
| parabolic | Of or expressed in parables. <i>Parabolic teaching.</i> |
| radius | The bone in a vertebrate s foreleg or a bird s wing that corresponds to the radius in a human being. <i>There are plenty of local pubs within a two mile radius.</i> |
| rectangular | Denoting or shaped like a rectangle. <i>A neat rectangular area.</i> |
| rounded | Curving and somewhat round in shape rather than jagged. <i>We should educate children to become rounded human beings.</i> |
| serpentine | A kind of cannon, used especially in the 15th and 16th centuries. <i>Serpentine country lanes.</i> |
| shape | Give a particular shape or form to. <i>He could barely make out their shapes.</i> |
| sinuate | Curved or curving in and out. |
| sinuous | Lithe and supple. <i>The sinuous grace of a cat.</i> |
| spherical | Shaped like a sphere. <i>Spherical pearls.</i> |
| winding | The act of winding or twisting. <i>The windings of the stream.</i> |
