Definitions of "Tapestry" as a noun

- *Something that resembles a tapestry in its intricacy.*
- *A wall hanging of heavy handwoven fabric with pictorial designs.*
- *Used in reference to an intricate or complex sequence of events.*
- *A wall hanging of heavy handwoven fabric often with pictorial designs.*
- *Something that resembles a tapestry in its complex pictorial designs.*
- *A piece of thick textile fabric with pictures or designs formed by weaving coloured weft threads or by embroidering on canvas, used as a wall hanging or soft furnishing.*
- *A heavy textile with a woven design; used for curtains and upholstery.*



Synonyms of "Tapestry" as a noun (2 Words)

- arras** A wall hanging of heavy handwoven fabric with pictorial designs.
*He pulled back the **arras** on the far wall and went into his secret chamber.*
- tapis** A tapestry or richly decorated cloth, used as a hanging or a covering.

- cocoon** Wrap in or as if in a cocoon as for protection.
*We felt cold even though we were **cocooned** in our sleeping bags.*
- cotton** Cotton wool.
*A cargo of **cotton** and wheat.*
- crochet** Create by looping or crocheting.
*Her mother had stopped **crocheting**.*
- embroidery** The art or pastime of embroidering cloth.
*The bazaars stock a wide variety of **embroidery**.*

fibre	A substance formed of fibres. <i>There were degenerative changes in muscle fibres.</i>
floral	A fabric with a floral design. <i>Faunal and floral evolution.</i>
hoop	Bind or fasten with a hoop. <i>Henry s father played hoops for Kansas.</i>
interweave	Blend closely. <i>The branches met and interwove above his head.</i>
knit	A basic knitting stitch. <i>Disparate regions had begun to knit together under the king.</i>
knitting	The craft or action of knitting. <i>I put down my knitting.</i>
linen	Articles such as sheets or clothes made or originally made of linen. <i>The linen cupboard.</i>
loosely	In a way that is not rigidly organized. <i>A loosely organized group of collectors.</i>
needle	Prick or pierce with or as if with a needle. <i>She wound the gramophone and lowered the needle on to the record.</i>
needlepoint	Embroider in needlepoint.
needlework	The art or practice of sewing or embroidery. <i>I took up needlework.</i>
ribbon	Extend or move in a long narrow strip like a ribbon. <i>Slice the peppers into ribbons lengthways.</i>
sampler	A person or device that takes and analyses samples. <i>A sampler of French poets.</i>
sew	Make a garment by sewing. <i>She could sew the veil on properly in the morning.</i>
silk	Garments made from silk especially as worn by a jockey in the colours of a particular horse owner. <i>Some were dressed in racing silks.</i>
spangle	Cover with spangles or other small sparkling objects or lights. <i>The star spangled banner.</i>
stitch	Make mend or join something with stitches. <i>Nymphs with come hither looks and not a stitch on.</i>
string	Work as a stringer in journalism. <i>The village team held Rangers second string to a 0 0 draw.</i>
thimble	As much as a thimble will hold.

thread

Thread on or as if on a string.
*He **threaded** the rope through a pulley.*

warp

In weaving arrange yarn so as to form the warp of a piece of cloth.
*Rugby is woven into the **warp** and weft of South African society.*

weaver

Finch-like African and Asian colonial birds noted for their elaborately woven nests.

weft

(in weaving) the crosswise threads on a loom that are passed over and under the warp threads to make cloth.
***Weft** threads.*

yarn

Tell or spin a yarn.
*He never let reality get in the way of a good **yarn**.*
