Definitions of "Tardiness" as a noun

- The quality or fact of being late; lateness.
- The quality or habit of not adhering to a correct or usual or expected time.





Synonyms of "Tardiness" as a noun (4 Words)

delay	The action of delaying or being delayed. Instant replay caused too long a delay .
dilatoriness	State of uncertainty or perplexity especially as requiring a choice between equally unfavorable options.
lateness	Quality of coming late or later in time. She wouldn t tolerate lateness in her class.
retardation	The action of delaying or slowing the progress or development of something. <i>The goals of treatment include</i> retardation <i>of disease progression.</i>

• Forgive my tardiness, I had some very important business to attend to.





Associations of "Tardiness" (30 Words)

andantino	A movement or passage marked to be performed andantino. <i>The slow movement is marked</i> andantino .
<u>belated</u>	After the expected or usual time; delayed. A belated birthday card.
deceased	Dead. The deceased man s family.
dilatory	Intended to cause delay. They resorted to dilatory tactics forcing a postponement of peace talks.
drawl	Lengthen and slow down or draw out. Suits me fine he drawl ed.
dullness	The quality of not perceiving things distinctly. The summer light cut into the dullness of the room.



<u>easygoing</u>	Not hurried or forced. At a leisurely or easygoing pace.
<u>gradual</u>	(Roman Catholic Church) an antiphon (usually from the Book of Psalms) immediately after the epistle at Mass. A gradual slope.
idler	A pulley that transmits no power but guides or stretches a belt or rope.
inactive	Not active physically or mentally. <i>Inactive</i> Crohn s disease.
indolence	Avoidance of activity or exertion; laziness. My failure is probably due to my own indolence .
<u>inert</u>	Chemically inactive. An inert political system.
laggard	A person who makes slow progress and falls behind others. A bell to summon laggard children to school.
<u>late</u>	Later than usual or than expected. <i>Their late quarrel.</i>
<u>lazy</u>	Showing a lack of care. <i>Lazy</i> white clouds.
<u>lethargic</u>	Deficient in alertness or activity. I felt tired and a little lethargic .
<u>lifeless</u>	Deprived of life; no longer living. It was a lifeless party until she arrived.
lingering	The act of tarrying. There are still some lingering doubts in my mind.
loosen	Cause to become loose. Loosen the tension on a rope.
oafish	Rough or clumsy and unintelligent. <i>Oafish</i> behaviour.
piecemeal	Characterized by unsystematic partial measures taken over a period of time. The village is slowly being killed off by piecemeal development.
ponderous	Having great mass and weight and unwieldiness. The show is loaded down with ponderous one liners.
procrastination	The act of procrastinating; putting off or delaying or defering an action to a later time. Your first tip is to avoid procrastination .



relax	Cause to feel relaxed. <i>He relaxed in the hot tub.</i>
slacken	Make less active or fast. He slacken ed his pace as he got tired.
<u>sloth</u>	A disinclination to work or exert yourself. <i>He should overcome his natural sloth and complacency.</i>
slow	At a slow tempo. Worked with the slow students.
sluggish	Slow-moving or inactive. A sluggish worker.
sulky	Morose, bad-tempered, and resentful; refusing to be cooperative or cheerful. She had a sultry sulky mouth.
torpid	Slow and apathetic. A mind grown torpid in old age.
