- *A person or thing against whom criticism or abuse is directed.*
- *An idealization of the articulation of a speech sound, with reference to which actual utterances can be described.*
- *Sports equipment consisting of an object set up for a marksman or archer to aim at.*
- *A person, object, or place selected as the aim of an attack.*

- *The location of the target that is to be hit.*
- *A reference point to shoot at.*
- *A small round shield or buckler.*
- *An objective or result towards which efforts are directed.*
- *The goal intended to be attained (and which is believed to be attainable).*

An anticipated outcome that is intended or that guides your planned actions.

*He took **aim** and fired.*

aunt sally

The sister of your father or mother; the wife of your uncle.

bag

The amount contained in a bag.

*There were dark **bags** under her eyes.*

buckler

A small round shield held by a handle or worn on the forearm.

<u>bullseye</u>	A shot that hits the bullseye in sports such as archery shooting and darts. A bullseye lantern.
desired result	Something that is desired.
dupe	A person who is tricked or swindled. <i>Men who were simply the dupes of their unscrupulous leaders.</i>
end	The point in time at which something ends. <i>The end of the pier.</i>
fair game	Gathering of producers to promote business.
focus	A fixed reference point on the concave side of a conic section. <i>Out of focus.</i>
game	Games the score at a particular point or the score needed to win. <i>He thought of his painting as a game that filled his empty time.</i>
goal	An instance of sending the ball into or over the goal especially as a unit of scoring in a game. <i>The aircraft bumped towards our goal some 400 miles to the west.</i>
mark	A figure or letter representing the total number of marks awarded in an examination or competition and signifying a person's score. <i>Many candidates lose marks because they don't read the questions carefully.</i>
object	The goal intended to be attained (and which is believed to be attainable). <i>He was dragging a large object.</i>
objective	The objective case. <i>The system has achieved its objective.</i>
prey	Animal hunted or caught for food. <i>He fell prey to muggers.</i>
<u>quarry</u>	A person who is the aim of an attack (especially a victim of ridicule or exploitation) by some hostile person or influence. <i>A limestone quarry.</i>
recipient	The semantic role of the animate entity that is passively involved in the happening denoted by the verb in the clause. <i>The recipient of the Nobel Peace Prize.</i>
<u>scapegoat</u>	Someone who is punished for the errors of others.
<u>subject</u>	A person who is subjected to experimental or other observational procedures someone who is an object of investigation. <i>He had been thinking about the subject for several years.</i>
target area	Sports equipment consisting of an object set up for a marksman or archer to aim at.

victim

A person who is tricked or duped.
*Sacrificial **victims** for the ritual festivals.*

Synonyms of "Target" as a verb (15 Words)

<u>aim</u>	Move into a desired direction of discourse. <i>We aim to give you the best possible service.</i>
choose	Pick out select or choose from a number of alternatives. <i>There are many versions to choose from.</i>
decide on	Reach, make, or come to a decision about something.
direct	Give directions to point somebody into a certain direction. <i>His criticism was directed at the wastage of ammunition.</i>
earmark	Mark the ear of (a domesticated animal) as a sign of ownership or identity. <i>The yard has been earmarked for a complete overhaul.</i>
fix on	Influence an event or its outcome by illegal means.
focus	Bring into focus or alignment to converge or cause to converge of ideas or emotions. <i>The light focused.</i>
<u>intend</u>	Mean or intend to express or convey. <i>This one roomed cottage was intended to accommodate a family.</i>

level	Make level or straight. <i>I have to level with you.</i>
pick out	Pilfer or rob.
place	Score a goal by a place kick. <i>They placed a contract for three boats.</i>
point	Give a sharp tapered point to. <i>Reach up with your arms and point your toes.</i>
position	Promote (a product, service, or business) within a particular sector of a market, or as the fulfilment of that sector's specific requirements. <i>He pulled out a chair and positioned it between them.</i>
select	Pick out select or choose from a number of alternatives. <i>She selected a pair of shoes from among the dozen the salesgirl had shown her.</i>
single out	Hit a single.



Usage Examples of "Target" as a verb

- *Warheads were targeted on a European city.*
- *Two men were targeted by the attackers.*

accusative	A word in the accusative case. <i>Accusative</i> endings.
<u>aim</u>	Direct (a remark) toward an intended goal. <i>We aim to give you the best possible service.</i>
<u>aimless</u>	Aimlessly drifting. <i>An aimless existence.</i>
<u>aspiration</u>	The action of pronouncing a sound with an exhalation of breath. <i>The needs and aspirations of the people.</i>
<u>destination</u>	The place to which someone or something is going or being sent. <i>Delft is an ideal destination for a relaxing weekend.</i>
direct	Of a current flowing in one direction only. <i>A direct descendant of Edward III.</i>

goal	An instance of sending the ball into or over the goal especially as a unit of scoring in a game. <i>The decisive opening goal.</i>
heading	A strip of cloth at the top of a curtain above the hooks or wire by which it is suspended. <i>The heading seemed to have little to do with the text.</i>
incriminate	Suggest that someone is guilty. <i>He refused to answer questions in order not to incriminate himself.</i>
intended	Planned or meant. <i>Your intended trip abroad.</i>
<u>intention</u>	(usually plural) the goal with respect to a marriage proposal. <i>If his intentions aren't honourable I never want to see him again.</i>
intentionality	Expressive of intentions.
inventory	A complete list of items such as property, goods in stock, or the contents of a building. <i>In our warehouse you'll find a large inventory of new and used bicycles.</i>
knowingly	In a way that suggests one has secret knowledge or awareness. <i>When a journalist knowingly misleads their readers.</i>
mark	Make underscoring marks. <i>This sign marks the border.</i>
object	Express or raise an objection or protest or criticism or express dissent. <i>Small objects such as shells.</i>
objective	The objective case. <i>The system has achieved its objective.</i>
<u>opportunist</u>	Opportunistic. <i>Most burglaries are committed by casual opportunists.</i>
orientation	Familiarization with something. <i>Showed a Marxist orientation.</i>
<u>planned</u>	Planned in advance. <i>The planned outlays for new equipment.</i>
prey	Prey on or hunt for. <i>He fell prey to muggers.</i>
<u>propose</u>	Propose or intend. <i>Roy Thomson was proposed as chairman.</i>
<u>purport</u>	Appear to be or do something, especially falsely. <i>She is not the person she purports to be.</i>

purpose	The quality of being determined to do or achieve something firmness of purpose. <i>There was a new sense of purpose in her step as she set off.</i>
purposive	Having a purpose. <i>Purposive behavior.</i>
squarely	In a straight direct way. <i>The responsibility lies squarely with them.</i>
teleology	The doctrine of design and purpose in the material world. <i>His theory of class consciousness is predicated on a teleology.</i>
thing	Personal belongings or clothing. <i>She couldn't find a thing to wear.</i>
victim	An unfortunate person who suffers from some adverse circumstance. <i>Earthquake victims.</i>
yard	A square or cubic yard especially of sand or other building materials. <i>It cost two hundred up front one yard for Maurice one for the girl.</i>
