<u>rust</u>	A plant disease that produces a reddish brown discoloration of leaves and stems caused by various rust fungi. The MPs are here to scrape the <b>rust</b> off the derelict machinery of government.
<u>slur</u>	An act of speaking indistinctly so that sounds or words run into one another or a tendency to speak in such a way. <i>The comments were a slur on staff at the hospital.</i>
smear	A false accusation intended to damage someone's reputation. Soon you re eyeballing the top just one <b>smear</b> away.
smirch	An act that brings discredit to the person who does it.
stain	The state of being covered with unclean things. There were mud <b>stain</b> s on my shoes.
<u>stigma</u>	The apical end of the style where deposited pollen enters the pistil. The <b>stigma</b> of having gone to prison will always be with me.
taint	Something with a contaminating influence or effect. The <b>taint</b> of corruption which adhered to the government.
tarnishing	Discoloration of metal surface caused by oxidation.


## Tarnish as a Verb



### **Definitions of "Tarnish" as a verb**

- Make or become less valuable or respected.
- *Make dirty or spotty, as by exposure to air; also used metaphorically.*
- Lose or cause to lose lustre, especially as a result of exposure to air or moisture.

damage	Inflict damage upon. The car was badly <b>damage</b> d in the accident.
debase	Corrupt debase or make impure by adding a foreign or inferior substance often by replacing valuable ingredients with inferior ones. <i>War debases people.</i>
<u>defame</u>	Charge falsely or with malicious intent; attack the good name and reputation of someone. <i>He claimed that the article</i> <b>defame</b> <i>d his family.</i>
<u>defile</u>	Rape or sexually assault (a woman. The tomb had been <b>defile</b> d and looted.
degrade	Lower the quality of; cause to deteriorate. <i>He was <b>degrade</b>d from his high estate.</i>
denigrate	Criticize unfairly; disparage. Doom and gloom merchants who <b>denigrate</b> their own country.
deteriorate	Grow worse. <i>If the situation continues to</i> <b>deteriorate</b> <i>the consequences could be severe.</i>
<u>dim</u>	Make dim by comparison or conceal. A smoky inferno that <b>dim</b> med the sun.
discolour	Change or cause to change to a different, less attractive colour. <i>Too much aluminium can <b>discolour</b> water.</i>
disgrace	Bring shame or discredit on. He has been publicly <b>disgrace</b> d for offences for which he was not guilty.



dishonour	Refuse to accept or pay (a cheque or a bill of exchange. She was now unworthy of his notice having been <b>dishonour</b> ed by Casim.
drag through the mud	Draw slowly or heavily.
dull	Become dull or lusterless in appearance lose shine or brightness. <i>Too much cutting</i> <b>dull</b> s the knife s edge.
<u>harm</u>	Cause or do harm to. These pills won t <b>harm</b> your system.
hurt	Hurt the feelings of. Our business was <b>hurt</b> by the new competition.
injure	Cause damage or affect negatively. <i>He <b>injure</b>d his back helping the girl.</i>
maculate	Spot, stain, or pollute. A dirty white T shirt <b>maculate</b> d with barbecue sauce.
make black	Achieve a point or goal.
make dull	Favor the development of.
mar	Destroy or injure severely. Nothing <b>mar</b> red her beauty.
oxidize	Combine chemically with oxygen. This metal <b>oxidize</b> s easily.
ruin	Fall into ruin. You have <b>ruin</b> ed my car by pouring sugar in the tank.
<u>rust</u>	Be affected with rust. The pipes <b>rust</b> ed.
smirch	Make (something) dirty; soil. I am not accustomed to having my honour <b>smirch</b> ed.
<u>soil</u>	Make soiled filthy or dirty. Don t <b>soil</b> your clothes when you play outside.
spoil	Be extremely or aggressively eager for. The enemy entered into Hereford <b>spoil</b> ed and fired the city and razed the walls to the ground.
stain	Produce or leave stains. Wood can always be <b>stain</b> ed to a darker shade.
stigmatize	Mark with stigmata. <i>The institution was <b>stigmatize</b>d as a last resort for the destitute.</i>



sully	Place under suspicion or cast doubt upon. She wondered if she dared <b>sully</b> the gleaming sink.
taint	Affect with a bad or undesirable quality. The air was <b>taint</b> ed by fumes from the cars.
undermine	Erode the base or foundation of (a rock formation. This could <b>undermine</b> years of hard work.
vitiate	Take away the legal force of or render ineffective. Development programmes have been <b>vitiate</b> d by the rise in population.

adulteration	The act of adulterating (especially the illicit substitution of one substance for another. <i>The adulteration of culture.</i>
besmirch	Damage (someone's reputation. The ground was <b>besmirch</b> ed with blood.
blot	Transfer by means of a blot. Mary dug her brush into black paint and <b>blot</b> ted out her picture.
committed	Pledged or bound to a certain course or policy; dedicated. Esther has a <b>committed</b> boyfriend.



contaminate	Make (something) impure by exposure to or addition of a poisonous or polluting substance. Don t drink the water it s <b>contaminate</b> d.
contaminated	Having been made impure by exposure to or addition of a poisonous or polluting substance. Had to boil the <b>contaminated</b> water.
<u>contamination</u>	The act of contaminating or polluting; including (either intentionally or accidentally) unwanted substances or factors. <i>The contamination</i> of his morals.
corrupt	Corrupt morally or by intemperance or sensuality. Socrates was accused of <b>corrupt</b> ing young men.
daub	Material used to daub walls. <b>Daub</b> the ceiling with plaster.
debasement	Being mixed with extraneous material; the product of adulterating. The outcome is rot and <b>debasement</b> of the system.
<u>defamation</u>	A false accusation of an offense or a malicious misrepresentation of someone's words or actions. She sued him for <b>defamation</b> .
<u>defame</u>	Charge falsely or with malicious intent. The journalists have <b>defame</b> d me.
<u>defile</u>	Desecrate or profane (something sacred. The townspeople <b>defile</b> d the river by emptying raw sewage into it.
defiled	Morally blemished; stained or impure.
denigrate	Charge falsely or with malicious intent. Doom and gloom merchants who <b>denigrate</b> their own country.
environmental	Concerned with the ecological effects of altering the environment. Acid rain may have caused major <b>environmental</b> damage.
<u>infect</u>	Contaminate with a disease or microorganism. Viruses have <b>infect</b> ed computer networks.
maculate	Spotted or stained. A dirty white T shirt <b>maculate</b> d with barbecue sauce.
maliciously	With malice; in a malicious manner. Proof that the defendant acted <b>maliciously</b> .
pollute	Defile or corrupt. A society <b>pollute</b> d by greed.



pollution	The presence in or introduction into the environment of a substance which has harmful or poisonous effects. The level of <b>pollution</b> in the air is rising.
sicken	Get sick. This kind of food <b>sicken</b> s me.
<u>slur</u>	Of words or speech be slurred. He was <b>slur</b> ring his words like a drunk.
smirch	A blemish made by dirt. The window was <b>smirch</b> ed by heat and smoke.
smudge	Make a smudge on soil by smudging. She dabbed her eyes careful not to <b>smudge</b> her make up.
<u>spot</u>	Mark with a spot or spots so as to allow easy recognition. <i>His bald <b>spot</b></i> .
stain	Be marked or be liable to be marked with a stain. <i>He regarded his time in gaol as a <b>stain</b> on his character.</i>
sully	Make dirty or spotty, as by exposure to air; also used metaphorically. <i>Sully</i> someone s reputation.
taint	(of food or water) become contaminated or polluted. The rennet should be soaked in water containing sufficient salt to keep it from <b>taint</b> ing.
