- A strain or heavy demand.

contribution	A gift or payment to a common fund or collection. <i>The major <b>contribution</b> of social scientists to the understanding of political life.</i>
demand	The act of demanding. There were many <b>demand</b> s on his time.
drain	The continuous loss or expenditure of a particular resource. Nuclear power is a serious <b>drain</b> on the public purse.



duty	The measure of an engine's effectiveness in units of work done per unit of fuel. <i>We must instill a sense of</i> <b>duty</b> <i>in our children.</i>
encumbrance	A charge against property (as a lien or mortgage. The horse raised its hind leg as if to rid itself of an <b>encumbrance</b> .
<u>excise</u>	A tax that is measured by the amount of business done (not on property or income from real estate. <i>The rate of excise duty on spirits.</i>
fee	Money regularly paid to a school or similar institution for continuing services. They were faced with legal <b>fee</b> s of 3000.
imposition	A particular arrangement of imposed pages. Samples of 16 page <b>imposition</b> s.
impost	The weight carried by a horse as a handicap. Some of the labels are used for the purpose of collecting Customs duty or other <b>impost</b> s.
levy	A tax raised by levying. Edward I and Edward II had made substantial use of the feudal <b>levy</b> for raising an army.
load	A deposit of valuable ore occurring within definite boundaries separating it from surrounding rocks. She was talking a <b>load</b> of rubbish.
pressure	The pressure exerted by the atmosphere. The <b>pressure</b> s of city life.
revenue enhancement	Government income due to taxation.
strain	The general meaning or substance of an utterance. <i>His responsibilities were a constant <b>strain</b>.</i>
stress	The relative prominence of a syllable or musical note especially with regard to stress or pitch. He has started to lay greater <b>stress</b> on the government s role in industry.
tariff	A list of import or export tariffs. <i>The reduction of trade barriers and import</i> <b>tariff</b> s.
taxation	Government income due to taxation. A <b>taxation</b> system.
<u>tithe</u>	An offering of a tenth part of some personal income. <i>He hadn t said a <b>tithe</b> of the prayers he knew.</i>

accuse	Claim that (someone) has done something wrong. <i>He was <b>accuse</b>d of murdering his wife s lover.</i>
<u>assess</u>	Set or determine the amount of (a payment such as a fine. All empty properties will be <b>assess</b> ed at 50 per cent.
blame	Put or pin the blame on. We <b>blame</b> d the accident on her.
call to account	Utter a sudden loud cry.



censure	Rebuke formally. Shareholders <b>censure</b> d the bank for its extravagance.
<u>charge</u>	Enter a certain amount as a charge. <i>He <b>charge</b>d his weapon at me.</i>
charge duty on	Lie down on command, of hunting dogs.
<u>condemn</u>	Officially declare (something) to be unfit for use. The building was <b>condemn</b> ed by the inspector.
confront	Come face to face with (someone) with hostile or argumentative intent. The two enemies finally <b>confront</b> ed each other.
demand a tax on	Request urgently and forcefully.
denounce	Publicly declare to be wrong or evil. The Assembly <b>denounce</b> d the use of violence.
exact a tax on	Take as an undesirable consequence of some event or state of affairs.
impose a toll on	Compel to behave in a certain way.
levy a tax on	Impose and collect.
make demands on	Undergo fabrication or creation.
put a strain on	Cause to be in a certain state; cause to be in a certain relation.
strain	Rub through a strainer or process in an electric blender. She <b>strain</b> ed the infant to her bosom again.
stretch	Become longer by being stretched and pulled. My budget won t <b>stretch</b> to a weekend at a health farm.
task	Assign a task to. It <b>task</b> ed his diplomatic skill to effect his departure in safety.
weigh down	Determine the weight of.
weigh heavily on	To be oppressive or burdensome.

buyer	A person who makes a purchase.
<u>cash</u>	Exchange for cash. South <b>cash</b> ed the ace king and queen of clubs.
customs	The official department that administers and collects the duties levied by a government on imported goods. From 1374 Chaucer worked as controller of <b>customs</b> on wool in the port of London.
deductible	(taxes) an amount that can be deducted (especially for the purposes of calculating income tax. <i>Childcare vouchers will be <b>deductible</b> expenses for employers.</i>
duty	A payment levied on the import, export, manufacture, or sale of goods. We must instill a sense of <b>duty</b> in our children.



earnings	Income derived from an investment or product. <i>He claimed damages for loss of <b>earnings</b>.</i>
emolument	A salary, fee, or profit from employment or office. A clause in the U S constitution prevents sitting legislators from receiving <b>emolument</b> s from their own votes.
exemption	The action of freeing or state of being free from an obligation or liability imposed on others. Additional <b>exemptions</b> are allowed for each dependent.
<u>expenditure</u>	The use of energy, time, or other resources. Work is the <b>expenditure</b> of energy.
<u>income</u>	Money received, especially on a regular basis, for work or through investments. <i>He has a nice home and an adequate income</i> .
overpay	Pay too highly. Many fans think our top players are overpaid.
overpayment	Payment in excess of what is due. A refund for <b>overpayment</b> of tax.
pay	Bring in. The destroyer responsible for these atrocities would have to <b>pay</b> with his life.
purchaser	A person who buys. One of the club s prospective <b>purchaser</b> s.
rates	A local tax on property (usually used in the plural.
receivable	Awaiting payment. Accounts <b>receivable</b> .
<u>revenue</u>	The department of the civil service collecting state revenue. <i>His priority was to raise government</i> <b>revenue</b> <i>and to lower expenditure.</i>
<u>salary</u>	Pay a salary to. The Chinese system <b>salary</b> the doctor and stop his pay when you get ill.
sale	A period during which a shop or dealer sells goods at reduced prices. They had to complete the <b>sale</b> before the banks closed.
sequestrate	Set apart from others. The power of courts to <b>sequestrate</b> the assets of unions.
<u>subsidy</u>	A grant or contribution of money. The position is generously rewarded and benefits include a mortgage <b>subsidy</b> .



tariff	Charge a tariff. The reduction of trade barriers and import <b>tariff</b> s.
taxable	(of goods or funds) subject to taxation. <b>Taxable</b> employee benefits.
taxation	Government income due to taxation. A <b>taxation</b> system.
taxpayer	A person who pays taxes. A waste of <b>taxpayer</b> s money.
<u>tithe</u>	Pay one tenth of pay tithes on especially to the church. <i>He</i> <b>tithe</b> s 10 per cent of his income to the Church.
vat	Place or treat in a vat. The grapes are <b>vat</b> ted for between 15 and 21 days and then aged in small barrels.
wage	Carry on (a war or campaign. Disasters are the <b>wage</b> s of sin.
