fee	<p>Money regularly paid to a school or similar institution for continuing services.</p> <p><i>They were faced with legal fees of 3000.</i></p>
<u>imposition</u>	<p>A particular arrangement of imposed pages.</p> <p><i>Samples of 16 page impositions.</i></p>
impost	<p>The weight carried by a horse as a handicap.</p> <p><i>Some of the labels are used for the purpose of collecting Customs duty or other imposts.</i></p>
levy	<p>A tax raised by levying.</p> <p><i>Edward I and Edward II had made substantial use of the feudal levy for raising an army.</i></p>
load	<p>A deposit of valuable ore occurring within definite boundaries separating it from surrounding rocks.</p> <p><i>She was talking a load of rubbish.</i></p>
pressure	<p>The pressure exerted by the atmosphere.</p> <p><i>The pressures of city life.</i></p>
revenue enhancement	<p>Government income due to taxation.</p>

Payment made periodically by one state or ruler to another, especially as a sign of dependence.

Blocks or discs of metal or other heavy material used in weightlifting or weight training.

A recommendation by the committee will carry great **weight**.

levy a tax on	Impose and collect.
make demands on	Undergo fabrication or creation.
put a strain on	Cause to be in a certain state; cause to be in a certain relation.
strain	Rub through a strainer or process in an electric blender. <i>She strained the infant to her bosom again.</i>
stretch	Become longer by being stretched and pulled. <i>My budget won't stretch to a weekend at a health farm.</i>
task	Assign a task to. <i>It tasked his diplomatic skill to effect his departure in safety.</i>
weigh down	Determine the weight of.
weigh heavily on	To be oppressive or burdensome.

<u>income</u>	Money received, especially on a regular basis, for work or through investments. <i>He has a nice home and an adequate income.</i>
overpay	Pay too highly. <i>Many fans think our top players are overpaid.</i>
overpayment	Payment in excess of what is due. <i>A refund for overpayment of tax.</i>
pay	Bring in. <i>The destroyer responsible for these atrocities would have to pay with his life.</i>
purchaser	A person who buys. <i>One of the club's prospective purchasers.</i>
rates	A local tax on property (usually used in the plural).
receivable	Awaiting payment. <i>Accounts receivable.</i>
<u>revenue</u>	The department of the civil service collecting state revenue. <i>His priority was to raise government revenue and to lower expenditure.</i>
<u>salary</u>	Pay a salary to. <i>The Chinese system salary the doctor and stop his pay when you get ill.</i>
sale	A period during which a shop or dealer sells goods at reduced prices. <i>They had to complete the sale before the banks closed.</i>
sequester	Set apart from others. <i>The power of courts to sequester the assets of unions.</i>
<u>subsidy</u>	A grant or contribution of money. <i>The position is generously rewarded and benefits include a mortgage subsidy.</i>

tariff	Charge a tariff. <i>The reduction of trade barriers and import tariffs.</i>
taxable	(of goods or funds) subject to taxation. <i>Taxable employee benefits.</i>
taxation	Government income due to taxation. <i>A taxation system.</i>
taxpayer	A person who pays taxes. <i>A waste of taxpayers money.</i>
<u>tithe</u>	Pay one tenth of pay tithes on especially to the church. <i>He tithes 10 per cent of his income to the Church.</i>
vat	Place or treat in a vat. <i>The grapes are vatted for between 15 and 21 days and then aged in small barrels.</i>
wage	Carry on (a war or campaign). <i>Disasters are the wages of sin.</i>
