*A driving **instructor**.*
- master** Someone who holds a master s degree from academic institution.
*A **master s** degree.*
- mistress** A woman who is skilled in a particular subject or activity.
*She is always **mistress** of the situation coolly self possessed.*
- pedagogue** Someone who educates young people.

schoolmaster An experienced horse that is used to train or give confidence to inexperienced riders or horses.

schoolmistress A woman schoolteacher (especially one regarded as strict).

schoolteacher A teacher in a school below the college level.

tutor A private teacher, typically one who teaches a single pupil or a very small group.

<u>absenteeism</u>	Habitual absence from work. <i>High levels of absenteeism caused by low job motivation.</i>
<u>academy</u>	The teaching school founded by Plato. <i>A police academy.</i>
advisor	An expert who gives advice. <i>The United States sent military advisors to Guatemala.</i>
<u>campus</u>	The grounds of a school, hospital, or other institution. <i>For the first year I had a room on campus.</i>
coach	Drive a coach. <i>A coach trip.</i>
curriculum	An integrated course of academic studies. <i>Course components of the school curriculum.</i>

disciple	Someone who believes and helps to spread the doctrine of another. <i>A disciple of Rousseau.</i>
educator	Someone who educates young people. <i>The perspective of a professional educator.</i>
grad	A person who has received a degree from a school (high school or college or university).
guru	Each of the first ten leaders of the Sikh religion. <i>A management guru.</i>
headmaster	Presiding officer of a school.
homeroom	A classroom in which a group of students assembles daily with the same teacher before dispersing to other classes.
mentor	An experienced person in a company or educational institution who trains and counsels new employees or students. <i>He was her friend and mentor until his death.</i>
musicologist	An expert in or student of music as an academic subject, as opposed to someone trained in performance or composition.
pedagogue	A teacher, especially a strict or pedantic one.
pedagogy	The method and practice of teaching, especially as an academic subject or theoretical concept. <i>Pedagogy is recognized as an important profession.</i>
protege	A person who receives support and protection from an influential patron who furthers the protege's career.
pupil	The contractile aperture in the center of the iris of the eye; resembles a large black dot. <i>They are former pupils of the school.</i>
school	A day's work at school. <i>Harvard is certainly not a loafer's school.</i>
schooling	The training of an animal (especially the training of a horse for dressage). <i>Schooling fences.</i>
schoolmaster	Any person (or institution) who acts as an educator.
semester	Half a year; a period of 6 months. <i>The opening week of Harvard's autumn semester.</i>
student	A person who is studying at a university or other place of higher education. <i>A maths student.</i>
teach	A teacher. <i>She teaches at the local high school.</i>

trainee	Someone who is being trained. <i>Trainee solicitors.</i>
tuition	Teaching pupils individually (usually by a tutor hired privately). <i>Tuition fees.</i>
tutelage	Attention and management implying responsibility for safety. <i>He felt privileged to be under the tutelage of an experienced actor.</i>
tutor	Act as a tutor to a single pupil or a very small group. <i>A voluntary tutor in adult literacy.</i>
tutorship	Teaching pupils individually (usually by a tutor hired privately).
undergraduate	Denoting or relating to an undergraduate. <i>An undergraduate degree.</i>
