Telegraph as a Noun

Definitions of "Telegraph" as a noun

According to the [Oxford Dictionary of English](#), “telegraph” as a noun can have the following definitions:

- *Apparatus used to communicate at a distance over a wire (usually in Morse code).*
- *A device for transmitting messages by telegraph.*
- *A system for transmitting messages from a distance along a wire, especially one creating signals by making and breaking an electrical connection.*
- *A board displaying scores or other information at a sports match or race meeting.*



Synonyms of "Telegraph" as a noun (1 Word)

telegraphy Communicating at a distance by electric transmission over wire.



Usage Examples of "Telegraph" as a noun

- *News came from the outside world by telegraph.*



Telegraph as a Verb

Definitions of "Telegraph" as a verb

According to the [Oxford Dictionary of English](#), "telegraph" as a verb can have the following definitions:

- *Send (a message) by telegraph.*
- *Send (someone) a message by telegraph.*
- *Send cables, wires, or telegrams.*
- *Convey (an intentional or unconscious message), especially with facial expression or body language.*



Usage Examples of "Telegraph" as a verb

- *She would rush off to telegraph news to her magazine.*
- *A tiny movement of her arm telegraphed her intention to strike.*
- *I must go and telegraph Mama.*
- *I don't own a wedding ring—this telegraphs a sad story.*



Associations of "Telegraph" (30 Words)

adapter	Device that enables something to be used in a way different from that for which it was intended or makes different pieces of apparatus compatible. <i>The adapter converts the lens focal length to 55 mm.</i>
barb	A freshwater fish with barbels around the mouth popular in aquaria. <i>Barbed wire.</i>
broadcast	Broadcast over the airwaves as in radio or television. <i>Green manures can be sown broadcast or in rows.</i>
broadcaster	An organization that transmits a programme or information by radio or television. <i>He became a successful broadcaster both on television and the wireless.</i>
broadcasting	A medium that disseminates via telecommunications. <i>The state monopoly on broadcasting.</i>

bungee	Perform a bungee jump. <i>He bungeed 111 metres from the bridge over the Victoria Falls.</i>
cable	Fasten with a cable. <i>This was an occasion for using the telephone not cables teletexes or letters.</i>
<u>camera</u>	Equipment for taking photographs (usually consisting of a lightproof box with a lens at one end and light-sensitive film at the other). <i>A video camera.</i>
cameraman	A photographer who operates a movie camera.
commentary	A set of explanatory or critical notes on a text. <i>A narrative overlaid with commentary.</i>
copper	Coat with a layer of copper. <i>Coppered pins.</i>
drama	A dramatic work intended for performance by actors on a stage. <i>Renaissance drama.</i>
hawser	A thick rope or cable for mooring or towing a ship.
journalist	A person who writes for newspapers, magazines, or news websites or prepares news to be broadcast. <i>He was a seasoned TV journalist.</i>
modem	Send data by modem. <i>Iva and Bill were modeming new programs to New Orleans.</i>
newscaster	A person who reads out broadcast news stories; a newsreader.
<u>plug</u>	A circular piece of metal rubber or plastic used to stop the plughole of a bath or basin and keep the water in it. <i>Plug the hole.</i>
radio	Transmit messages via radio waves. <i>She has written much material for radio.</i>
reporter	A person who investigates and reports or edits news stories.
satellite	Satellite television. <i>A spy satellite.</i>
socket	Place in or fit with a socket. <i>By then arrowheads were normally socketed.</i>
<u>strand</u>	Leave stranded or isolated with little hope of rescue. <i>He tried to pick up the strands of his former life.</i>
telecast	Transmit by television. <i>The programme will be telecast simultaneously to nearly 150 cities.</i>
television	The activity profession or medium of broadcasting on television. <i>The days before television.</i>

thread

A programming structure or process formed by linking a number of separate elements or subroutines especially each of the tasks executed concurrently in multithreading.

*The Thames was a **thread** of silver below them.*

tv

An electronic device that receives television signals and displays them on a screen.

*The British call a **tv** set a telly.*

twine

A lightweight cord.

*The plant will **twine** round its support.*

vcr

A magnetic tape recorder for recording (and playing back) TV programs.

viewer

A close observer; someone who looks at something (such as an exhibition of some kind).

*Television **viewers**.*

wire

Fasten with wire.

*An undercover police informer who was wearing a **wire**.*
