### Definitions of "Temperature" as a noun

According to the [Oxford Dictionary of English](#), “temperature” as a noun can have the following definitions:

- *The degree of internal heat of a person's body.*
- *A body temperature above the normal.*
- *The degree of hotness or coldness of a body or environment (corresponding to its molecular activity).*
- *The degree of excitement or tension in a discussion or confrontation.*
- *The degree or intensity of heat present in a substance or object, especially as expressed according to a comparative scale and shown by a thermometer or perceived by touch.*
- *The somatic sensation of cold or heat.*

A region with a particular climate.  
*The dank **climate** of southern Wales.*

**febricity**

A rise in the temperature of the body; frequently a symptom of infection.

**febrility**

A rise in the temperature of the body; frequently a symptom of infection.

**feverishness**

A rise in the temperature of the body; frequently a symptom of infection.

**high temperature**

A public secondary school usually including grades 9 through 12.

**meteorological conditions**

The earth science dealing with phenomena of the atmosphere (especially weather).

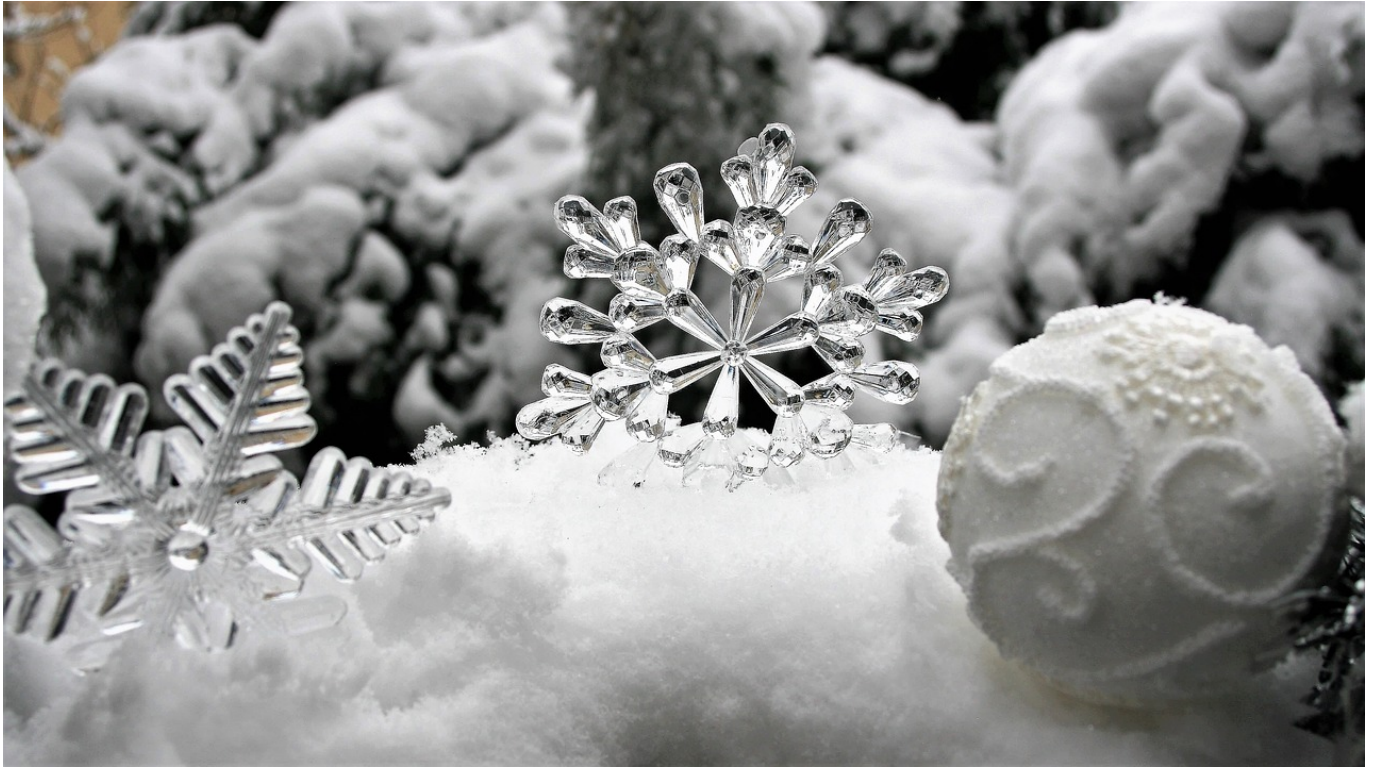

## Associations of "Temperature" (30 Words)

<b>antifreeze</b>	A liquid, typically one based on ethylene glycol, that can be added to water to lower the freezing point, chiefly used in the radiator of a motor vehicle. <i>Most breakdowns were due to people forgetting to put <b>antifreeze</b> in their radiators.</i>
<b>ardor</b>	Intense feeling of love. <i>They were imbued with a revolutionary <b>ardor</b>.</i>
<b>celsius</b>	Swedish astronomer who devised the centigrade thermometer (1701-1744).
<b>centigrade</b>	Of or relating to a temperature scale on which the freezing point of water is 0 degrees and the boiling point of water is 100 degrees.
<b>climatic</b>	Of or relating to a climate. <i>Under certain <b>climatic</b> conditions desert locusts increase in number.</i>
<b>coolant</b>	A liquid or gas that is used to remove heat from something. <i>Lathe operators use an emulsion of oil and water as a <b>coolant</b> for the cutting tool.</i>
<b>cryogenic</b>	Of or relating to very low temperatures. <i>A body being prepared for <b>cryogenic</b> preservation.</i>

<b>degree</b>	The highest power of a term or variable. <i>Persons of unequal <b>degree</b>.</i>
<b>dehydration</b>	Depletion of bodily fluids. <i>The patient was suffering from severe <b>dehydration</b> and malnutrition.</i>
<b>excitation</b>	The state of being emotionally aroused and worked up. <i>These neurotransmitters can produce <b>excitation</b> or inhibition.</i>
<b>fahrenheit</b>	German physicist who invented the mercury thermometer and developed the scale of temperature that bears his name (1686-1736).
<b>fervid</b>	Intensely enthusiastic or passionate, especially to an excessive degree. <i>Set out when the <b>fervid</b> heat subsides.</i>
<b>fever</b>	Intense nervous anticipation. <i>Quinine was used to reduce malarial <b>fever</b>.</i>
<b>halfhearted</b>	Feeling or showing little interest or enthusiasm. <i>A <b>halfhearted</b> effort.</i>
<b>heat</b>	A single operation of heating something especially metal in a furnace. <i>The <b>heat</b> is on.</i>
<b>heatstroke</b>	Collapse caused by exposure to excessive heat.
<b>hot</b>	Make or become hot. <i>It was <b>hot</b> inside the hall.</i>
<b>impassioned</b>	Filled with or showing great emotion. <i>An <b>impassioned</b> appeal.</i>
<b>incubate</b>	Grow under conditions that promote development. <i>The samples were <b>incubated</b> at 80 C for 3 minutes.</i>
<b>incubation</b>	Maintaining something at the most favorable temperature for its development. <i>The chick hatches after a month s <b>incubation</b>.</i>
<b>isotherm</b>	A curve on a diagram joining points representing states of equal temperature.
<b>isothermal</b>	Of a process or change taking place at constant temperature. <i>The <b>isothermal</b> layer of the atmosphere.</i>
<b>lukewarm</b>	Showing little enthusiasm. <i>They drank bitter <b>lukewarm</b> coffee.</i>
<b>passion</b>	A strong feeling or emotion. <i>Modern furniture is a particular <b>passion</b> of Bill s.</i>
<b>summer</b>	Spend the summer. <i>They spent a lazy <b>summer</b> at the shore.</i>

**sunstroke** Heatstroke brought about by excessive exposure to the sun.

**tepid** Moderately warm.  
*The applause was **tepid**.*

**thermometer** Measuring instrument for measuring temperature.

**zeal** Excessive fervor to do something or accomplish some end.  
*His **zeal** for privatization.*
