incline Have a tendency or disposition to do or be something be inclined.

lean Cause to lean to the side.

He **lean**ed his rifle against the wall.

Flee take to one s heels cut and run.

A small river runs into the sea at one side of the castle.

- She tends to the children.
- Tend a store.
