<b>abysmally</b>	In a terrible manner. <i>The conviction rate is <b>abysmally</b> low.</i>
<b>appallingly</b>	To a horrifying or shocking degree. <i>There are people who suffer <b>appallingly</b> all the time.</i>
<b>atrociously</b>	In a terrible manner. <i><b>Atrociously</b> expensive.</i>
<b>awful</b>	Awfully very. <i>I m <b>awful</b> sorry.</i>
<b>awfully</b>	Very much. <i>Thanks <b>awfully</b> for the tea Mr Oakley.</i>

<b>downright</b>	To an extreme degree; thoroughly. <i>He was <b>downright</b> rude.</i>
<b>dreadfully</b>	Extremely. <i>You re <b>dreadfully</b> thin.</i>
<b>eminently</b>	To a notable degree; very. <i>An <b>eminently</b> readable textbook.</i>
<b>exceedingly</b>	Extremely. <i>The supply multiplied <b>exceedingly</b>.</i>
<b>exceptionally</b>	To an exceptional degree. <i>The weather was <b>exceptionally</b> mild for the time of the year.</i>
<b>extraordinarily</b>	In a very unusual or remarkable way. <i>He did a good job in <b>extraordinarily</b> difficult circumstances.</i>
<b>extremely</b>	To a high degree or extent; favorably or with much respect. <i><b>Extremely</b> interesting.</i>
<b>frightfully</b>	Used as intensifiers. <i>It was <b>frightfully</b> hot.</i>

<b>greatly</b>	By a considerable amount; very much. <i>I admire him <b>greatly</b>.</i>
<b>immensely</b>	To a great extent; extremely. <i>Was <b>immensely</b> more important to the project as a scientist than as an administrator.</i>
<b>incompetently</b>	In an incompetent manner. <i>He did the job rather <b>incompetently</b>.</i>
<b>incredibly</b>	Not easy to believe. <i>Michele was <b>incredibly</b> brave.</i>
<b>inexpertly</b>	In a crude and unskilled manner. <i>An <b>inexpertly</b> constructed lean to.</i>
<b><u>mightily</u></b>	With a lot of force; fiercely. <i>I am <b>mightily</b> relieved that it is all over.</i>
<b><u>most</u></b>	Almost. <i><b>Most</b> everyone agrees.</i>
<b><u>poorly</u></b>	In a poor or improper or unsatisfactory manner; not well. <i>The team played <b>poorly</b>.</i>
<b>positively</b>	In a positive way, especially by expressing optimism, agreement, or acceptance. <i>Experts could not <b>positively</b> identify the voices.</i>
<b>really</b>	Used as intensifiers <i>real</i> is sometimes used informally for <i>really</i> rattling is informal. <i>Do you <b>really</b> expect me to believe that.</i>
<b>remarkably</b>	To a remarkable degree or extent. <i>Her condition improved <b>remarkably</b>.</i>
<b>rottenly</b>	In a terrible manner.
<b><u>thoroughly</u></b>	Completely and absolutely good is sometimes used informally for <i>thoroughly</i> . <i>I <b>thoroughly</b> enjoyed the day.</i>
<b>uncommonly</b>	Exceptionally. <i>He is an <b>uncommonly</b> good talker.</i>
<b>very</b>	In a high degree. <i>The <b>very</b> best quality.</i>
<b>very badly</b>	Used as intensifiers; `real' is sometimes used informally for `really'; `rattling' is informal.

<b>extreme</b>	The highest or most extreme degree of something. <i>An <b>extreme</b> conservative.</i>
<b>extremely</b>	To a very great degree; very. <i><b>Extremely</b> unpleasant.</i>
<b>fear</b>	Be afraid or feel anxious or apprehensive about a possible or probable situation or event. <i>I <b>fear</b> for the city with this madman let loose in it.</i>
<b>grief</b>	An instance or cause of intense sorrow. <i>She was overcome with <b>grief</b>.</i>
<b>grievous</b>	Causing fear or anxiety by threatening great harm. <i>His death was a <b>grievous</b> blow.</i>
<b>highly</b>	Favourably. <i>His colleagues think very <b>highly</b> of him.</i>
<b>overly</b>	Excessively. <i>She was a jealous and <b>overly</b> possessive woman.</i>
<b>prohibitively</b>	Used to emphasize a cost that is so high as to prevent something being done or bought. <i>Most of the products are priced <b>prohibitively</b>.</i>
<b>really</b>	Used as intensifiers real is sometimes used informally for really rattling is informal. <i><b>Really</b> there are only three options.</i>
<b>sad</b>	Of things that make you feel sad Christina Rossetti. <i>Feeling <b>sad</b> because his dog had died.</i>
<b>scorching</b>	Hot and dry enough to burn or parch a surface. <i>The <b>scorching</b> July sun.</i>

<b>sorry</b>	Used as a polite request that someone should repeat something that one has failed to hear or understand. <i>I felt <b>sorry</b> for the poor boys working for him.</i>
<b>sultry</b>	Sexually exciting or gratifying. <i>A <b>sultry</b> French au pair.</i>
<b>super</b>	A superintendent. <i>He s been <b>super</b> understanding.</i>
<b>terrible</b>	Extremely bad or serious. <i>I was sick all night and felt <b>terrible</b> for two days.</i>
<b>too</b>	To a degree exceeding normal or proper limits. <i>He was driving <b>too</b> fast.</i>
<b>tragedy</b>	The dramatic genre represented by tragedies. <i>Greek <b>tragedy</b>.</i>
<b>unbearably</b>	To an unbearable degree. <i>Even the nights were <b>unbearably</b> hot.</i>
<b>unusually</b>	To a remarkable or unusual extent; exceptionally. <i>Perhaps <b>unusually</b> for the time William never remarried.</i>
