abysmally	In a terrible manner. <i>The conviction rate is abysmally low.</i>
appallingly	To a horrifying or shocking degree. <i>There are people who suffer appallingly all the time.</i>
atrociously	In a terrible manner. <i>Atrociously expensive.</i>
awful	Awfully very. <i>I m awful sorry.</i>
awfully	Very much. <i>Thanks awfully for the tea Mr Oakley.</i>
decidedly	Undoubtedly; undeniably. <i>No Donna said decidedly.</i>
dismally	In a gloomy or depressed manner. <i>As he looks at the mess he has left behind he must wonder how the Brits so often managed to succeed in the kind of situation where he has so dismally failed.</i>
downright	To an extreme degree; thoroughly. <i>He was downright rude.</i>
dreadfully	Extremely. <i>You re dreadfully thin.</i>
eminently	To a notable degree; very. <i>An eminently readable textbook.</i>
exceedingly	Extremely. <i>The supply multiplied exceedingly.</i>
exceptionally	To an exceptional degree. <i>The weather was exceptionally mild for the time of the year.</i>
extraordinarily	In a very unusual or remarkable way. <i>He did a good job in extraordinarily difficult circumstances.</i>
extremely	To a high degree or extent; favorably or with much respect. <i>Extremely interesting.</i>
frightfully	Used as intensifiers. <i>It was frightfully hot.</i>

greatly	By a considerable amount; very much. <i>I admire him greatly.</i>
immensely	To a great extent; extremely. <i>Was immensely more important to the project as a scientist than as an administrator.</i>
incompetently	In an incompetent manner. <i>He did the job rather incompetently.</i>
incredibly	Not easy to believe. <i>Michele was incredibly brave.</i>
inexpertly	In a crude and unskilled manner. <i>An inexpertly constructed lean to.</i>
<u>mightily</u>	With a lot of force; fiercely. <i>I am mightily relieved that it is all over.</i>
<u>most</u>	Almost. <i>Most everyone agrees.</i>
<u>poorly</u>	In a poor or improper or unsatisfactory manner; not well. <i>The team played poorly.</i>
positively	In a positive way, especially by expressing optimism, agreement, or acceptance. <i>Experts could not positively identify the voices.</i>
really	Used as intensifiers <i>real</i> is sometimes used informally for <i>really</i> rattling is informal. <i>Do you really expect me to believe that.</i>
remarkably	To a remarkable degree or extent. <i>Her condition improved remarkably.</i>
rottenly	In a terrible manner.
<u>thoroughly</u>	Completely and absolutely good is sometimes used informally for <i>thoroughly</i> . <i>I thoroughly enjoyed the day.</i>
uncommonly	Exceptionally. <i>He is an uncommonly good talker.</i>
very	In a high degree. <i>The very best quality.</i>
very badly	Used as intensifiers; `real' is sometimes used informally for `really'; `rattling' is informal.
very much	Used as intensifiers; `real' is sometimes used informally for `really'; `rattling' is informal.

scorching	Hot and dry enough to burn or parch a surface. <i>The scorching July sun.</i>

sorry	Used as a polite request that someone should repeat something that one has failed to hear or understand. <i>I felt sorry for the poor boys working for him.</i>
sultry	Sexually exciting or gratifying. <i>A sultry French au pair.</i>
super	A superintendent. <i>He s been super understanding.</i>
terrible	Extremely bad or serious. <i>I was sick all night and felt terrible for two days.</i>
too	To a degree exceeding normal or proper limits. <i>He was driving too fast.</i>
tragedy	The dramatic genre represented by tragedies. <i>Greek tragedy.</i>
unbearably	To an unbearable degree. <i>Even the nights were unbearably hot.</i>
unusually	To a remarkable or unusual extent; exceptionally. <i>Perhaps unusually for the time William never remarried.</i>
